URGES LIBEL SUIT

Roosevelt Sends Another Message to Congress

AIMED AT EDITOR PULITZER

New York World Insulted That Somebody Crafted \$20,000,000 on Canal Purchase

Special to the Evening Review. WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—Asking the government to prosecute Joseph Pulitzer, publisher of the New York World, for libel upon the ground that the good name of the United States had been besmirched in connection with charges of fraud in the purchase of the Panama Canal rights of a French company, for \$40,000,000, President Roosevelt today sent a vigorously worded message to Congress, accompanying it with all the records and documents involved in the transaction. The message says in part: "In view of the constant reiteration of the assertion that there was some corrupt action by or on behalf of the United States government in the acquisition of the canal rights, I deem it wise to submit to congress all the information I have. The stories were first brought to my attention as published in the Indianapolis News. These stories are scurrilous, libelous and false. Delavan Smith, the publisher of the Indianapolis News, sheltered himself behind the excuse that he accepted the statements of the New York World. The real offender is Pulitzer. A great injury is blackening the good name of the American people, and it should not be left for a private citizen to sue Pulitzer; he should be prosecuted for libel by the government."

The conclusions of The World as to the disposal of the remaining \$20,000,000 form the alleged basis for the libel suit. Regarded as a Joke. In the senate the president's message was enjoyed as a huge joke, particularly that part of the message regarding the purchase. Fairbanks lessened the merriment to some degree by rapping for order, and after the personal part of the message had been read the senators paid no further attention, neither would they listen to the details of the purchase. Cannon's Close Call. A motion to curtail the powers of Speaker Cannon, made by Gardner, of Massachusetts, by reforming the rules, was defeated in the House today by a vote of 149 to 136.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 15.—A bill will be presented to the Oregon legislature this winter asking for an administrative water system in this state. This was assured yesterday at an extended conference between the members of the Oregon Conservation Commission and the various water users of the state. The proposed law will be modeled after that in force in Wyoming, where water rights are adjudicated and determined by a state board of control and regulated by the same authority. In the operation of such a law, vested rights already adjudicated by the courts, will not be disturbed. Under the Wyoming law the state has a board of control by which water rights are established and regulated. This board consists of five members, appointed by the governor. Appointees on the board must first have passed an examination conducted by the State Engineer before becoming eligible to serve. When the board has adjusted the rights of conflicting interests of the water supply in any stream, the party dissatisfied with the adjustment has the right within 60 days to appeal from the decision of the board to the courts. The expense of such an administration of the water system of his state is between \$20,000 and \$25,000, while the service concerned not less than 20,000 consumers. Under the operation of the Wyoming law, the longest time required for the adjustment of any controversy respecting the appropriation of water from a stream was only 18 months, while the system gave very general satisfaction, as was evidenced from the fact that only infrequently were appeals taken by either of the rival interests to the courts.

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John M. A. Laue, chairman of the state board of pharmacy, has resigned his position as a member of the board. Gov. Chamberlain has not yet returned from Washington, so it is not definitely known who will succeed Mr. Laue, but it is almost certain that Senator Frank H. Caldwell, of Yamhill county, will be appointed. Mr. Laue resigned because he has retired from the retail drug business and is conducting a school of pharmacy.

Although wounded, the woman felled Van Sicklin with a chair, pummeled him with her fists and held him until the police arrived. The woman is 23 years of age. She was divorced in Seattle nine months ago. Later she met Campbell in Victoria and the pair came to San Francisco with the intention of getting married.

KACCOMA Corpse; Now Sorry. TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 15. Mrs. F. E. Kilgore, wife of a musician, is seriously ill of erysipelas as the result of kissing a young woman after death. Her nose and face are badly swollen.

Senator Reed Dead. NORTH YAKIMA, Wash., Dec. 15.—State Senator Walter J. Reed, who has been in ill health for many months, died last night.

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Dec. 15.—After futile attempts to hold meetings in Seattle and Everett, Emma Goldman, the "anarchist queen," and Ben Reitman, the "king of tramps," were escorted by police to the train today under the promise never to return to Bellingham. The pair was arrested last night on the charge of trying to hold an anarchist meeting. When brought into court this morning they were placed under \$5,000 bonds to keep the peace, but the couple were released on the promise to leave the city.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 15.—The Methodist Ministerial Association has joined in the fight begun by State Senator Ole Hansen against horse racing at "The Meadows" next year. It will probably maintain a lobby at the legislature next month. Hansen has received letters from 250 ministers, pledging their support.

Geo. E. Cook, formerly of Butte, Mont., but now of Hollywood, Cal., left for home today, after transacting some timber business in this city.

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\$2,400 FOUND IN MAIL

East Side Bank Robber Fails to Get Batch of Booty at Ogden

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 15.—Fifty secret service agents and private detectives are at work on what is believed to be the first live trail yet found of the three robbers who took nearly \$15,000 from the East Side Bank a week ago. At the same time negotiations are under way whereby the East Side Bank may recover \$2,400 of the stolen money.

This money is now in the hands of the postal authorities at Ogden, Utah, and at the same place the live trail of at least one of the robbers has developed.

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GUILTY SAYS JURY

Cusick Swore Falsely Before Roseburg Land Office

LAW MAY LET HIM ESCAPE

Supreme Court Holds Statute Under Which He Was Tried Applies Only to Pensions

Special to the Evening Review. PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 15.—Albert L. Cusick, of Jackson County, who is charged with perjury in connection with an application for timber land at the United States land office at Roseburg, was today found guilty by a jury in the Federal Court. He was granted 15 days in which to file an appeal to the Supreme Court, which body yesterday handed down a decision that may permit Cusick to escape on a technicality. The decision of the higher court is that the Federal Statute, No. 4746, relating to a false affidavit and under which the indictment against Cusick was returned, applies only to applications for pensions. In the lower court, Judge Wolverton, by his decision, held that the section covered any violation of the law in regard to making of false affidavits under any one of the nine different departments of the department of the interior. He also held that the rules and regulations issued by the Interior Department adopted to cover violations of land matters, was a law, just as if it had been incorporated into the statutes.

The decision of the Supreme Court also affects the case of J. H. Parker, the Baker City banker, who was convicted in Portland a few days ago on a charge similar to that preferred against Cusick.

Cusick, it was charged, filed on four claims during the rush at the Roseburg land office on April 14 last. Cusick was not satisfied with trying to land one claim, but took a gambler's chance and filed on four that had already been filed upon by homesteaders, with the hope that he would get one out of the four.

How to Tobacco Trust. NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—The American Tobacco Company is declared an illegal combination, operating in restraint of trade, in a final decree issued today by the United States Circuit Court in the suit filed by the government. The company is enjoined from engaging in the interstate trade of leaf tobacco or any of its products or articles used in connection with the tobacco trade. An appeal will be taken to the United States Supreme Court.
