ANOTHER MAN MISSING FROM CITY OF MEDFORD.

L. W. Fansher Disappeared Day After Swartz Was Last Seen—May be Mentally Deranged.
Medford seems to be a favorite city for mysterious disappearances. Last Monday the Review told about the disappearance from Medford of a man named Ed. Swartz, and now we note that another man, L. W. Fansher, is also missing from that place. Swartz was last seen in Medford on Nov. 29, after making final proof on a timber claim, and Fansher left there one day later. A dispatch from Medford gives the following details of Fansher's case:
No tidings have been received as yet of L. W. Fansher, who mysteriously disappeared from his home in Medford on Monday, November 30. Mr. Fansher was last seen going south between Medford and Phoenix. The report that he had been seen in the woods near Talent and that he ran like a mad man from his pursuers is false, as well as other reports of his having been seen. Mr. Fansher was local salesman for the Oregon Nursery Company, at Salem, and had done a large business. A large shipment was here for delivery when he disappeared. He was in Medford last summer in a streetcar accident. Mr. Fansher has a wife and family here, who are anxiously awaiting some developments as to his whereabouts.
