Men in New York City

LABOR HAS INNING SUNDAY

Bryan Plays Quintette of Opponents—
Question of Veracity Between
White House and Oily
John's Family

Special to the Evening Review.
RICHMOND, Ind., Oct. 31.—On a tour of northern Indiana today, W. J. Bryan created great enthusiasm among an immense crowd at this city when he flayed Carnegie, Taft, Rockefeller, Roosevelt and Root. He said, in part:

"Carnegie is supporting Taft; he says my election would be a tragedy, and Mr. Carnegie is familiar with tragedies. Root says Taft is temperamentally better qualified to enforce than I. This is true from Root's standpoint, as he began his legal career by defending 'Boss' Tweed. Rockefeller is supporting Taft because the latter shows by his utterances that he favors the trusts. Roosevelt demands the election of the man he loved because he knows he prostituted the office of president by bringing it into the arena of politics."

In conclusion, Mr. Bryan said that the democratic party is attempting to inaugurate an era of honesty in poli-

tics by compelling the publication of campaign contributions and to bring the government nearer the people by the direct election of United States senators.

Rockefeller Meant It.
CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 31.—Relatives and close associates of John D. Rockefeller declared today that his announcement of his support of Taft is the logical outcome of his statement last fall. "It is foolish to suppose that Mr. Rockefeller made the announcement for the purpose of injuring Mr. Taft," said W. C. Rudd, today. "Mr. Rockefeller announced early in the campaign that he favored Taft. His support is that of a party man and a citizen, and the statement that it is given in return for immunity for the Standard Oil Co., is absurd."

Somebody is Lying.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—President Roosevelt today authorized the following:
"The president has received numerous letters and telegrams showing that John D. Rockefeller's trick is doubtless the result of an agreement made with the democrats, but that it will fall of its purpose is self-evident from the statement of Mr. Taft, who says that if Mr. Rockefeller really wanted him elected president he would keep quiet."

"Trick," Says Taft.
ELMIRA, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Before a large crowd here today, Wm. H. Taft opened the last day's tour of the state. He appealed for the re-election of Governor Hughes, and then referred to the announcement of Rockefeller, saying it was an anti-election trick and a sure sign that the Standard Oil company is against the republicans.

Great Parade in New York.
NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—Nearly 100,000 men, representing every branch of business, began marching today in a great parade as a final demonstration for Taft and Sherman. As the hours wore on the numbers in line grew rapidly and by 2 o'clock this afternoon 250,000 men had passed in review before Sherman and Elihu Root. Rear-Admiral Coughlin, retired, acted as grand marshal. The

keynote of the demonstration is "Bryan's election means hard times; Taft's success insures the country's prosperity."

Labor will have its inning tomorrow, when a monster Bryan meeting will be addressed by Samuel Gompers and other labor leaders.

PRINCIPLES ABOVE PARTY.

If the Democratic platform, adopted at Denver, had been adopted by the Republican convention, millions of Republicans would have been delighted, because the Democratic platform reflects the sentiments of a majority of the Republicans, as it does the sentiments of the Democrats. I promise, if elected, to carry out that platform in letter and in spirit, and the Democrats elected to Congress will be like myself, pledged to that platform, while a Republican Congress would be more influenced by the action of the Republican convention than by the personal opinion of the Republican candidate.

BUSINESS CHANGES.

O. D. Newhart, who came here about six months ago from Indiana, and his brother, who arrived here from that state a few days ago, have jointly purchased H. D. The North Side Planing Mill, owned and conducted by W. B. Atterbury, Arthur Mahoney and C. Dawe, has been sold to F. F. Patterson, the well known local contractor and builder, who takes charge next Monday. The plant is situated in Kinney's addition. Messrs. Atterbury and Mahoney plan going into the partnership wood and coal business near the mill, while Mr. Dawe will be employed under Mr. Patterson.

TRUSTS FOR TAFT

Rockefeller and Carnegie are
Outspoken For Him

BRYAN AND MACK SCORING

Republican Leaders Unmercifully, Saying Standard Oil Thus Buying Immunity

NAPOLÉON, O., Oct. 30.—William J. Bryan gave out a statement here today commenting upon the declaration John D. Rockefeller made in New York yesterday that he would vote for William H. Taft. Mr. Bryan said he was not surprised at the declaration of Mr. Rockefeller, as the Standard Oil Company and the republican party have been so closely related that many of their interests are identical.

Mr. Bryan's statement follows: "The morning papers publish a statement from Mr. Rockefeller giving his reasons for supporting Mr. Taft. He says: 'If for no other reason, I support Mr. Taft because, on comparing him personally with Mr. Bryan, his chief opponent, I find the balance of fitness and temperament entirely on his side. The election of Mr. Taft will, I believe, make for law and order and stability of business. He is not a man inclined to rash experiments by advocating measures subversive of industrial progress.'"

"There are several things about this statement that deserve attention. The first clause says if for no other reason, but there already is a reason. He is for Mr. Taft because Taft is for him. He is for Mr. Taft because Mr. Taft is in sympathy with the trusts. Mr. Taft has been making speeches for many weeks and he has not yet dwelt upon the injustices of the trusts or pointed out the injustice done to the American people by them. No wonder Mr. Rockefeller is for Taft."

"Again Mr. Rockefeller says Mr. Taft's election will make for law and order. This is false. Mr. Rockefeller's corporation is the most notorious law-breaker in the United States and he is for Mr. Taft because he does not want the law enforced. If he thought Mr. Taft would enforce the law against the Standard Oil Company and favored the enactment of more stringent laws against the Standard Oil Company, as I do, he would not be for Mr. Taft. Mr. Rockefeller also says that Mr. Taft's election will make for stability of business. What kind of business? Stability in the trust business is what he means. He thinks that Mr. Taft's election will enable the trusts to get a tighter strangle grasp upon the American people and put their extortion upon a more permanent foundation. He says that Mr. Taft is not a man inclined to rash experiments. He might have omitted the word 'rash' for Mr. Taft is not in favor of any kind of experiments in the way of remedial legislation. He does not propose remedies. He simply glorifies in the past and wants to leave conditions as they are."

"Mr. Rockefeller says that Mr. Taft would not advocate measures subversive of industrial progress. But what is industrial progress? Is it right to allow one corporation to swallow up or bankrupt all the other corporations and then hold the country at its mercy? Is it industrial progress to destroy competition and close the door of opportunity to the young men of the country? Is it industrial progress to destroy industrial independence and establish a despotism of monopoly?"

"The democrats have reasons to be grateful to Mr. Rockefeller for tearing the mask off the republican campaign and revealing the duplicity that has characterized it. Instead of openly attacking the monopoly the republican organization has kept up a pretense of reform and Mr. Roosevelt rushed into the arena and allowed the charge that the trusts were opposed to Mr. Taft to stand. I challenged him to name one trust officer that was supporting me and not being able to find an official he named a St. Louis attorney who, in one case, represented the president of a branch of the Standard Oil Company."

False Pretenses Laid Bare.

"Mr. Roosevelt, in his eagerness to relieve the republican candidate of the odium of trust support, accepts this as proof that the Standard Oil Company was supporting me. Now Mr. Rockefeller, head of the Standard Oil Company, comes out openly in support of Mr. Taft and gives reasons that lay bare the false pretenses upon which the republican campaign has been conducted. If the republican party were honest it would announce that, having made arrangements with the trusts for the funds to finance the campaign and

having pledged the republican party to protect the trusts from punishment, it would release the rank and file of the republican party from further support of the republican ticket. "The republican party cannot serve two masters. Its real master has now stepped forth and asserted his claim to the party's services. No republican need be deceived any longer as to the predatory wealth of the country. It will be noticed that this statement comes out too late to be used by the weekly newspapers circulated among the masses, but in time to be used in the business centers to influence those business men who look to the big financiers for advice."

"Before taking up another question," he said, "I want to say that we have had another favor granted us this morning. Mr. Carnegie has come out for Mr. Taft. Mr. Carnegie holds the largest block of steel bonds of any man in the United States. He comes out with Mr. Rockefeller. And it was the steel trust that went to the White House and got permission from the president to absorb a rival, and the steel trust is today supporting Mr. Taft as that trust helped to secure his nomination."

MACK GIVES HIS OPINION.

Says Rockefeller Drove Shrewd Bargain With Republicans.

NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Charges were made today by Norman E. Mack, chairman of the democratic national committee, that the declaration of John D. Rockefeller for Taft for president was the result of a deal between the republican national committee and the Standard Oil Company interests, whereby National Chairman Hitchcock received large campaign contributions and Mr. Rockefeller the promises. Mr. Mack said that undoubtedly the \$29,000,000 fine of the Standard Oil Company would be fixed up in the event of Mr. Taft's election as a part of the bargain. Mr. Mack said:

"The Standard Oil Company has landed where everybody knew it would land. Mr. Rockefeller held back for a bargain and got what he wanted. His declaration for Taft is good for at least 100,000 votes in the doubtful states. I cannot speculate on the exact amount the national committee received from Mr. Rockefeller, but one can rest assured that they both received their price, Hitchcock getting the money and Rockefeller the promises, which suggests the question whether Taft is with Rockefeller or with Roosevelt."

"We now have an oil trust and the steel trust lined up side by side working for Mr. Taft's candidacy. Mr. Carnegie's statement yesterday on his arrival from Europe that the selection of Mr. Bryan would be a national tragedy is not only shocking, but should arouse the indignation of all fair-minded citizens of the country regardless of party affiliation. Mr. Carnegie has amassed a large fortune as the result, in part at least, of republican policies, special privileges and a robber tariff, which Mr. Bryan and every true democrat condemn as so odious and oppressive as to demand immediate reform. Hence the election of Mr. Bryan is denounced by Mr. Carnegie as a tragedy."

Chairman Mack declared that he had learned that the republican national committee had a campaign fund of \$3,000,000 and that of this sum \$2,000,000 was being used for the purpose of coercion and bribery. The national chairman said further that \$200,000 of the republican campaign fund had been sent into Indiana and that more than that sum had been sent into Ohio.

CANNERY CO. INCORPORATES.

Albany Gets Fine Industry—H. S. Gile, of Salem, Interested.

ALBANY, Or., Oct. 30.—Articles of incorporation were filed today for the Albany Preserving company, which will build a big cannery in this city. The incorporators are H. S. Gile, of Salem, and H. J. Moore and Homer Moore, of Albany, who secured a site some time ago at the corner of Eighth and Railroad streets, for the erection of the plant. Gile is a well known fruitgrower and the Moores own a big prune orchard in Benton county, close to this city. The capital stock of the company is \$10,000. It is planned to have the cannery in operation in time to handle next year's crop. The new plant will handle fruit only, but in addition to canning fruit, will manufacture by-products, such as jellies, apple butter and cider.

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LATEST ELECTION FORECAST.

Democrats Claim 284 Electoral Votes—Republicans Claim 325.

CHICAGO, Oct. 30.—While the democratic leaders confidently expect that Bryan will carry New York, they believe that he can be elected even without the 39 votes of the empire state. A number of the smaller states which until recently were claimed as certainly republican are now regarded as likely to cast their electoral votes for Bryan. These gains, it is asserted, are so considerable that New York may not be essential to the Nebraska's success, provided he carries Ohio and Indiana.

It is claimed that Bryan is now likely to have 222 votes, without counting either Ohio or New York. If Ohio's 23 votes are added to this total the result is 245, or 3 more than the number required to elect.

It will be observed that this list includes New Jersey and West Virginia, both of which seemed a few weeks ago likely to go to Taft. Bryan has made heavy gains in both these states and the claim that he will carry them may prove justified. More-over the list does not include Idaho, 3 votes; Wyoming, 3; South Dakota, 4; and Kansas, 10, any of which may be found in the democratic column in the event of a Bryan landslide.

Of course, if Bryan carries New York his victory is assured by an overwhelming majority. The argument of those who advance the foregoing estimate is that even without New York he can win.

Chairman Hitchcock's Claim.
NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—In his forecast of the composition of the electoral college which will choose the next president and vice-president of the United States, made public at republican headquarters tonight, National Chairman Hitchcock claims 325 republicans, or 82 more than will be required to elect.

For the republican ticket, Mr. Hitchcock is sure of New York, Ohio and Indiana. He also includes in the republican column, Nebraska, Montana, Maryland and Nevada. In explaining his list Mr. Hitchcock said that he believed the chances were even in Kentucky and Missouri, with their 13 and 18 votes respectively.

If by chance any of the states claimed should go democratic, he said, they would be Maryland, Montana and Nevada, with a total of 14 votes. This would leave a republican margin of 69, and of this advantage he expressed himself as perfectly confident.

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MUZZLE FOREMOST

Hunter Pulls Gun From Boat
and Kills Himself

BELLINGHAM SAFE BLOWN

Chancellor Von Buelow Resigns After
Stormy Scene With Kaiser, but
Later Reconsiders

MOUNT VERNON, Wash., Oct. 31.—Arthur E. Horn, a prominent shingle mill operator of this city, accidentally shot and killed himself yesterday. He had returned in a gasoline launch with a party of hunters from Deer Point and started to take his shotgun from the boat, muzzle foremost. The weapon was loaded and the trigger caught in some way, exploding the gun. A full charge of buckshot entered Horn's left breast, killing him instantly.

Safe Blown.
BELLINGHAM, Wash., Oct. 31.—Using nitro-glycerine, crackersmen early this morning blew open the safe of the People's Store, A. Mansfield, proprietor. They secured the strong box, containing \$150 and some valuable securities. There is no clue to the identity of the robbers.

Von Buelow Resigns—Not.
BERLIN, Germany, Oct. 31.—Following trouble with the German parliament over the proposed new taxation scheme, Chancellor Von Buelow resigned office today. After the resignation was accepted by the Emperor, however, Von Buelow reconsidered his action at the Emperor's request and concluded to remain in office. The resignation followed a dramatic scene, in which the chancellor bitterly reproached the Kaiser for interfering with foreign affairs.

IMPORTANT DEAL.

Faith in Roseburg's Future Shown in Building Lease.

A deal which has caused considerable comment on the street today was the granting of a long term lease by Mr. H. Wollenberg to the Douglas County Abstract Company. The peculiar feature of it is that the Abstract company took the initiative in the matter and made Mr. Wollenberg a proposition to increase their rent 20 per cent and he in turn to give them a 10-year lease.

Probably no one is better able to make a forecast of the future of Roseburg than the Abstract company, being, as they are, the first to know of any probable transfer and their assistance often being required in sales of real estate in Douglas county.

Mr. E. W. Kuykendall, a member of the company, in speaking to a representative of The Review, said today that the members of his firm considered this to be an exceedingly advantageous contract, as there is no question but that next year will see values in Roseburg doubled. He says business, instead of falling off at the advent of the rainy season, is increasing, and without question Douglas county is to be prominently recognized next year.
