### LOCAL NEWS.

For the second time a jury in Justice Long's court has failed to reach a verdict in the case of Max Weis vs. A. Nelson, a suit to replevin a wagon which Mr. Weis claims was included in the purchase of a piece of land from Mr. Nelson. The claim of the defendant was that he had merely loaned the plaintiff an old wagon then standing on another piece of property. Some time ago, at the first trial of the case, a jury comprised of Ed. Neeley, A. L. Buell, G. W. Kruse and B. F. Cawfield, hopelessly disagreed, standing 2 to 2. On Monday the case was re-tried before a jury consisting of J. W. Wright, Robt. Klid, Grant Taylor, Jas. Dolan, S. J. Jones and I. F. Rice, and the result was a disagreement. After one and a half hours' deliberation, the jury stood 3 to 3, with no chance of arriving at a verdict, and Justice Long dismissed them.

Justice Long will be tried again in a problematical. Weis was represented by Attorneys C. L. Hamilton and E. L. Cannon and Nelson by Atty. J. A. Buchanan.
