Eugene Guard: Before the Ways and Means Committee of congress recently the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, of this city, made an argument against the entrance into this country, duty free, of Canadian lumber. They contended that such foreign competition would tend to reduce prices and the result would be a great waste of our forest resources. The company contends that at the present time over 40 per cent of the forests of Oregon and Washington are wasted, owing to the inability to find a profitable market for the common grades. Additional competition, they argue, would not tend to a reduction in the already enormous waste. They exhibited photographs of lands logged off while the lumber was at a fair price, and also those worked over when the market was at a lower level, in order to illustrate their contention.

The recent death by suffocation of two young sisters in a poor lodging house of the East Side, New York, was surrounded by unusually pathetic features, according to the papers of that city. The young girls, one seventeen, the other nineteen years of age, came to the United States from Russia to make a living for themselves, and eventually to prepare the way for the emigration of the other members of their family from Russia. All day they worked in a sweatshop and at night they studied English and other things. For themselves they spent only enough of their meagre earnings to keep their alive, the rest they placed in a savings bank, with a view of sending for their folks when the board had grown to adequate proportions. Eagerly they awaited the time when they could bring about the reunion of the family and at last they had saved enough for that purpose. They had written a letter to their parents in Moscow, in which they informed them that the money for their journey was ready. It was their intention to so time the letter that it would reach their parents at Christmas. The letter was never sent. The other night one of the girls, before going to bed, accidentally turned on the gas in their room and when they were found in the morning both girls were dead. Thus the happy Christmas time has its tragedies, and of these the most pathetic are enacted in the crowded districts of the city—only a few minutes' walk from the crowded pavement of Broadway, with its glare of lights and glitter of diamonds.—Ex.

THEIVING OPERATORS
MULTIPLY WESTERN UNION.
In Absence of Checking System, Men at Small Stations Divided Cash Paid for Messages.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 20.—Secret service men in the employ of the Western Union Telegraph Company have unearthed an alleged conspiracy among operators of railroad offices in northern states and California whereby, they declare, stealings have been made within the last 18 months amounting to many thousands of dollars.

Regular Western Union operators are not involved in the conspiracy. The stealing is charged by the detectives entirely against operators in isolated railroad offices where there was no check upon their work.

At least one arrest has been made, that of an operator at Ritzville, Wash. It is alleged that this operator has made confession implicating half a dozen others. There is reason to believe other arrests also have been made, or soon will be made.

According to the report of the detectives the small group of which the Ritzville operator was a member was but a link in the chain of the conspiracy, which extended from Helena to San Francisco.

The mode of operation of the alleged conspirators was simple. An operator at a small station where there was no checking system would receive a message for another similar point, take payment for the company, transmit the message and pocket the money, which was subsequently divided with the operator at the receiving end.

It is alleged the discovery of the conspiracy came about through the greediness of certain of the operators, who finally became so bold that they would receive a message, take payment and then destroy the copy, without transmitting it, in order to avoid dividing the spoil with receiving operators. This course led to so many complaints that suspicion became aroused and an investigation was started.

ROSE ADJUDGED GUILTY; WILLIAMS PLEADS SAME.

COQUILLE, Or., Dec. 18.—Ernest Rose and Joe Williams, the two young men who, with Kinnicut, were charged with assault upon Lillian Endicott, the daughter of a Myrtle Point blacksmith, are guilty and will be sentenced this evening.

Rose was tried yesterday and the jury returned a verdict last night, fifteen minutes after retiring from the court room, finding him guilty. This morning, the Williams case was to be taken up for trial, but the defendant ended the matter by pleading guilty. Rose was charged with assault and Williams with attempted assault. The sentence will be passed this evening.

YONCALLA MAN ARRESTED.

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 20.—To face a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses in negotiating a \$35 check, E. G. Hamilton, a real estate man, will be brought to Spokane from Yoncalla, Or., where he is being held by the officers on the advice of Chief of Police Rice. Hamilton left Spokane last Wednesday. On complaint of a friend who alleged that he had been induced by Hamilton's false pretenses to indorse the check, a warrant was sworn out for his arrest.

Cecil T. Thompson left last night for Yoncalla with a warrant to bring the prisoner to Spokane.

INCREASED R. R. TARIFFS
