### HENEY DENIES REPORT.

Declares Government is Not Paying Him For Graft Prosecutions.

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 19.—"There is distinct belief here that Francis J. Heney is paid from the secret service funds of the government for his work in San Francisco," says Harry C. Carr, Washington correspondent of the Times, in an article printed here yesterday.

"As a sequel of the Aldrich resolution introduced in the senate the secret service system will be thoroughly investigated and various dark mysteries laid bare," continues Carr. "The resolution has special reference to 'special attorneys' employed in the investigation of possible crimes."

"The big question before the senate was whether the president of the United States had the right to use government money to send special prosecutors into California on a purely local city fight. The question did not come out from hiding, but the significance of it was appreciated by the senate body as a whole."

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 19.—Francis J. Heney, in a statement to the United Press, yesterday denied flatly and emphatically that President Roosevelt had anything to do with his activities in the San Francisco graft prosecutions.

Referring to the articles by the Los Angeles Times correspondent, Heney said: "It is absolute rot. There isn't the shadow of a reason for making such statements."

"Any statement that I received money from the government for my work in San Francisco is false. President Roosevelt had nothing to do with my coming to San Francisco to take up the fight. Neither did he have anything to do with Detective William J. Burns' coming here. Mr. Burns resigned his position with the

government that he might be able to devote all of his time to the work here.

"Any talk about the government having control over me is absurd. There was no time when I was prosecuting cases for the government that I was not at liberty to drop the work. I withdrew from the government cases so that I might give the time that was necessary to the San Francisco prosecutions."

FRANKFORT, Ky., Dec. 20.—The controversy relating to the legal right of a school teacher of the common schools on the state to whip a disorderly pupil was ended today when Attorney-General James Breathitt handed down an opinion to State Superintendent of Public Instruction Crabbe, in which he holds a teacher is given the authority to whip if it is necessary to maintain discipline.

### URGES RAILROAD FROM BOISE TO COOS BAY.

Oregon-Idaho Congress at Vale Also Passes Resolutions Favoring River and Harbor Aid.

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 19.—The three days' session of the Oregon-Idaho Development Congress, which closed at noon today in the City of Vale, Or., did more, perhaps, than any one agency along the conference line to build up and advance the interests of the two sister states, Oregon and Idaho, than any movement ever started by the citizens of the two great commonwealths.

The following joint committee on railroad legislation was appointed: Oregon—Governor George E. Chamberlain, Judge Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton; Colonel C. E. S. Wood, of Portland, Idaho—Governor-elect James H. Brady, Willard White, of Boise; J. H. Lowell, of Caldwell.

Corresponding secretaries chosen were W. P. Doolittle, of Ontario, and Riley Atkinson, of Boise.

The six following congresses will be held:

Salem, Or., Jan. 29 and 30.  
Boise, Feb. 23 and 24.  
Ontario, March 16 and 17.  
La Grande, April 27 and 28.  
Caldwell, May 11 and 12.  
Burns, July 17 and 18.

To Gather Railroad Data.

A committee on railroad data to assist the railroad legislative committee was appointed as follows: J. C. Turner, Burns, chairman and secretary; Boise, Willard White, James L. Priest, Judge K. I. Purky, Max Mayfield; Caldwell, J. H. Lowell; Payette, Col. L. V. Patch, E. C. S. Brainerd; Marshfield, Walter Lygan; North Bend, H. C. Thomas; Jones, Directors—Vale, T. W. Claggett, C. O. Thomas; Ontario, J. R. Blackaby, W. H. Doolittle; Burns, Frank Davey; Weiser, A. H. Keller; Prineville, Mr. Spaulding; Judge Bell, M. A. Brink; Roseburg, J. D. Zuercher; Silver Lake, F. M. Chrisman.

Every member of the Congress is urged to furnish data to the secretary.

State Aid to Railroad Favored.

The congress, through resolutions, declared in favor of state-aided railroads, development of Coos Bay harbor and the revival of the Malheur project.

Delegates to the next congresses to be held in Boise during January and Salem during February, are urged to do everything in their power to further the construction of a railroad from Boise through Central Oregon to Coos Bay; recommending that the bay be used by the federal government as a great naval and coal station and commercial harbor for the shipping of the Pacific coast.

It is urged in the resolutions that the delegates urge upon the legislature of Oregon the importance of enacting at its 1909 session a general law enabling all districts which contain navigable waters in Oregon to organize port commissions and to levy taxes for the purpose of raising money to improve the harbors of Oregon.

The river and harbor committee of Congress is urged to make an appropriation for the improvement of Coos Bay.
