The school census of the Roseburg district for 1928, recently completed, shows a total of 1193 persons between the ages of 4 and 20 years.

A. G. Hamilton, a resident of Glendale, has filed an injunction suit in the circuit court against Mrs. C. M. Dale, seeking to restrain her from molesting an irrigation ditch. Plaintiff also alleges that defendant has so disturbed the ditch already that he has been damaged in the sum of \$150, and for this amount he asks damages.

Roseburg is to have a new business establishment—a branch of the Eugene Bottling Works. Messrs. E. C. Hughes and Jos. Pironi, proprietors of the business, were in Roseburg today making arrangements to start the venture, and they expect to begin operations in about six weeks, probably in less time than that.

Their establishment will be located in John Hunter and Max Weiss' cold storage plant on Oak street, opposite the Leona Mills lumber yard. The firm will manufacture all kinds of soft drinks, syrups, bottled goods and carbonated gas.

While running down hill in pursuit of a rabbit Sunday, the 11-year-old son of H. B. Hastings, of Winchester, accidentally shot himself

through the left foot with a 28-calibre rifle. Dr. Houck, who attended the injury, found it necessary to remove several pieces of splintered bone. The bullet entered near the base of the toes. Had it pierced the foot further back it might have made the boy a cripple for life. The injury sustained, however, will lay the boy up for several weeks.

Just for the "fun" of the thing, five young boys engaged in a duel with 22-calibre pistols, loaded with shot in the Grove (Hamilton Addition) Sunday afternoon. The only condition of the match was that none should aim at the face of another, and the observance of this injunction prevented serious injuries. As it was, however, three of the duellists,

Archie Buell, son of A. L. Buell, and two sons of W. J. McGraw, a railroad man, sustained slight wounds. Young Buell got a shot in the left leg, above the knee, and one of the McGraw boys received a shot in the back; the other McGraw boy, Virgil by name, was shot through the lower left leg, the leaden missile being afterwards removed by Dr. Houck. The shots in the other two boys were not removed. Dr. Hoover pronouncing the wounds of little or no consequence.
