LONGBOAT WINS MARATHON.

Dorando Again Collapses—Pappe and Kelly Fight to a Draw.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—As on the memorable occasion of his first Olympiad, Dorando Pietri collapsed within sight of the goal tonight and Tom Longboat, the Indian runner, who had been led by a yard or more nearly all the way, won the Marathon race at Madison-Square Garden. The race was hard fought from start to finish and kept the thousands of spectators, in wild excitement. At 25 miles Dorando was leading by two yards. A moment before Longboat had made a remarkable spurt and put himself on an even footing with the little Italian. Dorando immediately regained first position, and the men were fighting it out in the 25th mile with Dorando in the lead, but visibly weaker.

The chances of Longboat appeared to improve in the second and third laps. In the fourth lap, while the crowd was crying itself hoarse, both men slackened speed perceptibly. Then suddenly Dorando staggered and dropped. Longboat finished alone.

His time for the distance of 26 miles, 385 yards was 2 hours, 45 minutes and 5 2-5 seconds.

A Fast Prizefight.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 15.—After 25 rounds of furious fighting the contest between Billy Pappe and Hugo Kelly was declared a draw. The fighting was very fast in the first four rounds. In the fourth Pappe knocked Kelly down for a count of eight. Otherwise the honors were about even.

STEAM DALLIES CITY SINKS.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 15.—The Regulator Line steamer Dalles City, Capt. Scammon, sunk near Carson yesterday afternoon. The vessel struck a rock while attempting to land at that point while a heavy down stream wind was blowing, and a large hole was torn in her bottom. Capt. Scammon succeeded in driving the vessel so far ashore that she settled in three feet of water. Her fires were put out, but little of her 50-ton cargo was damaged. A small-sized panic was created among the passengers, but their fears were quieted by the master and officers of the boat.

"BASKETBALL IMMORAL."

ABERDEEN, Wash., Dec. 15.—To supplant athletics and especially basketball, which he considers as "morally detrimental to girls," N. D. McKillop, county superintendent-elect, proposes to introduce manual training, domestic economy and agriculture in every school in Chehalis county. "Personally I am opposed to athletics on the ground that it does not help those who need the physical benefit," says McKillop. "The strong and athletic boys or girls are selected for these sports, while the weak ones, who really require this kind of training, never get it. They must look elsewhere. They will get physical training through the agricultural and manual training plan. Basketball I regard as morally detrimental to girls."

Eugene Guano, Deputy Sheriff Grover returned last night from Canyonville, Douglas County, where Al. Pander and E. C. Hesse, charged with the theft of a team etc. Loggery from Tom Bailey's livery stable in Eugene, had been arrested by City Marshal Cardwell, of Canyonville. The men were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Bryson this forenoon. Pander, who hired the rig with the ostensible object of going to Elmira but ran away with it, waived examination and was bound over to appear for trial in the circuit court. He wanted to plead guilty and be sentenced so he could go to the penitentiary on this morning's train, but he was told that he would have to wait until circuit court convenes. Hesse, who claims to have been overtaken on the road by Pander, will be given an examination as soon as Bailey returns with the rig. It is highly probable that he will be discharged from custody as it appears that he in no way connected with the theft of the outfit.

Manie Neyman, a 15-year-old girl, whose parents reside in North Roseburg, has been committed to the care of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, in Portland, because of incorrigibility. The girl came into public notice a year ago by leaving home and walking to Oakland, taking along a girl younger than herself. They were captured at Oakland and brought back here. County Judge Wagonet, desirous of giving the girl a chance to mend her behavior, allowed her to go to the home of her sister at Curtin Spur, in the north end of the county, and there she remained until last September, when she returned to Roseburg. Several weeks ago the girl began staying out late at nights—sometimes past the midnight hour. The remonstrances of her parents were of no effect, so they appealed to Judge Wagonet, who decided that the only thing left to do was to commit the girl to the care of the aid society.

Over \$30 in money and a pocket knife constituted the booty secured by an audacious thief in the Oregon Rooming House, Mrs. Fred Schwartz, proprietress, and in Mrs. M. Troxel's lodging house, on Sheridan street, near the S. P. depot, between 8 and 9 o'clock Tuesday morning. Boldly entering Mrs. Troxel's place, the thief quietly tried the locked door of a room occupied by Mrs. Ray Troxel, and when she opened the door the man asked her if a certain person (giving a fictitious name) roomed there. She told him no and closed the door. A few minutes later, Mrs. Troxel heard somebody moving about on tip-toe in the hall way, and upon opening her door again saw the stranger leaving the building. Five minutes later at the Oregon Rooming House, a short distance from Mrs. Troxel's, Mrs. Schwartz unlocked the door of her room to get some change for a lodger who had paid his room rent. Securing what change she needed from a cash box in her dresser, she left the room without relocking the door, and when she returned there not over three minutes later the cash box and its contents were missing. The box was found at the bottom of the stairway in the front of the building. It had contained between \$30 and \$35 in money. It was undoubtedly taken by the same fellow who visited the Troxel place, as he was seen, upon leaving there, going toward the Oregon Rooming House. At Mrs. Troxel's place, the thief entered the room of a railroad man who was fast asleep and rifled his trousers, but got only a pocket knife for his trouble. The southbound flyer which left here ten minutes after the robbery carried two men on the "blind," and it is believed that one of these was the thief. A good description of him has been wired to the officers of the towns south of here.
