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DECEMBER 10, 1908. CANNERY IS NEEDED.

The Best Way to Boost is to Establish Industries.

Roseburg, Ore., Dec. 9, 1908. Editor Review:—

I see in your paper that Mr. John Welsh was here in the interest of a company that is looking into the prospects for a fruit cannery being built here. I think it is almost the universal opinion that a cannery is badly needed in Roseburg. Talk about booting the way to boost a town is to get in and do something. That will show the people that we mean business as well as talk business. I have talked with several persons who are very anxious to know what is going to be done about building a cannery. One man said that if he was sure a cannery would be built he would put out a thousand Royal Anne and Bing cherry trees this winter. Another said he would take a contract to furnish 1000 bushels of tomatoes at 50 cents per bushel. Another man said he was on a deal for a six-acre tract of land at \$100 per acre, and that he would have no hesitation in closing the deal if he knew there would be a cannery built here. Still another said he could buy good hill land, set it out to strawberries and pay for it with the first crop. He could do this, even at \$150 per acre, if there was a cannery here. He said it was up-hill business raising berries and shipping them to Portland, for the express charges and the commission men generally got away with the biggest part of the proceeds.

When I was in Illinois a few years ago I visited a cannery at Eureka, and was much interested in the way it was operated. The company had 1800 acres of sweet corn of their own and had contracted for about 2,000 acres more, besides what tomatoes, peas, beans and other things they worked on. They were working on corn when I was there. The corn was hauled in just as it was picked and about 25 persons were busy husking and silking it. Then it was sent on an endless chain elevator to the top of the building, where it was cooked and removed from the cob, passed down to the lower floor, put into cans and sealed up at the rate of about 60 every minute. Thus they handled about 3600 cans per hour, or 36,000 per day of ten hours.

Now, suppose Roseburg had such a cannery as that. Don't you think that would boost some? It would furnish work for 100 to 150 hands, saying nothing about those it would take to raise the fruit, berries and vegetables to supply the cannery. I know some of the old moon-backs will say it is too big an undertaking and we can't do it. Why not? I am told there is more than \$500,000 deposited in the Roseburg banks, and it would take only a very small percent of that amount to build and equip a cannery large enough to work up all our surplus fruit and berries and other products that would be raised. I have heard it reported that the Sutherland Land and Water Co. are negotiating with parties in regard to putting in a cannery. They could do nothing else that would boost their enterprise any more. But there is plenty of room for a cannery at Roseburg also, and plenty of material to work on.

As Roseburg in the near future is bound to be the railroad center of Southern Oregon, the more manufactures we can start the better it will be for us. There is no doubt that there will be an electric road built from Roseburg to Coos Bay in a very few years, and it makes no difference whether it is built on the Coos Valley route or via Myrtle Point, it is sure to come to Roseburg anyway. So let us get to work and build a cannery, build good roads and pave the streets. Then when people come to look at this country we will have something to attract their attention. We could double the population of Roseburg and the entire valley every five or six years, for we have the best of climate, soil that will produce everything in abundance and the purest water in Oregon. All we want is manufacturers to work up what is produced and then we will see Douglas County forge ahead as she has never done before.

ADMINISTRATORS NAMED.

Will of R. D. Hume, Rogue River Salmon King, Not yet Probated

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 9.—Mary M. Hume and Charles H. Warner were today granted special letters of administration in the Superior Court over the estate in California of R. D. Hume, who died in Oregon on Nov. 25. The petition stated that there would be some delay in probating the will and that it is desirable that the petitioners, who are named as the executors in the will, should have the legal right to take charge of the property.

The estate here, according to the petition, consists of real and personal property, including stocks and bonds and horses. The horses are thoroughbreds that are now quartered at the Emeryville track. Judge Coffey granted the special letters as requested and placed the administrators under \$10,000 bonds each. Amy Creed, one of the petitioners' attorneys, stated tonight that he had no idea as to the value of the estate in California. He also stated that the will, when it is filed, will be probated in Oregon, and that a copy will be filed in the San Francisco court.

OREGON NEWS.

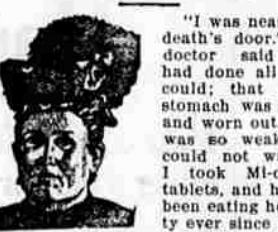
Senator C. W. Fulton has introduced bills appropriating \$2,500,000 for a public building in Portland, \$500,000 for a public building in Astoria, \$100,000 for a public building in Oregon City; also to create Sadie Mountain National Park in the western division of the Blue Mountain forest reserve, and providing for repayment of fees and purchase money to land entrymen whose entries have been declared void. This makes the second time that Senator Fulton has introduced a bill carrying with it an appropriation of \$2,500,000 for a new postoffice building for Portland. If the appropriation is passed the money will be used for the purchase of a site and for the building.

L. J. Simpson has been re-elected mayor of North Bend, defeating Chas. Kiser, by a large majority. Mr. Simpson is the only man who has ever been mayor of North Bend since the city was incorporated six years ago.

President L. M. Gilbert, of the Northwestern Prune Association, the new organization of growers, reports that practically all of the association's pool, 40 carloads, has been sold at a price netting the growers better than five cents a pound for the 30-40 size.

E. E. Redfield, of Glendale, inventor of automatic shotguns and rifles and of half a dozen ingenious devices, has just returned from Chelope Falls, Mass., where he made arrangements with the Stevens Arms & Tool Co. for the manufacture of his latest invention, the "visible loading repeating rifle." This new gun will be placed upon the market next year and it is expected to become the best selling small bore rifle ever manufactured.
