BLAKE CONFESSES

Given \$1,000 For Juror Kelly by Ruel's Attorney

OFFERED \$10,000 TO HUSH

Bodies From Steamer Picked up—Bryan Cheered by Laboring Men in Empire State

Special to the Evening Review. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 29.—E. A. Blake, a local contractor, confessed at noon today to the crime of attempting to bribe John H. Kelly, a venal man, called to try Abe Ruel, former political boss, on a charge of bribery of supervisors. The confession has created a sensation. It implicates Attorneys Frank Murphy and A. S. Newburgh, counsel for Ruel. Blake says that Murphy gave him \$1,000 to offer Kelly and that Ruel offered him \$10,000 to keep silent after he (Blake) was arrested. Blake was tried and convicted for the attempted bribe, but has not yet been sentenced.

Tragedy of the Sea. LONDON, Oct. 29.—Capt. Avis and his crew of 22 men of the steamer Yarmouth are believed lost in the wreck of the vessel somewhere in the North Sea. Bodies of several of the crew have been picked up. The Yarmouth was bound from Rotterdam to Harwich with a cargo of freight.

New York Pleases Bryan. COHOES, N. Y., Oct. 29.—"Taft is the most objectionable of human beings to laboring men," said W. J. Bryan in a speech before a big

crowd of laboring men at this place today. Bryan was given a warm welcome, and his attacks on Roosevelt and Taft were cheered. Bryan is highly pleased with the demonstration. He says reports received today indicate that the democrats will sweep everything. The reception to Mr. Bryan at Albany last night was one of the features of the campaign.

Students Branded. LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 29.—Six students of the local high school were suspended today pending investigation by the Board of Education of the branding on the foreheads of Frank Rouse and Edgar Lusk the initials "K. D." during initiation into the Delta Kappa society. Rouse and Lusk are also under suspension.

Irrigation in Rogue. GRANTS PASS, Or., Oct. 29.—Irrigation of this section of the Rogue River valley is assured. Preliminary work for watering the arid territory in and about Grants Pass before another dry season sets in was planned at a meeting of Josephine county citizens yesterday. A corporation known as the Josephine Power and Irrigation Company was formed to push the project. A government expert will be employed.

Ben Hayden Dead. SALEM, Or., Oct. 29.—Benjamin Hayden, aged 86 years, one of the pathfinders to California during the gold excitement of 1849 and who came to Oregon in 1852, died at his home in this city this morning.

Gas Kills Noted Man. LYNN, Mass., Oct. 29.—John W. Hutchinson, aged 87 years, poet and vocalist and a friend of Presidents Harrison and Lincoln and other noted abolitionists, was asphyxiated at his home here today by gas from a heater.

Mrs. Emma Faulkner, secretary of the local lodge of Artisans, has received word from Mrs. D. C. McWilliams, of Portland, that she has received one thousand dollars as insurance carried by her late husband, D. C. McWilliams, in the order of Artisans.

A SPLENDID GROWTH.

Another indication of how fast Roseburg and Douglas county are growing was noted here this week when the local hotels could not accommodate all the new arrivals and some had to sit up all night. Houses for rent are a rarity, although about one hundred new ones have been erected this year. Some new apartment houses recently completed were filled almost as soon as finished. More land sales have taken place in this county this year than during any former season, and activity in this line seems to be increasing every day. Several thousand acres of new orchards will be planted in various parts of the county during the coming winter, all showing that the great natural advantages of Douglas county are just beginning to be appreciated.

ELECTION TUESDAY

Seven Parties Have Candidates For President

29 GOVERNORS TO BE NAMED

Socialists Have Nominees in 28 States and Prohibitionists in 22—Changes in Congress

Special to the Evening Review. WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 29.—Next Tuesday there will be elections in forty-three states and two territories. In twenty-nine of the states a governor and other state officers; in the others minor state officers or justices of the supreme court, and in seven, congressmen only are to be elected. The states of the union, with the exception of Maine, Vermont and Oregon, will vote for members of the House of Representatives. The three states named have held their state elections and will vote only for presidential candidates in the coming election. In Arkansas and Georgia the state officers have been chosen this summer, leaving only the representatives in congress and presidential candidates to be voted for.

The terms of thirty-one United States senators—twelve democrats and nineteen republicans—expire March 3, 1909. In a number of the states the senatorial choice already has been made by primary. A national house of representatives is to be elected—the sixty-first Congress. The present house is composed of 223 republicans and 166 democrats, with two vacancies caused by death. One republican and one democrat. Maine has already elected four republicans, Vermont two and Oregon two. The congressional situation at large is very mixed. There are between ninety and one hundred close congressional districts scattered through the country, most of them in states now classed as doubtful states. These districts are close in the sense that the republican or democratic plurality in the last election was so slender that it would take but a slight change in every voting precinct to bring a reversal of the political complexion in this election.

The State Tickets. As usual there is one state ticket, the democratic, in South Carolina, where Martin F. Ansel has been re-nominated for governor. For the first time in many years there is no fusion in any state, though in several states the republican or democratic candidates for state offices have been nominated or endorsed by one or more of the minor parties. The Populists have nominated a ticket in Iowa and the Independence party has put up candidates for governor and other state officers in Massachusetts, New York, Indiana, Texas, Ohio, Minnesota, Michigan and several other states.

The state elections, generally speaking, have attracted little attention. Local issues have nearly everywhere, taken precedence over questions of national importance. Local option and prohibition of the liquor traffic have played a more important part in the contests in many states than ever before. In most of the states, however, neither party has been able to remove the political apathy with which the people generally seem to be afflicted.

W. C. T. U. OPPOSES JOE.

Wine Growers Denounced—Savings Bank System Endorsed.

DENVER, Oct. 28.—The National Woman's Christian Temperance Union convention today adopted with practical unanimity a resolution commending the efforts of the churches to defeat the re-election of Joseph G. Cannon as a member of congress.

The resolution was introduced by Mrs. Mary E. Kuhl, secretary of the Illinois W. C. T. U., and follows: "Resolved, That we, the women of the W. C. T. U., in convention assembled, do hereby express a most hearty commendation of the action taken by the Methodist Episcopal church and the several churches in their brave effort to defeat the re-election of Speaker Cannon, because of his persistent opposition to the reforms proposed by intelligent bodies."

The convention also adopted a resolution introduced by Mrs. F. Lovell, secretary of the department of new-y, pledging efforts to suppress every form of cruelty and to "work for legislation prescribing humane education in the public schools in the states where it does not already exist."

Strike at Wine. Another resolution adopted favored education of the people in regard to "the danger of fermented wine." This was aimed at the California Winegrowers' association, and was introduced by Mrs. Dorcas J. Spencer, of California.

"The wine dealers association has been flooding the state with so-called temperance literature and is trying to make the people believe that wine is not injurious, if the people are educated to it. She said: 'Why, they advocate that the child shall be given wine as soon as it is weaned.'"

Favor School Banks. Another resolution adopted pledged the W. C. T. U. "to co-operate more actively with educators in the introduction of the school savings bank system."

The convention came to an end tonight with a general jubilee in which all of the states represented took part, reporting gains of 20,000 in membership during the year.

SENATOR HILL FOR BRYAN.

Introduces Candidate to Immense Throng at Albany, N. Y.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 28.—The feature of W. J. Bryan's tour upstate today was the appearance on the platform here tonight of ex-United States Senator David B. Hill. It was the first time in several years that Mr. Hill had attended such a gathering, so when he stepped forward as chairman to introduce Democracy's leader, the great crowd that packed the hall where the meeting was held arose to a man and cheered enthusiastically.

"Although not connected with politics," Mr. Hill said, "I reiterate that I am heartily in favor of the democratic state and national tickets. I am not so partisan, however, that I would support the party, whether right or wrong, but permit me to say that I support the national ticket in this campaign, because, in my judgment, the presidential candidate, who honors us with his presence here tonight, is absolutely right upon every contested question in this campaign. It is time for a change in the administration of the government, a change of measures and men. Our candidate owes the nomination not to any one man or set of men, but only to the people themselves. If elected, he will be president himself and not a dummy for any man. He will not be led around with a string like a great, big, caged bear."

Mr. Hill, referring to the republican charge that a paule would follow Mr. Bryan's election, declared that it would not be a business paule at all, but only a paule ensuing on the part of the hundreds of thousands of federal officeholders and public officials who will have to surrender their places to the victorious party.

He concluded his eulogium of Mr. Bryan by saying: "Our candidate is your friend. He is my friend. He is the friend of the laborer and the people. He has been the courageous, sincere and constant friend of labor ever since he has been in public life. He is incorruptible as he is brave, and he can neither be purchased nor intimidated."

Gladiators By His Side. The democratic candidate received an ovation when he rose to speak. He was cheered to the echo and the large audience reluctantly obeyed his gesture to become quiet. He expressed his appreciation of the cordial welcome he has received "in the capital city of our nation's greatest state," and replied to Mr. Hill by saying:

"I appreciate the more than generous words employed by Senator Hill in presenting me to you. One of the pleasures in this campaign is the unity that manifests itself in the Democratic party."

"I believe," he continued, "that we are going to win a great victory, and, my friends, I am glad that Senator Hill is fighting by my side, prepared to share with me the joys of a democratic triumph. This victory would be incomplete if it were a sectional victory."

ASHLAND WOULDN'T SHOOT.

SCRIBER TO JAIL

La Grande Banker Unable to Give \$25,000 Bond

SHORTAGE NEAR \$150,000

Death Summons Ben Hayden, Prominent Oregon Pioneer, Also Noted New Englander

Special to the Evening Review. PENDLETON, Or., Oct. 29.—J. W. Scriber, cashier of the defunct Farmers & Traders National bank, at La Grande, who was arrested yesterday for the third time, was unable to furnish \$25,000 bonds when arraigned before United States Commissioner Halley this morning and will be taken to Portland and placed in jail to await trial. The complaint in this case alleges that Scriber obtained, embezzled and appropriated to his own use the sum of \$2000 and used a note forged by himself in the name of H. C. Rinehart, a prominent merchant of La Grande.

On the occasion of his first arrest, Scriber furnished a bond for \$10,000. His second arrest was brought about by reason of a complaint signed by O. F. Coolidge, one of the men who signed his first government bond, and who charged that deposits had been received by the Farmers & Traders National bank after the cashier knew it to be insolvent. The sum named in the complaint was \$300. The warrant was issued by a justice of the peace at La Grande, who fixed the bond at \$5,000 which was furnished.

Scriber's inability to give the \$25,000 bond exacted upon his third arrest is due to a feeling prevailing at La Grande that Scriber might attempt to get out of the country because of the revelations which show that his bank is involved for a much larger sum than at first reported.

It is said that the defalcations of the former bank official will approximate \$150,000 before the matter is thoroughly sifted, and that he did not hesitate to create a supply of forged notes which he kept on hand and used as occasion arose. The names affixed to these notes comprise the largest merchants and wealthiest residents of that vicinity. An inkling of this condition of affairs got out among La Grande people and it is said now that most of Scriber's former friends are reluctant to become liable as bondsmen for fear that their names are involved in some of the illegal paper passed by him. It is said that such motives actuated his former bondsmen to some extent in taking action to withdraw from the bond.

ATHLETES FOR BRYAN.

Famous New York Pitcher to Address Political Gathering.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—"Christy" Mathewson, the famous pitcher of the New York National league baseball team, will be one of the speakers at a democratic mass meeting in the Twenty-third Assembly District tonight. John J. Hayes, winner of the Marathon race at London, and a number of other members of the Olympian team will occupy places on the platform.
