DOOMED TO PERISH

Six Entombed Montana Miners Cannot be Rescued

CARS GRIND MAN TO PIECES

Wife and Children Witness Tragedy—Salm Doctor, Shot by Thug, Will Recover

Special to the Evening Review. BUTTE, Mont., Nov. 21.—All hope of rescuing the six men entombed in the Northwestern Improvement Company's mine at Red Lodge, Mont., has been abandoned. Efforts are now directed toward putting out the fire that is raging. The six doomed men were imprisoned yesterday, when the torch on a miner's cap caused an explosion.

Meets Awful Death. AUBURN, Wash., Nov. 21.—Dragged to death in sight of his wife and three children, who were waiting at the depot to meet him, Horace Felt met an awful fate last night. He was hanging to the guards of a car while the train was running at fast speed over the ties after jumping the track. Striking a cattle guard he lost his hold and was swept under the wheels and ground to pieces.

A Pathetic Death. SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 21.—Survived by a widow and three children, all of whom are seriously ill, Baylis Miller is dead at a hospital here from blood poisoning caused by a silver under his thumb nail.

Cogrove Better. PASO ROBLES, Calif., Nov. 21.—Governor-elect Cogrove, of Washington, is better today than at any time during the last five days. The doctors refuse to make a statement, however. Cogrove passed a restless night and was unable to walk this morning. After being treated to cabinet baths he revived wonderfully and is now resting nicely.

Ruef Jangle Continues. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21.—Incessant wrangling about small matters marked today's session of the Ruef trial, which was devoted to an attempt by the defense to bring out contradictions in Gallagher's testimony relative to the telephone bribery. On direct examination Gallagher testified that the second payment of bribe money was made in Ruef's office, while on cross-examination he said the payment was made in his private office.

Doctor Will Recover. SALEM, Or., Nov. 21.—Dr. C. H. Robertson, who was shot by a foot pad in this city last night, will recover although seriously wounded. The police have arrested a man named Black, suspected of knowing something about the crime.
