A POINTER FOR ROSEBURG.

Albany Herald: Three years ago all the cities and towns of the Upper Willamette valley engaged in an unreasonable rivalry. A citizen of Eugene couldn't talk the town enough to decide Albany. Corvallis did the same thing and Albany hurled back plenty of uncomplimentary epithets. All characterized Salem as "the slowest town in Oregon." Each town knocked the other. Time has proven that not one of them profited thereby.

Today all the cities of the Upper Valley are animated by the spirit of progress; are joined by the bond of common good. The knocking has ceased. Albany is willing to concede that Eugene has made wonderful progress, that Corvallis is doubling its population and that Salem is in the forefront of the progressive cities of the state. But Albany is growing as fast as any of them and all are thriving in the light of the greatest era of progress which ever swept Western Oregon.

Perhaps the cities have realized that the old system of rivalry doesn't pay.

True, there is a friendly spirit of rivalry yet. But the knocking has stopped. If Albany can't get an enterprise it hopes some other Willamette Valley city can. It will help develop the whole valley and this city will get its share of the common good.

The spirit which animates the cities is also becoming apparent among rival business men. It used to be the custom for a real estate man to discourage deals his competitor was consummating and often this resulted in a new industry or resident being lost to the city altogether. That custom is disappearing and while there may still be room for improvement in the fact that many land agents would much rather see a rival complete a deal than see a prospective resident go to some other city.

DOUGLAS COUNTY GIRL.

Myrtle Tipton Meyers Dies Upon the Birth of Twins at Walla Walla.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Nov. 27.—The body of Mrs. Carl Meyers, formerly Myrtle Tipton, aged 19 years, the notorious woman-in-man's-clothing hornet, ex-convict and well-known character in police circles, lies in Honnoney's undertaking parlors in this city awaiting burial tomorrow.

Clasped in either arm are her twin babies, born with the last breath of their mother. The three will be placed beneath the sod tomorrow, all occupying the same grave.

Myrtle Tipton was several years ago employed on a wheat ranch near Prescott, this county, for more than a year she wore men's clothing and did the work of a man on the farm with no suspicion as to her sex. She was enabled thus to steal horses at various times, making a good "haul" in the business.

Mrs. Meyers was born near Oak Creek, in this county. Her father was Joseph Tipton, who served a term in the Oregon penitentiary for incest. She left here about 16 years ago, going to eastern Oregon.

DECEMBER WEATHER.

The following data, covering a period of 31 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau records at Roseburg, Oregon. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month of December for 31 Years. Mean or normal temperature, 42 degrees; the warmest month was that of 1889, with an average of 47 degrees; the coldest month was that of 1894, with an average of 37 degrees; the highest temperature was 68 degrees on the 8th, 1902; the lowest temperature was 7 degrees on the 21st, 1879; the earliest date on which killing frost occurred in autumn, Sept. 25, 1908; average date on which first killing frost occurred in autumn, Oct. 20th; average date on which last killing frost occurred in spring, Apr. 15th; the latest date on which last killing frost occurred in spring, May 16th, 1894.

Average precipitation for month, 6.24 inches; average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 18; the greatest monthly precipitation was 12.32 inches in 1907; the least monthly precipitation was 1.46 inches in 1902; the greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 3.89 inches on 29th and 30th, 1904; the greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive hours (record extending to winter of 1884-85 only) was 7.5 inches on 29th, 1898.

Average number of clear days, 8; partly cloudy days, 10; cloudy days, 13; the prevailing winds are from the West; the average hourly velocity of the wind is 2.9; the highest velocity of the wind was 48 miles from the Southwest on the 9th, 1878.

FIREBURG 15 YEARS OLD.

Confesses to Destruction of \$35,000 of Baker City Property.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 27.—Fifteen-year-old Goldman Anthony is in jail at Baker City on the charge of arson, having set fire to three school buildings all of which were totally destroyed, and three other buildings, two of which were also completely destroyed. The boy has confessed his guilt and says that he burned the school buildings to "get even" with his teacher, who had reprimanded him; he set fire to the other buildings, he said, because he wanted to see them burn.

The devastations caused by this peculiar firebug approximate a total loss of \$35,000. Five buildings, including the magnificent new North Baker High school, were totally destroyed and the sixth suffered partial destruction. His depredations have continued for a period of more than five months.

This One Only 10 Years. NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—A 10-year-old firebug, suspected of having set three fires in a tenement house, is sought by the police. The latest conflagration was discovered yesterday in time to be checked, but its origin

was so sudden and mysterious that an investigation was begun. A small boy who was seen running from the building shortly after the flames burst forth in the kitchen of a flat is now much wanted.

YOUTH BOUND OVER. COQUILLE, Or., Nov. 27.—Judge John F. Hall, acting as juvenile court judge, found Tom Kinnel, of Myrtle Point, one of the three youths charged with criminally assaulting Miss Adria Lillian Endicott, guilty and remanded him to the grand jury of the circuit court.
