Governor Chamberlain today pardoned George Green, who was convicted last May and sentenced to a term of one year in the penitentiary. A strong petition was sent in signed by a majority of the jurors, all the witnesses in the case and a number of the county officials and prominent citizens. It appeared that Green was convicted for passing a defunct state of Georgia bank bill of denomination of \$10 on Riley C. Hill, of Brain, Dr., and was arrested on the same day in March of this year. He was confined in jail until his trial in May. The reasons for granting the pardon were that Green voluntarily repaid Hill the money which he had obtained, and had by good conduct shown that he was not essentially a criminal. Sufficient means were sent to the authorities to pay Green's transportation to New York state, where his reformation will be undertaken by his relatives and friends. Green served in the Spanish-American war and afterwards in the Philippines three or four years and was honorably discharged.
