### PLANS TO SPEND \$150,000.

Improvement Spirit at Marshfield is Strong—Interurban Line

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 12.—Mayor Shaw has sent to the Marshfield city council a special message urging that preliminary steps be taken at once for the improvement of a score or more of the city streets so that actual work can begin as early as possible in the spring. During 1908, 14 of the streets of the city have been improved, bituminous rock pavement being placed on those in the business district. Over four miles of new streets have been opened and the street work aggregated a cost of over \$70,000. The improvements now under way are estimated to cost \$28,700. The council contemplates \$150,000 worth of public improvements for next year. Paying in to cost \$50,000, excavation work and plank streets \$15,000 and sewers \$55,000.

### To Link Bay Towns.

Representatives of the Coos Bay, Railway and Terminal Company state that the work of building an electric railway on Coos Bay will begin early next Spring. All that is now desired by the company before starting on a \$500,000 expenditure is a franchise to run cars through Marshfield.

The road, according to the company's plans, is to extend from North Bend to Marshfield and then on to Millington and from North Bend on across Pony inlet to Empire, and on down the coast to Sunset Bay, which is being made a summer resort and where L. J. Simpson has erected a handsome summer home.

The company has advertised for bids for the construction of a tunnel 420 feet long in North Bend to go under Montana avenue, so it is assumed that the building of the road from North Bend to the coast will proceed regardless of whether the
