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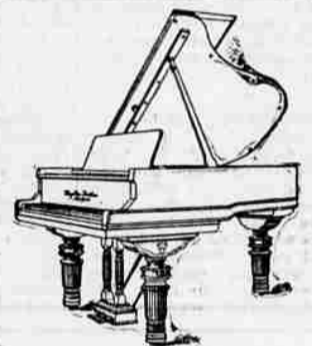

EX-SENATOR CARMACK SLAIN.

Political Editorials Arouse Anger of
Cooper Family.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 9.—Ex-Senator Edward Carmack, editor of the Tennessean, was shot and killed this afternoon by Robin Cooper, a son of Colonel Duncan B. Cooper.

The tragedy was in the nature of a duel, Carmack firing one shot that took effect in his slayer's right shoulder.

It is understood that the trouble was one of the results of a recent democratic gubernatorial primary, in which Carmack was defeated. Carmack, since he became editor of the Tennessean, had been caustic in criticizing what he called the democratic machine, and had printed several editorials about Colonel Cooper.

Within the last few days, it is asserted, Col. Cooper notified Carmack that these editorial criticisms must cease. Another editorial referring to the colonel appeared in the paper this morning, and this is supposed to have been the immediate cause of the trouble.

GETS LIFE SENTENCE.

Malheur County Murderer Decides He Cannot Escape Punishment.

VALE, Or., Nov. 9.—After holding out until the last moment under the impression that somehow he could escape the penalty of the law, David Wisner, an old rancher of Juniper, near this city, entered a plea of guilty for the killing of his partner, Ben Dull, aged 20, and was sentenced by Circuit Court Judge Davis to imprisonment for life.

The crime was one of the most remarkable in the history of Malheur County and was of such a character that a jury would have had to possess an elastic conscience to escape from returning a verdict of murder in the first degree. Nevertheless Wisner, who has resided in this section for many years, had an excellent record and reputation, and none of his neighbors supposed him capable of crime. The tragedy followed a dispute between the two men, Wisner wishing to take from Dull some har-

ness which he was using and which was partnership property. Dull would not give it up, and the old man walked to his home and got his shotgun. He then approached Dull and shot him dead without a word of warning. Wisner made no effort to get away, and when arrested was confident that he was exempt from the vengeance of the law. There were and are no signs of insanity in the old man, and he refused to enter any plea of mental irresponsibility, saying that if the law wanted his life the law would take it, but he did not believe until after many conferences with his counsel that he was in danger.

THUGS CONVICTED.

EUGENE, Or., Nov. 9.—Harry Murphy and Robert Harvey, who were tried for assaulting with intent to rob M. V. DeWald, of Cottage Grove, several weeks ago, were today convicted after the jury had been out only a few minutes.

MAY KEEP RACES APART.

Coeeducation of Whites and Negroes Not Compulsory, Says Court.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—In deciding the case of *Hiersa College* versus the State of Kentucky, favorable to the state, the supreme court of the United States today held that the states of the Union may constitutionally legislate to prevent the coeducation of the white and black races. The case was instituted to test the validity of the state law of 1904 prohibiting white and black children from attending the same school.

The higher state court took the position that the white and black races are naturally antagonistic, and that the forced separation of the children of the two is in the line of preservation of peace.
