23 INDICTMENTS.

Morrow County Grand Jury Rounds up Local Option Violators.

HEPPNER, Or., Nov. 12.—That the grand jury had something up its sleeve when it failed to report indictments last night was made evident today when 23 true bills were returned against Morrow county citizens for alleged violation of the local option law. Up until a late hour yesterday it was thought that there was nothing doing in the liquor cases and that the "past times" and near-by places had escaped. The authorities declare they have convicting evidence on all of the indictments.

It was no easy matter for the grand jury to get evidence from the witnesses called before it and it was by confining some witnesses in jail for their refusal to answer questions that the facts were gleaned for a verdict of indictment. Two indictments were returned against Maddock & Co., Vic Groshens, Dennis McNamee and Chris Borchers, of Heppner, while Frank Engleman and Harry Reid, of Ione, were charged with a like number of counts.

Horace Russell, who was hailed before the grand jury as a witness on one of the many liquor cases, was

given 25 days in the county jail for refusing to answer the questions of that body.

Harry Dillon, who stole a gallon of whisky Monday night and then tried to slash Jeff Neil, proprietor of the Star Hotel, who remonstrated with him for his lawless actions, was sent to jail for 30 days. Jack Knox, who drank too much near-beer and bitters last night and then started a "rough-house" in a Chinese restaurant, throwing a Chinaman through a window and badly cutting his arm, was given 15 days in the county jail. E. West, was fined \$50 for giving liquor to a minor.

BIG BUYS AT MEDFORD.

Honore Palmer Invests \$37,000 More—Dr. Pickel Sells for \$100,000.

MEDFORD, Or., Nov. 12.—A land deal of considerable moment has been closed here by which Honore Palmer, son of the late Chicago millionaire, becomes owner of the Bybee ranch of 1200 acres. This body of land is of the most productive in the county and lies on both sides of the Rogue River, 12 miles north of Medford. This particular section along the Rogue River is the finest fishing grounds on the coast and well-known to many famous fishermen from abroad.

The price paid for the land is \$37,000 cash. Mr. Palmer expects to divide the land into five and ten-acre tracts and place them on the market. Besides this investment, which he made on his recent trip here, he also bought copper mining property located near the well known Blue Ledge Mine, about 20 miles southwest of Medford.

Following the sale to Honore Palmer, comes another one of interest. J. S. Cannon, C. W. Perkins and T. W. Roeder, of Fresno, Cal., purchased Dr. E. B. Pickel's ranch, known as the "401" ranch, and containing 561 acres planted to commercial varieties of apples 1 to 4 years old, and 100 acres ready for planting. The balance is planted to pears. While the exact price has not yet been made public, it is known to be over \$100,000.
