Democracy will feel encouraged because this year's defeat is much less than that of four years ago. And it is fortunate for the country that the two great political parties continue to be nearly equal and a reverse is possible at any election.

So many new enterprises and such big industrial advancement is in store for Douglas County for the coming year, that the result of Tuesday's election will soon occupy a very small place in the minds of our people. Not only hundreds, but actually thousands, of acres of new orchards are to be planted in this county. Timber and mining developments are to realize heavy advancement. Livestock and poultry interests will also continue to grow rapidly. Douglas County is all right, and with a large increase of homekeepers and investors will be bigger, better and busier than ever during the coming year.

COUNTRY'S TIMBER SUPPLY.

Expert Says at Present Rate Supply Will All be Cut in 30 Years.

"We are now cutting timber from the forests of the United States at the rate of 500 feet board measure a year for every man, woman and child. In Europe they use only 60 board feet."

Few statements could be made which would better convince the average man that this country leads the world in the demand for timber. It is made by Treadwell Cleveland, Jr., in a circular which treats of the conservation of the forests, soil, water and all the other great natural resources, which has just been published by the United States Forest Service. In speaking further of the consumption of timber in this country Mr. Cleveland says:

"At this rate, in less than thirty years all our remaining virgin timber will be cut. Meantime, the forests which have been cut over are generally in a bad way for want of care; they will produce only inferior second growth. We are clearly over the verge of a timber famine. "This is not due to necessity, for the forests are one of the renewable resources. Rightly used, they go on producing crop after crop indefinitely. The countries of Europe know this and Japan knows it; and their forests are becoming with time not less, but more, productive. We probably still possess sufficient forest land to grow wood enough at home to supply our own needs. If we are not blind, or wilfully wasteful, we may yet preserve our forest independence, and with it, the fourth of our great industries."

"Present wastes in lumber production are enormous. Take the case of yellow pine, which now heads the list in the volume of annual cut. In 1907 it is estimated that only one-half of all the yellow pine cut during the season was used, and that the other half amounting to 5,000,000 cords, was wasted. Such waste is typical. Mr. R. A. Long, in his address on 'Forest Conservation' at the Conference of Governors last spring, pointed out that 20 per cent of the yellow pine was simply left in the woods—a waste which represents the timber growing on 200,000 acres."

"The rest of the waste takes place at the mill. Of course, it would never do to speak of the material rejected at the mill as waste unless this material could be turned to use by some better and more thorough form of utilization. But in many cases we know, and in many other cases we have excellent reason to believe that most, if not all, of this material could be used with profit. It is simply a question of intelligent investigation and, more than all, of having the will to economize."

"But there are other ways to conserve the forests besides cutting in half the present waste of forest products. The forests can be made to produce three or four times as rapidly as they do at present. This is true of both the virgin forests and the cut-over lands. Virgin forests are of ten fully stocked with first-class timber, but this stock has been laid in very slowly, on account of the wasteful composition which is carried on constantly between the rival trees. Then, too, in the virgin forests there are very many trees which have reached maturity and stopped growing, and these occupy space which, if held by younger trees, would be

laying in a new stock constantly. As regards the cut-over land, severe cutting, followed by fire, has checked growth so seriously that in most cases reproduction is both poor and very slow, while in many other cases there is no true forest reproduction at all at present, and there is but little hope for the future."

LAND FRAUD CASES.

Supreme Court Denies Four Petitions, Two From Oregon Men.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—Justice Stanford, of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, today overruled the motions for new trials made by Frederick Hyde and Joseph Schneider, convicted last spring of conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with securing land grants in Oregon and Washington. The motion to arrest the judgment was not disposed of, pending which the sentence probably will be deferred. The defendants allege the jury was coerced into agreeing on the verdict and sought to have the jurors interrogated. The court, however, held that that would allow the jurors to testify that their verdict was their honest judgment and opinion of the evidence, a matter as to which, according to the result, the defendants themselves invoked, the jurors cannot testify.

Yesterday, the Supreme court denied the petition of Willard N. Jones and Thaddeus S. Potter, for a writ of review. Jones and Potter, who are residents of Oregon, were sentenced to imprisonment on a charge of having defrauded the government by illegal land entries in that state under the homestead law. The charge was conspiracy, but they pleaded the statute of limitations. The decision will practically uphold the verdict of the lower court.

Must Begin Serving.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 3.—Just as soon as the mandate of United States Supreme Court, denying to Willard N. Jones and Thaddeus S. Potter the writ of review, reaches Portland, the two local lawyers who were convicted in connection with Oregon land frauds, will have to begin serving the sentence imposed upon them by Judge Hunt.

Jones and Potter were indicted by the federal grand jury, September 2, 1905, and were convicted October 14, 1905. Jones, according to evidence produced at the trial, was the instigator in the conspiracy to defraud the government out of timber lands. He was sentenced to a year at McNeil's Island and to pay a fine of \$2000.

Potter, because it appeared that he had been only a dupe of Jones, was sentenced to serve six months in the Multnomah county jail and to pay a fine of \$500. Jones and Potter continued their operation to timber lands in the vicinity of the Sixes Indian reservation. Their scheme was to get ex-soldiers to make filings on the lands.

SCRIBER'S FINANCES.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 3.—The liabilities of J. W. Scriber, cashier of the Farmers' & Traders' National bank at La Grande, now in jail on several charges of forgery, amount to \$94,805, according to a bankruptcy petition which has been filed in the United States district court in Portland by Scriber. His assets, an inventory of all property, real and personal, amount to \$97,920.

The petitioner has property amounting to \$42,200 most of which is town lots in La Grande. His personal property, a part of which is exempt according to law, is valued at \$10,200. Claims in action; bills receivable, etc., reach a total of \$12,380. All told, the property, including household goods, which are exempt from execution, is valued at \$6,150.
