STATE ROAD OPPOSED.

Linn County, However, Falls in Line For Legislative Move.

ALBANY, Or., Dec. 1.—The Linn County Good Roads Association was organized in this city this afternoon at a big enthusiastic good roads convention, attended by about 200 representative men from all parts of the county. The association was formed for the general betterment of the roads of Linn County, but its special purpose will be the consideration of road legislation to be proposed at the next session of the Oregon legislature. Another convention will be held here Dec. 11 for this purpose.

The proposed plan for a road across the state north and south did not receive much discussion, but the sentiment of the convention appeared to be opposed to the plan.

County Judge J. N. Duncan was elected president of the association and other officers were chosen as follows: Secretary, ex-County Judge C. H. Stewart; treasurer, State Senator Frank J. Miller; vice-presidents, County Commissioner T. J. Butler, of Albany, J. A. Wallace, of Selo, M. L. Foster, of Tangent, Will Grimes, of Harbinger, and R. E. Houston, of Albany.

The convention met this afternoon in the courthouse. County Judge Duncan presided and made the opening address, introducing John H. Scott, of Salem, president of the Oregon Good Roads Association, who made the chief address of the day.

Move for State Road. The good roads convention called for today is bringing hundreds of people to Kalama.

The object of the meeting is to take the initiative toward securing a road through the state from Hellingham, via Tacoma, Seattle and way points, to Kalama, thence to Vancouver, in this state, and then to the city of Portland. To build such a highway would require at least \$800,000.

MINING CONGRESS OPENS.

Has Many Objects—May Start War on Standard Oil Co.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 2.—With every mineral and metal producing state from the Atlantic to the Pacific represented by distinguished delegates, the American Mining Congress opened its 14th annual session in the Sucky City today. It is estimated that the delegates and visitors number a thousand and this attendance is expected to be doubled by Friday, when the governors and mine experts of all coal states will hold a conference for the purpose of promoting uniform state legislation for protecting the lives of miners and protecting the fuel supply from waste.

Proposals for elimination of fraudulent mining stock operations, the relation between custom smelters and the ore producers; federal aid for mining schools and experiment stations; the exploitation of the rare mineral resources of the country; the conservation of mineral resources, timber and water supply and unification of the mining laws of the several states are the particular subjects which will be under discussion.

One of the leading objects of the congress is the enactment of adequate laws for the prevention of false mining schemes. It has been successful in having stringent laws passed by some of the states covering this subject, and it is the intention to in time have every state enact a law which will guarantee protection to legitimate mining interests.

Sensational developments are expected to follow the assertion of Secretary Calbraith that the Standard Oil Co. is rapidly securing control of the output of the mines of the country through its alliance with the smelter trust.

According to Calbraith, John D. Rockefeller is slowly but surely gaining control of the mineral resources of the United States. Through his alliance with the transportation trust and the smelter trust, which is in reality an adjunct of the Standard Oil Co., Rockefeller can now tell nearly every miner in the United States what he must take for his ore.

The smelter trust has patented methods of ore reduction and ore reduction machinery until miners are compelled to ship ore to the trust and take its estimate of value.

Calbraith believes he has a remedy. He wants the senate to pass the bill establishing a bureau of mines, which has already been passed by the House of Representatives. He will urge on the mining congress that pressure be brought upon the senate to secure the passage of this bill.

When the bureau of mines is established, the fight is just begun, says Calbraith. The struggle will then be to secure annual appropriations for the use of the bureau of mines to be used in experimenting on methods of ore reduction for the benefit of the whole people.

STRIFE HOLDS BACK CITY.

Citizens to Settle Liquor Question in Medford at Election.

Medford (Or.) Tribune: To let the people of Medford say whether the city should remain wet or dry, and have their decision binding upon the city council, thus removing the wet and dry fight from the council by placing the issue squarely before the citizens, is the object of an initiative petition calling for a prohibition election at the city election in January, that is being freely signed by business men and will be filed in a few days. The movement meets with general favor, as it will end the petty factional fights that have waged since the June election, and enable the selection of a business administration, free from prohibition or liquor influence.

The petition was started by the wet forces, but is being freely signed by all who have wearied of the constant agitation and discord which threatens to keep the community divided, and prevent the unity of action desirable in the upbuilding of a city. As long as the wet and dry fight holds the boards, far more important business will be neglected, while valuable time is lost in wrangles over the liquor problem.
