GOOD PROGRAM AT THE CRESCENT TODAY.

The management of the Crescent has secured the famous picture "The Life of Abraham Lincoln."

War was declared, and they made Abe their captain, but we soon find Abe back looking for odd jobs here and there. One day he walked into Springfield and they say he didn't have a dollar. He went out of Springfield to become president of the United States.

Isn't this character interesting? If you are old enough to have looked upon Lincoln in real life, you will see a duplicate of him that will make you set up and rub your eyes. Yes, and perhaps thrill you and bring a lump into your throat. Then the final scenes—the tragedy of a nation—the visit to Ford's theatre—the plaudits of the people, and then the assassination—all is pictured to you, all in real. It is one of the greatest historical subjects ever produced. "The New Maid," is the title of the excellent subject to be shown with the Lincoln picture; also two illustrated songs by "Wick," "Under the Evening Star," and "When Jack Comes Sailing Home." GEN. GREENE DEAD.

HOISE, Ida, Nov. 22.—General John Greene, U. S. A., retired, died here suddenly today from neuralgia of the heart. He was in his 84th year. Gen. Greene had a most remarkable career in the army. He was a veteran of the Mexican and Civil wars and was breveted for distinguished gallantry. He participated in the more noteworthy Indian campaigns of the west. For exceptional gallantry displayed during the Modoc wars in California in 1873 he was given a medal of honor by congress. He was retired in 1889.
