PALACE OF SWEETS.

STATE TAX LEVY.

Will Amount to \$125,000 More Than That for Last Year.

SALEM, Or., Dec. 21.—The total amount of revenue to be raised for state purposes for 1909 will be approximately \$1,675,000, of which about \$400,000 will be derived from indirect sources, leaving \$1,275,000 to be apportioned among the several counties. This amount is \$125,000 greater than the levy last year and \$250,000 greater than the levy two years ago. The increase this year is due, in part, to the holding up of the University of Oregon appropriation bill last year by reason of which the levy for 1908 was at the rate of \$47,500 per year, as provided by law then in existence. Since the appropriation bill has gone into effect, carrying an appropriation dating back to January 1, 1907, it will be necessary, in making the 1909 levy to include a University of Oregon deficit of about \$155,000. The 1909 levy will include \$100,000 for the purchase of the Oregon City locks. Should the legislature repeal the locks appropriation bill, this \$100,000 will be in the treasury subject to appropriation for other purposes. One installment of \$100,000 has already been levied.

The levy will not be made until early in January, 1909, but the total amount here indicated, \$1,275,000, is close enough to the actual amount that will be levied so that county courts may act upon it in computing their share of state taxes. Already a number of counties have been anxiously inquiring what the state tax will be. Under the existing laws, the apportionment among the counties will be made at a fixed ratio which has been in force a number of years. In making the apportionment for 1909, the State Board will be confronted with the problem of making an apportionment between Hood River and Wasco counties without any law prescribing how the apportionment shall be made. The act creating Hood River county contained no provision upon this subject. The State Board passed the question up to the Attorney-General and that official has advised the Board to divide the Wasco county ratio between Wasco and Hood River in proportion to assessed valuations. Thus the law prescribing the ratio of apportionment of state taxes requires that Wasco county pay .9234 of the whole amount. But since then Hood River county has been carved out of Wasco. The assessed valuation of Wasco county is now \$5,927,345 and that of Hood River \$2,870,280. Dividing the apportionment accordingly, Wasco's new ratio will be .0158 and that of Hood River .0076. Though there is no law expressly authorizing such an apportionment, the Attorney-General expressed the opinion that this is equitable and should be adopted. The Board will follow his advice.

Each county can ascertain approximately the amount of its share of the state taxes for 1909 by multiplying \$1,275,000 by its ratio. The ratio for Douglas county is .0245.

TRAIN ROBBER CONFESSES.

Portland Youth Implicates Two Pals in O. R. & N. Job.

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 21.—Angered at his confederates because, as he declares, they gave him only \$125 as his portion of the plunder secured in the holdup of the O. R. & N. train Thursday night, William Burke, the assumed name of a youth 21 years of age, whose widowed mother, three brothers and sister reside on East Oak street, has made a complete confession to Sheriff Stevens of the part he played in the daring robbery.

His confession involves Jack Hayes, alias Jack Walton, alias "Slim," a former convict in the Folsom, Calif., penitentiary, and another local lad whose name is withheld until his arrest, which is expected momentarily. Hayes and Burke were arrested Sunday.

The capture of the confessed bandit and his alleged confederate is the result of the finding of a "sinker" or rubber overcoat, which was thrown away by the leader of the gang in their flight after the hold-up. Sheriff Stevens, his deputies and special agents of the O. R. & N. traced its ownership, who informed them that he had loaned it to a certain acquaintance. Further investigation along that line resulted Sunday in the arrest of Hayes, who is said to have worn the coat.

FIGHTING NEAR-BEER LICENSE.

PENDLETON, Or., Dec. 21.—A bitter fight against the "near-beer" license ordinance recently enacted by the city council is now on and bids fair to be continued indefinitely. While it is yet in the city recorder's court, it will probably be carried on until the Supreme Court is required to pass upon the constitutionality of the measure, thus making the local case one of great interest to a number of other cities in the state which happen to be located in "dry" counties.

Following the passage of the ordinance recently, Dee Matlock was one of a number of near-beer dispensers who applied for license to continue in business, but for the ostensible reason that he had confessed to the Circuit court charge of being guilty of selling intoxicating liquor in violation of the local option law, his petition was denied. Almost immediately thereafter screens were placed on the windows of his place, notwithstanding the fact that an anti-screen ordinance had been passed several weeks before.

Friday, Matlock was arrested, and Monday set as the day for the opening of his trial before Recorder Fitzgerald, and this trial is now in progress. Some near-beer was seized at the time of his arrest. It is the purpose of Matlock's attorneys to carry the case to the circuit court, and from there to the Supreme court of the state. His attorneys declare their client complied with the terms of the ordinance in asking for the license and that the council could not legally deny him his request.

Matlock is a nephew of W. F. Matlock, president of the State Fair Board, and a nephew of Eugene's prohibition mayor.
