She blew herself for \$165,000 worth of Medford orchards, and would have done as much more but for the financial squeeze.

COYOTE FENCE A SUCCESS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—The coyote-proof sheep pasture erected in the Wallowa National Forest last Autumn has proved a decided success. The fence, which was built of one barbed wire below and two barbed wires above a 16-inch woven wire fence with posts 16 feet apart, has been found an effective barrier to wolves and coyotes, but not to bears. A loss, amounting in the aggregate to thousands of dollars, might be saved if wolf-proof pastures similar to that used in the experiment were constructed, and all predatory animals within killed.

the Perkins Hillcrest pear farm sold for \$3500 originally. Perkins had the nerve to pay \$21,500 for it and he has sold it to Seattle people for \$80,000, and they took \$40,000 worth of fruit off it this year. DeHart, the Portland hardware man, bought a pear and apple orchard for \$16,000 a few years ago and has just sold it for \$35,000. The owners are building fine barns and are nesting snugly in brown-leaved kiln-dried oak groves and taking almost the price of their gold mine out of it every year in crops that increase each year. And mingled with it, with the wagons hauling the best fruit crops to town are wagon loads of fine coal taken out of the mines in the foothills just back of the orchards. Fred Perkins off 19 acres of pears this year took \$19,000 and the check was published in fac simile. A real estate man on the street corner was telling a man on the street corner in my hearing of 40 acres of this year yielding \$46,000, or \$45,000 net, and prepared to show him the expense and shipping books. Fifteen hundred dollars an acre was refused for the Dillon Hill pear orchard this fall. It is 160 acres, or nearly a quarter of a million.

Something to Talk About.

Here is something to think about for the sluggards of the Willamette valley, where the soil is just as good for apples and pears as Medford. Nearly a quarter of a million for a quarter section. Pear trees on that farm just beginning to bear, seven years old from the planting, and growing better every year. This land will never be sold for less than \$2,000 an acre, and the syndicates are already forming to take it in. Why shouldn't Medford boom when it has been the work of the boosters there to reveal the possibilities of that sort of fruit growing.

COOS BAY ENCOURAGED.

Holabird's Report May Bring Decision From Harriman This Year.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Nov. 6.—Colonel E. H. Holabird, the personal representative of E. H. Harriman, who visited Coos Bay recently to ascertain whether or not the building of the Drain line here would pay, telegraphed today to a friend that he would leave Los Angeles November 15 for the East to take up the Coos Bay railroad matter with Mr. Harriman and his directors.

Colonel Holabird while here gathered data as to the freight business which a railroad might expect to get, and all of this information will be presented to the railroad officials. When a committee from Coos Bay visited Harriman recently, urging that the Drain line be built, the railroad magnate promised that if a preliminary investigation showed that the

business would give a fair per cent interest on the investment the work of building the line would again be taken up.

The message from Colonel Holabird offers encouragement that some decision may be reached before the end of the year.

THE OREGON APPLE MAN.

Reading horticultural commission literature pertaining to the state of Oregon, or having even a passing knowledge of the fact of which this literature treats, there is no escape from the conviction that the Oregon apple man has every reason to be satisfied with what he has done and what he expects to do. Take the statement of Horticultural Commissioner Carson of the third horticultural district, and we have a comprehensible summary of the Oregon apple man's felicitation. Mr. Carson asks: "If there is any competition between Oregon fruit and the fruit of the east, why is it that the eastern fruitgrowers sell a barrel of their best quality apples, containing two and one-half bushels for less than Oregon growers sell a single box containing one bushel?"

The Oregon apple men have been aware for some time that there is no possible competition between the fruit of the two sections. The fancy prices he has received for his apples in London and European markets, to say nothing of New York, has been the assurance of the superiority of Oregon fruits. This one fact, more pronouncedly perhaps than any other, has established Oregon's reputation as the land of the apple. The Oregon apple man has profited by it beyond any other apple man in the country, as his bank account will show. And his is opportunity in the state for a multiplication of his tribe.

We may safely say that the cultivation of this one staple fruit will always be one of its chief industries of the state. In its future there is an almost incalculable warranty of wealth to the state, and of profit and content to the individual. The Oregon apple, if properly presented is one of the strongest inducements for emigration among the western homeseeking people of the East.—Evening Telegram.
