WHERE WINTER IS REAL.

And still the news comes trickling in regarding the severe storms throughout the Eastern and Middle States. Snow abounds everywhere and in many localities blizzards are raging. In Oregon there is nothing but sunshine—and sometimes a little fog, but what is that to four feet of snow and a gale of wind blowing at the rate of ninety miles an hour, which is liberally seasoned with particles of ice? OREGON GETS \$25,854.30.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10.—The general land office has made public its account with Oregon for the year ending June 30, 1908. Gross proceeds from the sale of public lands were \$540,881.58, from which amount is deducted the pro rata share of expenses chargeable to the state of \$10,849.26, making the net proceeds \$517,086.99 of which amount the state is entitled to 5 per cent or \$25,854.30.

DON'T WANT NAMES IN PAPERS

The Lane County Medical Society at its last meeting, passed the following resolutions:
"Resolved, that members of the Lane County Medical Society forbid their names being used in connection with the reports of any medical or surgical cases in local papers.

BUILDING IN COTTAGE GROVE.

Messrs. Dunbar & O'Loone will erect a three-story brick building on their property, with a basement. Plans are now in preparation, and a thoroughly up-to-date structure will be built. The basement will be of concrete and the three stories of pressed brick. A fine glass front will be put in and an electric elevator and steam heat will also come in with the modern utilities of the store. The basement will contain the grocery department, the ground floor the dry goods and the clothing, the second floor the ladies' ready-to-wear garments and shop rooms, and the third floor will contain furniture and carpets. The building, aside from the ground purchase, is estimated to cost between \$8700 and \$9000 complete, and will be another substantial improvement to this growing little city.

The Garman-Hemenway Co. will move to their newly acquired property about the first of February. Mr. Lincoln will move as soon as he finds a location and workmen will remodel the interior of the present building, placing in a plate glass front and a balcony around the room. Work on the new brick will commence about the 1st of May, the coming spring, as soon as the weather permits. The present structure will be moved to the side street and Garmen-Hemenway Co. will continue doing business in it until their new building is finished. This is an unexpected change in the building contemplated in this city, and with the present building in course of construction and those to start in the spring, a greater activity than the place has ever before seen will have started. Let the good work go on.—Ex.

LA FOLLETTE'S MAGAZINE.

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 11.—Senator La Follette, following in the footsteps of William J. Bryan and other literary statesmen, will shortly begin the publication of a new weekly magazine. The periodical will make its initial appearance within two or three weeks, probably during the Christmas holidays. The new journal will be devoted largely to politics, but will have also literary features.

CONVENTION OF HOBOES.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 11.—A call for a national convention of the unemployed, to be held in this city on January 15, has been issued by James Eads How, founder of the Brotherhood Welfare Association. It is expected that during the convention week St. Louis will be the Mecca for hoboos and unemployed men from all over the country, and standing room will be at a premium in box cars and other conveyances utilized by the men of the road. How intends to secure a monster petition, to be sent to the president, asking that

the petitioners be given employment in public work and on farms under the direction of the government.

Isaac Watkins, an old pioneer of Douglas county, died Dec. 8, 1908, at the home of his son, John Watkins, living near Comstock.

Mr. Watkins was born in Lima county, Ohio, Sept. 12, 1820. He crossed the plains in 1852 and again in 1864, settling on Elk Creek in the fall of 1865. He was married three times, in 1841 to Miss Mary Goans, in 1848 to Miss Mary Merley and in 1886 to Mrs. Eliza Hoffman.

Ten children survive him as follows: Mrs. Sarah E. Bennett, Mrs. Mary Bennett, Mrs. Susan Driscoll, Mrs. Eliza-Rose James, Benjamin L., John Christopher, William and Lash Watkins.
