ENEMIES INFERIOR

Gompers Will be Re-Elected to Lead Hosts of Labor

FEDERATION IN SESSION

Five Labor Leaders Invited to Dine With Roosevelt, and Gompers is Not One of Them.

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 9.—Despite the dissatisfaction with his stand during the recent political campaign and his own declaration that he would not again be a candidate, the reelection of Samuel Gompers is practically conceded at the 28th annual convention of the American Federation of Labor, which opened in this city today. The fight against Gompers, however, will be bitter. His opponents declare that he took the American Federation of Labor into politics in violation of its constitution and by-laws. There are also many Socialist delegates who are opposed to Gompers, owing to the stand he has taken against their political creed.

The leading candidate against Gompers is James Lynch, of the Typographical union. John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers, is also mentioned to succeed Gompers.

The convention opened with addresses of welcome by Governor Butcher and Mayor Speer. The sessions will continue two weeks.

In his annual report, President Gompers asserted that the present lack of work is the result of government errors. He said it was almost inconceivable that so many men were idle when the country is so bountiful.

Concerning politics, Gompers said he was satisfied with the great moral victory in the recent campaign, where the voice of the workingman was heard.

The trouble growing out of the "federation blacklist" will be discussed during the convention. Last winter the Bucks Stove and Range Company of St. Louis secured an injunction restraining Gompers from printing the name of the concern in the "We Don't Patronize" list of the American Federationist, the official organ of the American Federation of Labor. Gompers nominally obeyed the injunction, but only nominally, having made all sorts of references to it, and to the fact that organized labor is against the Bucks Company. This led to a contempt case against him. In this case, the federation is solidly back of Gompers, and one and all the delegates believe that the injunction was a violation of the fundamental right of free speech and a free press.

Gompers Not Invited.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—President Roosevelt today issued invitations to five labor leaders to dine with him in the evening of November 17th to discuss desired legislation, preparatory to submitting his next annual message to congress. Samuel Gompers is not included in the five invited men, who are Terrence V. Powderly, John Mitchell, Daniel Keefe, James Duncan, and P. H. Morrissey.

N. Y. World Endorses Roosevelt For U. S. Senator

KING EDWARD'S BIRTHDAY

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FACES BAD CHARGE

Rev. Clark, of Gardiner, Fights Extradition to Texas

NAME SAID TO BE ASSUMED

Indictment Says Obtaining Money Under False Pretenses, but Something Graver is Alleged.

Rev. George Clark, of Summers, arrested at Gardiner last Saturday, left Roseburg this morning for Salem to fight extradition to Throckmorton, Texas, where he was indicted in 1904 under the name of Summers, on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses. The minister's defense is that he is a victim of mistaken identity. Circumstances surrounding the case militate heavily against him, however, and if certain allegations are true he will have to face a more serious charge than that on which he is indicted.

Republicans Carry Missouri and Get Two Maryland Electors.

CHICAGO, Nov. 7.—Complete returns from Missouri indicate that the entire electoral vote of that state will be cast for William Howard Taft.

Complete returns from Maryland indicate that Taft will get two electoral votes from the state and that Bryan will get six. Taft has a plurality of 561 on the vote cast for the first presidential election in Maryland.

This leaves the vote of the electoral college as follows: Taft, 321; Bryan, 162.
