Annual Earnings of Railroads Drop \$1000 For Every Mile.

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Gross earnings of the railroads of the United States decreased by the sum of \$139,000,000 during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908, according to Slayton Thomas, manager of the Bureau of Railway News and Statistics whose report has just been issued.

The figures show the gross earnings for the last fiscal year to have been \$2,459,000,000, with a mileage of 230,000, or \$10.652 per mile.
