HIGH FREIGHT RUINOUS. California Shippers Argue Thus Without Moving Their Masters.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18.—Protesting that the proposed increase in tariffs on California products will be ruinous to a majority of commercial firms of the state, representatives of the shippers appeared today in the office of H. A. Jones, freight traffic manager of the Southern Pacific, together with Edward Chambers, assistant traffic manager of the Santa Fe road.

What measures will be taken have not as yet been announced. It is rumored that there is under consideration a move on the part of certain shippers to enjoin the roads in the courts from raising the rates on their particular commodities.

The shippers were unable to obtain any satisfaction from the railroad officials but believe that the roads' announcement of their tariff schedules will be made next Saturday.

OBJECT TO PLAN AND \$250 "PER" FOR KELSEY

Eugene Citizens File Injunction Suit, Following Defeat of \$500,000 Bond Proposition.

EUGENE, Or., Dec. 18.—Following on the heels of the rebuke administered to the common council on October 1 by the voters of Eugene in defeating the proposed \$500,000 bond issue with which to finance the proposed Ritchey Creek municipal gravity system, comes an injunction filed today against that body by representative citizens of Eugene, who seek to enjoin the council from proceeding with the project to construct a power plant on the McKenzie river and to restrain the defendants, Mayor J. D. Matlock, and W. T. Campbell, R. M. Day, W. I. Cheshire and P. D. Newell, from "pretending to act as a Board of Water Commissioners for the City of Eugene."

The injunction is filed in the Circuit Court and the plaintiffs to the complaint are S. Sneed, F. M. Wilkins, Eli Bangs, W. Kuykendall, D. A. Paine, J. W. Shumate, F. L. Chambers, F. W. Osborn and T. G. Hendricks, capitalists and prominent business men of the city.

There is strong talk of organizing a Business Men's League to take an active part in municipal affairs.

The Beamon Lumber Company is planning to take to San Diego next summer the largest log raft ever floated on the Pacific ocean. The big raft, which is now being constructed, is to be 1000 feet in length and from 50 to 60 feet in width.

MILLIONS FOR GIFTS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Between the first and the twenty-fifth of December the American people will part with \$100,000,000. It will go to the buying of Christmas gifts.

The average reader has no conception of the immensity of the Christmas trade. In New York there are a half dozen big express companies, each of which has cars of its own, freight yards and piers, scores of stables thousands of horses, thousands of wagons, vans, etc., and thousands of men.

Two Hundred Million Gifts. The packages that go out from the stores of the land tell of the rise and fall of fads. Who does not recall the chunks of coal that were so widely given in 1902—a commentary on the results of the coal strike?

It is said by the department store people that the sale price of the average Christmas gift is perhaps less than 50 cents. Comparatively few of them are sold for more than \$5. No one has ever taken a census of Christmas giving, but careful and experienced observers would place the total number of presents given at about 200,000,000, about one-half of which are bought during the last seven days of the season.

CHAPTERS GET LIMIT.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Dec. 18.—Two years imprisonment and a fine of \$500, the maximum penalty, was the sentence meted out today by Judge Kunkel in the Dauphin County Court to each of the four men who were convicted of defrauding the state in connection with the furnishing of the Capitol building in this city.

The four defendants are John H. Sanderson, Philadelphia, contractor for the furniture; James M. Shumaker, Johnstown, superintendent of the Board of Public Grounds and Buildings at the time the contract for furniture was let; William P. Snyder, Spring City, and William L. Mathews, Media, respectively Auditor-General and State Treasurer during the operation of the contract and by virtue of their positions members of the Board of Grounds and Buildings. The men were convicted of defrauding the state out of \$19,308. In a contract for wooden furniture, other charges involved large sums in the aggregate.

FIGHT DOESN'T DETER THEM

Mother of "Baby John" Sentenced to Life Imprisonment—Petulama Officer Short \$1,300

SPECIAL TO THE EVENING REVIEW. LINCOLN, Neb., Dec. 19.—The third bank robbery in Nebraska within the past 24 hours occurred at Ceresco, 20 miles north of here, early this morning, when the safe in the State Bank was blown open and \$3,000 in money taken.

Following the robbery of the bank at Gibbon, the crackmen, six in number, engaged in a pitched battle with citizens, and then escaped in an automobile. One of the robbers is believed to have been wounded and to have been carried off by his comrades. A posse gave chase, but was soon thrown off the trail.

Woman Gets Life Term.

OAKLAND, Calif., Dec. 19.—Mrs. Isabella Martin, convicted of dynamiting the home of Judge Ogden, of this city, was today sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge Wells. The woman did not place the dynamite under the Ogden home, but instructed her imbecile son, "Baby John," to put it there. The boy testified that his mother held him under her influence and compelled him to commit not only the Ogden outrage, but other crimes as well in which explosives were used.

Officer Admits Theft. PETULAMA, Calif., Dec. 19.—E. C. Ward, for many years city marshal and tax collector in a self-confessed embezzler of \$1300 of the city's money. He announces his intention of committing suicide.
