SIX YEARS IN CHINA.

Douglas County Boy is Home After Sojourn in the Orient.

After an absence of six years in China, Oscar Gorrell, a Douglas county boy, was greeting old friends in Roseburg this morning. Soon after graduating from the U. of O., a little more than six years ago, Mr. Gorrell departed for Amoy, China, where for about five years he was a teacher in the leading school there. This school is exclusively for Chinese boys, the restrictions of caste forbidding mixed schools—for both boys and girls—in that country. Both native and foreign teachers are employed there, but the school is conducted in the English language. Mr. Gorrell relates some very interesting experiences in bringing these boys to a knowledge of how to speak, read and write the English language. They are, of course, started in a most primitive way, but in the full course of seven years they usually master the regular branches included in the public schools of this country, as well as some of the more important of the high school studies. After once getting started they show a wonderful aptitude in memorizing the various English branches taught. They are especially good in geography and history and master mathematics without great difficulty, some going into algebra and geometry with success. They generally learn to write fairly well and are able to compose and write good business letters in English. Upon graduation there are numerous positions open to them in the customs and postal service of their own country or as clerks and managers of business enterprises. In this school upwards of 300 pupils are enrolled during the year, and the daily attendance often reaches 250.

Desiring a rest from school work, Mr. Gorrell entered the employ of the Standard Oil Co. in the Orient and was stationed at Hong Kong for seven months. His health failing in that hot climate he was transferred back to Amoy by the company. As his health failed to improve satisfactorily he resigned from the service of the Standard Oil Co. some months later and departed for home. Going over he went via San Francisco and Honolulu and returning he came by the northern route, landing first at Victoria, B. C., and thence to Seattle. He visited Japan both going and returning, spending a few days in that country on the way over.

Amoy, including only the walled city, has about 95,000 inhabitants, but in the city grouped outside the walls are upwards of 100,000 more. Canton, about 80 miles by steamer from Hong Kong, up the Pearl river, is a walled city of upwards of 2,000,000 people. Like other Chinese cities its streets are only from six to 15 feet wide, very crooked, and there is no regular system of blocks, as in American cities. They have no sewage systems and the filth is simply indescribable. In consequence the death rate is something enormous.

American trade with China consists mainly of flour and kerosene oil. Some cheap cotton fabrics are sent there but that branch of trade is more largely controlled by Germany and other European countries. As Americans, except the missionaries, are forbidden to live in the interior of China, the advance of trade there-with is not very rapid.

Mr. Gorrell has not yet announced any definite plans for the future but he will not return to China. He returned to Oakland this afternoon to spend Thanksgiving with his mother and brother, Frank Gorrell.

Attired in the uniform of a field marshal, he was riding in an open carriage, when suddenly the attack was made. The guard was equally as quick, however, in coming to the rescue and checked the mob while the carriage returned to the palace.

No Rest for the Public.
PARIS, Nov. 25.—Attorney Bennett, representing Count Boni de Castellane, in a suit filed today for the custody of his children and an allowance of 30,000 francs yearly from his divorced wife, formerly Anna Gould, now Princess De Sagan, makes a serious charge against her. Bennett said he would prove that Anna travelled with De Sagan through Italy and lived with him as his wife before their marriage.

As Blind as Fulton.
COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 25.—Joseph B. Foraker today began his campaign for retention of his seat in the United States Senate. After a conference last night with Senator Dick and Governor A. L. Harris, it is believed that Foraker and Dick endeavored to persuade Harris to enter the senatorial contest as the party candidate against Charles P. Taft, brother of Wm. H. Taft. In an interview today, Foraker announced his opposition to tariff revision.

Berth for Theodore Bell.
LOS ANGELES, Nov. 25.—The report is being circulated here today that Theodore Bell, former congressman and temporary chairman of the recent Democratic National Convention, is soon to become a member of the government's force of attorneys in the fight against the Western Pacific railroad.
