### LOCAL NEWS.

Oyster season is opened. Olymplan or Eastern in any style and the right kind of style at the Roseburg Hotel, near the S. P. depot. Special Sunday dinner from 5:30 to 7:30 p. m., for 50 cents.

Fearing another beating from her husband if he was given his liberty, Mrs. F. W. Hewes, at Myrtle Creek, Thursday, applied for a peace undertaking against him, and this had the effect of keeping him in jail, where he was lodged Tuesday on the charge of assault with a dangerous weapon upon his two little children. Hewes' father, E. I. Hewes, of this city, who went to Myrtle Creek on Thursday, failed in his attempt to get his son's bond reduced from \$1,500 to \$1,000, but he secured a bond for the larger sum after returning to Roseburg. Upon learning, however, that the authorities were ready to arrest his son upon the peace undertaking, the moment he stepped from jail, Mr. Hewes did not present his bond.

By voting upon the assessment of the property of the Gardiner Mill Company, the Board of Equalization this morning completed its labors for the term, and in a day or two Assessor Staley will complete the summary of the assessment rolls. As in the case of the Southern Pacific Company, passed upon Thursday, Mr. Staley's colleagues, Judge Wonnacott and Clerk Lenox, failed to sustain his assessment upon the Gardiner Mill Co. His figure of \$70,000 upon the sawmill was cut to \$55,000, where it stood in 1907 and 1908. The company's logging plant at Schofield, near Gardiner, was also kept at its former figure—\$10,000, as against an increase to \$20,000 by the assessor—and its logging plant near Scottsburg, which had been overlooked by the deputy assessor in that district, was given a valuation of \$4,000. A dynamo, which Mr. Staley had increased in valuation from \$300 to \$600, was given a compromise rating of \$450.

### Pure Nitrogen.

Chemically pure nitrogen, hitherto believed to be practically unobtainable, is now frozen out of liquid air in the new process of Professor H. Erdmann. When liquid air is evaporated at atmospheric pressure the nitrogen becomes gaseous at 195 degrees below zero and the oxygen at 182 degrees, and an intermediate temperature causes nitrogen to distill off in somewhat impure form. The nearly pure gas serves the purposes for which nitrogen is ordinarily required. The new process makes it possible to obtain the chemically pure, which is done by placing liquid air in a good vacuum, where the rapid vaporization of part of the liquid chills the remainder, solidifying the nitrogen in crystals that can be separated from the liquid oxygen left.

### Increasing Our Ills.

It is rather surprising to hear that a German doctor who has drawn up a list of all the diseases to which the human body is liable has returned the number of them as only 1,100. Any one among whose acquaintances there is an amateur leavitt would have supposed that there were many more ways of being ill than that. Eleven hundred is a very poor figure for these times too. With all the advance made in medicine in the past century one expects something in six figures at least. Still, the number of diseases known is mounting steadily. There are already dozens of ailments, from sleeping sickness to tennis elbow, that our fathers never had.—London News.

### Jews the Kings of Chess.

In 1904 Dr. Laaker became the world's champion chess player by defeating Steinitz by ten games to five. This was a remarkable event, because Steinitz had up to then been a world's champion for twenty-eight years. It follows that the world's championship in chess has been in Jewish hands for no less than forty-two years. Dr. Laaker attributes this predominance of the Jewish genius in chess to the fact that its rules are entirely based upon those of self defense in the struggle of life, and Jews are adepts in this art.—Jewish Chronicle.
