ARE READY TO QUIT.

Fulton Men Privately Admit Fight Is Lost Against Statement No. 1.

Portland Journal: President Roosevelt, by his outspoken utterances on the Oregon senatorial question; President-elect Taft by his refusal to take a hand in the contest, and National Chairman Hitchcock by his silence, have put a quietus on the anti-Statement No. 1 movement, backed by Senator Fulton and his lieutenants, to break down the Statement No. 1 majority in the legislature and defeat Governor Chamberlain before that body. The insurrectionists, privately, have thrown down their hands, though in public they still look wise and predict mysterious things as about to happen.

J. H. Brown, the most active of the Fulton men who have been working for the Fulton scheme, has returned from the east, where he witnessed the failure of his chief in the effort to gain help from the men at the head of the government. Brown's hands are high above his head, so those who talked with him say.

"What's the use?" says Brown. "There's nothin' doin'." Hitchcock wanted to butt in, but Roosevelt and Taft wouldn't let him. Fulton went to Taft and Taft wouldn't come through and now Roosevelt has kicked in on the wrong side. What's the use, anyway? It's all off."

View in General.

That is just about the universal view. Public sentiment in Oregon was against the movement from the first. Public sentiment throughout the east echoed the voice of the people of Oregon. President Roosevelt mirrored the sentiment of all honest men when he greeted Governor Chamberlain in the White House as "Governor Chamberlain and senator-to-be."

The insurrectionist forces have at last been forced to see what every one else saw from the first that their cause was hopeless and had neither the sympathy nor the support of men of honorable intentions and high ideals of civic righteousness.

This condition is most clearly shown by the change in the line of battle now being mapped out by the men working for the organization of the legislature. Statement No. 1 and the senatorial question in all of its phases should be eliminated from the organization fight, say those who a short time ago were howling anti-Statement No. 1. They are taking up the personal liberty slogan and beginning to chorus that every man in the legislature ought to be allowed to vote for United States senator according to the pledges he has given, uninfluenced and without pressure upon him.

McArthur to Quit.

C. N. McArthur, who has been the Fulton candidate for speaker of the house, has come to the conclusion that Fulton is a "dead one," so the story goes, and is willing, nay, anxious, to assure his colleagues of the house that he wants to and intends to keep his hands off any movement to break down the Statement No. 1 majority, or place any pressure by promise or place on Statement No. 1 men. He wants to get in the hand wagon on an even seat with Bean, of Lane, who he considers has won an advantage by his statement that he would not allow the senatorial question to enter his fight for the speaker'ship since that question had been settled by the people of the state in June.

McArthur is now willing, according to the story, to sign up an agreement with members of the house pledging them that he will keep his hands off the senatorial fight, and not allow his office or his official influence to be used for the defeat of Chamberlain in the event of his election.

Startling Revelation of Lack of Accommodations for Consumptives.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Fifteen thousand beds and 600,000 patients, or 400 consumptives for every bed, is a statement made today by the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in its investigation as to the need of beds for

destitute consumptives in the United States.

Gathering statistics from every state in the country and from every hospital in which any provision whatever is made for tuberculosis patients, it has been found that the total number of beds provided, both by public and private resources, is less than 15,000. Over against these figures, the National Association has placed the fact that there are, according to the estimate of the United States Bureau of the Census, at least 600,000 living cases of tuberculosis in this country, and that at least 200,000 persons die from this disease every year.

The Adirondack region in New York state; Colorado, and particularly the regions about Denver and Colorado Springs; New Mexico, Arizona and the Southwest; and North Carolina, are the principal resorts for consumptives. The recent demonstrations of experts, however, that tuberculosis can be cured in any climate, has led to a considerable distribution of the bed capacity and has called into existence a large number of small sanatoria, hospitals and day camps, some of them with a capacity of only six beds. This is shown by the fact that, while the number of sanatoria during the last four years has more than doubled, the increase in the number of beds has only been about 50 per cent.

The most striking fact emphasized by the investigation is that, while the lack of beds for all classes of consumptives is so manifest throughout the country, the number of beds needed for advanced cases is far greater than the number needed for all the other stages put together. Of the 15,000 beds at present available for all classes of consumptives, less than 5,000 are for advanced stages. Computing that there are at least 200,000 living cases in the advanced stages of tuberculosis in the United States at the present time, the need for a large number of additional beds for this most deserving class is evident. The need for accommodation for advanced cases is further emphasized by the fact that every expert and specialist has agreed on this conclusion, that consumption will never be eradicated until the advanced cases are isolated, either in their homes or in institutions. Dr. Koch says: "Every case of tuberculosis should be isolated as long as bacilli are there." Dr. Arthur Newsholme, one of the best English specialists on tuberculosis, says that the only way in which the death rate from consumption can be reduced is by segregating all advanced cases, because these are the centers of infection from which the disease spreads.

It is not difficult, the National Association affirms, to cure consumption in its early stages, but it is impossible to effect a cure in the latter stages of the disease, and, consequently, these cases should be removed or isolated in their homes in order to prevent the infection of persons living with them. But they cannot be removed or isolated unless hospitals are provided for that purpose, and

with this end in view, a campaign to secure more accommodations for advanced cases of tuberculosis is being carried on all over the country. When enough beds are provided, it is estimated that the death rate from consumption will be cut in half and there will be an annual saving to the country of 100,000 lives.

OREGON NEWS.

Ernest Nye, the 9-year-old son of Lyman Nye, was drowned in the Alsea river Monday. The family resides eight miles above Waldport and all travel between home and town is done by boat. The boy was missed shortly after dinner and as he had been seen going toward the boat, where it had lodged against some brush.

C. M. Gittings, of Albany, Or., a wealthy capitalist, has purchased the entire delinquent tax list, as it appears on the assessment rolls of Linn county for 1907. The prices paid aggregate \$17,000. Certificates of delinquency have been issued him and under the provisions of the new laws regulating the sale of property for delinquent taxes these will bear interest at the rate of 15 per cent per annum and the tax lien can be foreclosed the same as a chattel mortgage at the expiration of three years, should the lands not be redeemed. In the event of an erroneous assessment or other error appearing in the description, due to inaccuracies traceable to the Assessor or other county officials in making the roll, the county is obliged to repay to the purchaser the sum paid therefor, with the addition of interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum.

Ira Bidwell, an employe of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company in the sawmill at Springfield, lost his right hand Thursday by accidentally getting it caught between the rollers of an edger. He was taken to Eugene and the amputation completed at the hospital. A peculiar circumstance in connection with the accident is that a few minutes previous T. A. Rathbun got one of his hands caught in the same piece of machinery and several fingers were ground off. While the doctors were dressing his wound Bidwell's accident occurred.

At Albany, Thursday, Fred Peacock, a liveryman, in whose stables a drayload of beer was seized last Tuesday, was fined \$100. Notice of appeal was given and the bond fixed at \$500, which was immediately furnished.
