#### DRAIN ENCOURAGED.

DRAIN, Or., Nov. 19.—As an evidence of the early resumption of work on the Oregon Western, commonly known as the Coos Bay branch of the Southern Pacific, from this place to Marshfield, construction of which was begun two years ago, and on which work was stopped about 10 months ago, coincident with that of nearly all similar enterprises throughout the country, the engineer in charge here has ordered that a force of 30 or 40 men be put to work on the public road at places where it is necessary to make new road in lieu of that taken by the railroad right-of-way.
