**SENSATIONAL SCANDAL
IN PITTSBURG'S AFFAIRS**

Seven Councilmen and Two Ex-Bankers
Arrested—Flashlight Shows
Attempts of Bribery.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 22.—A
flashlight photograph of a member of
the City council in the act of accepting
money from a "decoy" promoter,
it is said, will be one of the strongest
features of the evidence to be
presented tomorrow, when seven
members of the council and two former
bank officials are to be given a
preliminary hearing on charges of
bribery, corrupt solicitation and other
illegal acts, brought by the Voters'
League.

No additional arrests were made
today and it is said none are likely
to be made until after the hearing
tomorrow morning. All who, the
detectives think, may possibly be wanted
later are being kept under surveillance,
officers being on guard at all
city and suburban stations.

Photographed in Act of Bribery.
Besides the Councilman, the flashlight
photograph is said to show an
agent for the Hurling Detective
Agency of Scranton, Pa., which worked
up the case. This man is reported to
have posed as a member of a firm
anxious to sell wooden paving
blocks to the city, and to have become
very intimate with the councilman.
With other detectives concealed
within hearing distance, the councilman
is alleged to have been induced
to tell of the negotiations to secure
the passage of the legislation,
to name other members who were to
share in the bribe and to say that the
members were tired of promises and
wanted to see the real money. The
detective peeled off \$100 and \$500
bills from a large roll and, just as
the councilman reached for his al-
lotment, the flash was ignited, when
the councilman, it is said, broke
down and wept, and when he accused
his companion of trapping him, there
was no denial. Then an officer
appeared and made the arrest.

It is practically admitted that a
number of decoy contractors and pro-
moters were introduced to trap council-
men and that many temptations
have been offered members during
the last six months.
In some quarters it is believed
that Mayor Guthrie was back of the
project, he having been an attorney
for the Voters' League some years
ago when it made a fight against a
street-car line.
The Mayor opposed the city deposi-
tories legislation from the first, re-
fusing to make contracts authorized
by the council because the depositors
elected were to pay but 2 per cent
on daily balances, while other
banks had offered 2 1/2 per cent.

**WOULD EXCLUDE CITIES
FROM ITS OPERATION.**

Amendment to Local Option Law Will
be Attempted—Prohibits Plan to
Make the State "Dry."

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 22.—An
amendment to the local option law,
excluding incorporated cities from
its operation, will be proposed at the
meeting of the legislature this winter.
It was practically impossible
yesterday to learn the interest back
of this movement. Officers of the
anti-saloon league declared emphatic-
ally that such a bill was being drafted
by the liquor people. At the same
time the liquor interests insist that
the Anti-Saloon League, recognizing
the unfairness of the local option law
in its present form have agreed with
the brewers to consent to an amend-
ment that will exempt cities from the
operation of this statute.

The Anti-Saloon League expects
next June to call a local option elec-
tion in at least six of the wet or part-
ly wet counties in the state. This
will be but a preliminary step to an
election for state prohibition which
will be called in 1910. The anti-
saloon people figure that with the
result of next June's election the
number of dry counties in the state
will be increased to at least 26. It
is predicted by them that the anti-
saloon vote of those counties, com-
bined with the prohibition expression
in the other eight counties, will be
sufficient to offset the wet vote and
place the entire state in the prohibi-
tion column.

MUTUAL INSURANCE IN COURT.

Member of Pacific Fire, Seattle Mut-
ual, Assessed \$75,000 to Set-
tle Claims.

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 17.—(Spe-
cial)—Fred H. Lyons, receiver of the
Pacific Fire Insurance Company, of
Seattle, a defunct mutual, has been
ordered by the court to assess the
concern's members for \$75,000 to
pay outstanding debts. The sum rep-
resents five annual premiums, which
must be paid by members under the
Washington laws governing mutual
companies; \$7,000 of the assessment
levied must come from San Francisco
firms which carried surplus lines with
the defunct company. The assess-
ment of some members will run as
high as \$600. The company issued
the New York standard form, but
the court holds the members liable,
just the same.
