TO SAVE THE FORESTS.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 9.—To save the forests of the northern states is the object of the Lake States Forestry Commission, which commenced its second annual meeting in Madison today.

The Lake States Forestry Association was formed at Saginaw one year ago. This convention was called by representatives of Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota, but this year the states of Indiana, Pennsylvania, New York, Illinois, and Ontario, Canada, have been invited to participate.

It is pointed out by the leaders in the movement that the unusual losses by forest fires during this year emphasize the importance of co-ordinated action in any enactment affecting the forests and their protection by all states represented in this conference and especially the lumbering states and provinces.

WORLD'S CORN SHOW.

200,000 Square Feet of Space Covered at Omaha—Some Figures.

OMAHA, Dec. 9.—With 200,000 square feet of space devoted to the display of corn, grain, grasses, agricultural implements and machinery, the National Corn Show was opened here today. Nearly 100,000 ears of prize corn are on exhibition and form the feature of the great show, although other products have been given much space. The exposition serves as a clearing house for the best grains and grasses from a score of states.

Statistics as to corn culture show that the Mississippi valley is the center of the corn industry, more of the grain being raised in this comparatively restricted district than in all of the rest of the world.

Illustrating the value of the corn crop, figures are presented to show that it would only take eight crops like that grown this year to duplicate every mile of steam railroads in the United States, and then there would be enough left to buy all the terminals and the rolling stock.

The principal display of corn is in the Omaha Auditorium, erected at a cost of \$50,000. One of the features of the show will be the government demonstrations in the manufacture of denatured alcohol, for which an appropriation of \$10,000 was made by congress.

In the "alfalfa palace" is shown exhibits of grasses, and in the industrial exposition buildings, manufacturers of corn products have installed plants for demonstrating the uses of corn.
