Care of the Hands.
If you wish to keep your hands so soft and white keep a jar of almond oil on the washstand. Outmeal and eye-cornmeal will do just as well. After washing the hands in soap and warm water rub the meal on them generously. This will keep the hands wonderfully soft and white. For stains an obstinate spots keep a cake of toilet pumice stone on hand and rub the spots with this, and they will quickly be removed. Dry every part of the hand on a soft towel and then rub in a good cream that you find agrees with your skin.

Crab Apple Jelly.
Wash the fruit and cut in quarters, cutting out the stems, blossom end and any blemishes. Put in preserving kettle and cover with water until it is just barely in sight. Boil quickly, and as soon as apples are tender strain through cheesecloth. Do not allow the apples to cook until mushy or the jelly will be cloudy or flaky, as the seeds will not rise. The fruit must be underripe and hard, though not actually green.

A Good Laundry Apron.
An apron made of denim, fashioned like a man's work apron, will be found more satisfactory when washing than an ordinary apron or one made of oil-cloth. The ordinary gingham apron soon becomes soaked with the water that has splashed, and the oil-cloth apron is heavy and bulky and hard to work in. Sew two large pockets, one on each side of the apron, for putting the clothespins in.

START FOR PAVED STREETS.

man," informed him that if the council attempted to enforce the ordinance for 12-foot walks he would bring an injunction suit against the city. Mr. Strong explained that he, personally, stood for improvement of the city in every possible manner.

Mr. Strong's statement brought forth the following vigorous response from his predecessor in office, Councilman Worthington: "Mr. Mayor, I love injunctions; I defy them, and I have discovered that this plan is a winner. During the three long, long years that I have served as a councilman the city has been threatened with all sorts of injunctions, but still we exist and go right along doing business just the same. These people who are asking for 16-foot sidewalks certainly don't know what they are asking for. Had they investigated conditions as we have done, they would have learned that under the new survey of the city some of the walks will be no more than 10 feet wide, while others will be fully 14 feet wide. The reason for this is that many of the property lines are very uneven, and it will require different widths of sidewalks to straighten them out."

When the vote on the passage of the ordinance was taken, this was the result:
Yeas—Fisher, Micell, Worthington, Wright, Bellows and Josephson. Noes—Kohlhagen and Cardwell. Councilman Kohlhagen did not explain his vote, but his signature to the remonstrance speaks for itself.

The six councilmen who voted in favor of the ordinance constitute the necessary majority of the council, because of the death of Councilman Robt. Robertson, leaving only 11 members on the board. Later in the evening Robertson's successor, R. G. Bounds, took his seat, as did J. W. Mullen succeeding J. W. Wright, from Ward No. 6, and B. W. Strong, elected over G. Worthington in Ward No. 4.

First Ward Jangle.
Councilman Fisher brought up the subject of a new councilman from the First ward. He moved that in view of the tie vote cast for opposing candidates at the last city election the council be instructed to issue a call for another election in that ward. Mullen voted a second to the motion, but before it could be put to a vote a controversy ensued over the propriety of such a proceeding. Micell recalled the fact that in the past all vacancies in the council were filled by the council itself. He declared, furthermore, that no action should be taken until Councilman Long announced whether he intended to resign or continue in office. Fisher persisted, and Cardwell tried to impress upon him the fact that his ward still had two councilmen and that it would be time enough to act when there was a vacancy. Fisher sat down with this remark: "The attorney general says we are entitled to another election and we're going to have it."

Street Work Ridiculed.
The work done by Contractor Robinson on First Avenue North, in Kinney's addition, is according to the plans and specifications, I suppose," said Chairman Micell, of the street committee, in making an official report, "but it's the poorest investment the city ever made. The street as it is now isn't even an ornament."
"Are the property owners satisfied?" asked Mayor Hoover.
"They seem to be," replied Micell.
"Let them have the street then." And a warrant for \$455, as per contract, was ordered drawn in favor of him for alteration.

The J. G. Flook Company notified the council to remove the house cart now housed on its premises. This was referred to the fire commissioners. It was explained that the Flook Company had agreed to house the cart on condition that the city install a fire hydrant at its premises, and this has not been done. It was stated on the other hand, however, that such a hydrant was not to be employed unless on a removal from an adjoining corner. Furthermore, it was contended, the Flook Company's mill is within reach of four fire hydrants at the present time.

A vote of thanks was extended to Councilman W. W. Cardwell and Al. Creason for their dedication of property for street purposes in North Roseburg.

Plans for a bridge over Deer Creek, involving an approximate cost of \$10,000, were submitted by J. O. Drake. They were laid on the table without examination.
Councilman Micell was authorized to buy a carload of lumber from the Leona Mills Lumber Co., at a price of \$12 per thousand for the decking and \$12.50 for the stringers for new sidewalks and crosswalks.

Referred to Committees.
On Judiciary—Application of H. C. Stanton for determination of the legal status as to a platted alley in block 37, bounded by Cass, Oak, Rose and Stephens streets. The alley is entirely enclosed by the properties of Mr. Stanton and the stable premises occupied by S. T. Smith.

On Streets—(1) Application of John Hunter for drain on Pine street, opposite his storage plant; (2) placing of sewer pipe in the big drain through the Wright, Pitzer and Thompson properties in block 31; (3) application for board plank on the S. P. Crossing on Lane street.

Health and Police—Complaint of Councilman Fisher of neglect of property owners to lay connections with certain sewers, as prescribed by the charter.

Miscellaneous.
A special committee, consisting of Mullen, Cardwell and Josephson, was appointed to confer with Engineer Hartong and ascertain the probable cost of having a city map made, one that will show all the sewer lines.

The light committee reported favorably on the petition for the establishment of two incandescent lights on First Avenue, South, in Kinney's addition, and same was adopted.

A remonstrance against the proposed sewer on Douglas and Kane streets was received from Adam Fisher. It developed, however, that Mr. Fisher was merely objecting to the assessment and because his property was situated below the grade. The remonstrance was referred back to him for alteration.

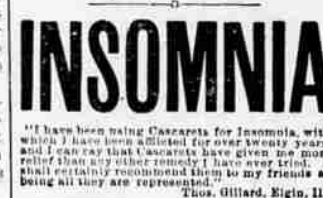

Sheep Shearings.
Every sheep pasture should have an abundance of pure water.
If there is not a continual endeavor to improve the docks they will go backward instead of forward.
Sheep are one of the best kinds of stock for saving feed on a farm that would otherwise go to waste.
For rapid fattening a ration of corn in the morning and cottonseed meal in the evening give good results.
Sheep will show results for feed put into them more quickly than almost any other animal we can raise.

Cause of Colic in Horses.
Colic in horses is generally the result of carelessness or improper feeding. The stomach of a horse is small and the digestion is limited, and if the horse is hungry and overfed or is allowed to gulp down a big feed of colic is the result; also if musty hay or musty corn feed is used or if fresh cut grass wet with dew or rain is hastily eaten in large quantities colic is often the result.

Protect the Water-Supply.
This is the dry month when streams and springs lessen and sometimes fall altogether. If dependence is had upon water holes, see to it that the stock are not allowed to tramp in them, and on no account allow them to drink from foul pools.

Need of Culture.
While liberal fertilization will increase the yield, thorough cultivation is also necessary to keep up and improve the quality.
