The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company is putting in 10 new wires from Portland to Salem, eight to Albany, six to Eugene, four to Roseburg, two from Roseburg to Grants Pass, two from Grants Pass to Ashland and a wayline, two wires from Glendale to Grants Pass. Eight crews of about 150 men are employed. One crew of 25 men is working out of Oakland. L. W. Dunham and John Kanipe, with teams, and Jenner Page and Guy Mann as linemen, are working with this crew.

CITY OF ASHLAND HAS 14-MILL TAX LEVY.

Medford. With 17 Mills Under High License, Wonders What it will be Under Prohibition.

Roseburg taxpayers, who are pondering over the increase this month in the city tax levy from 3 mills to 10 mills, on account of the loss of \$8000 a year in saloon licenses, may console themselves with the knowledge that in Ashland and Medford the tax levies are still higher. The Medford Tribune (wet) of Dec. 25, says:

As the result of prohibition, the tax levy for the city of Ashland has been jumped for the coming year from 5 mills to 14 mills. There is at present a deficit of over \$5000 in the Ashland finances, due to the loss of revenue from high license during the past year, and both this deficiency and the current expenses must be met by increased taxation, so the Ashland council at its meeting Wednesday evening fixed the levy at 14 mills—was done in a spirit of bravado, to prove to the world that prohibition did not increase taxation, and the example of Ashland was freely quoted throughout the state in the local option election of last June. But who dances, even to prohibition music, must pay the piper and, in spite of the utmost economy, a deficiency of \$5000 rolled up during the year. This and current expenses must be met, and the only way to meet it was to raise the tax levy 133 per cent which has been done.

LAND GRANT CASES ARE CONSOLIDATED.

Judge Wolverton Will Decide on the 4000 Petitions of Intervention in Govt. Suit as One.

PORTLAND, Or., Dec. 25.—Judge Charles E. Wolverton, presiding over the United States Circuit Court, yesterday morning, upon motion of attorneys acting for 67 complainants, who are seeking to force the Oregon & California Railway Company to sell for \$2.50 an acre, lands granted to the company something like 40 years ago, consolidated the cases with the suit against the railway company brought by the government. This means that when the case is tried the decision in one case will go as the decision in all of the cases.

In addition to entering this order, the application of 140 new intervenors to enter the case was granted, bringing the total of home-seekers who are after the railroad company up to about 4000. The suit of the government is being looked after by B. D. Townsend, special assistant to the Attorney-General, and United States Attorney John McCourt. The suit is brought to cancel the grant given the railroad company because it has not lived up to the terms of the grant, in that it had refused to sell the lands and has actually withdrawn them from the market.

WIDOW GETS LARGER PART OF R. D. HUME'S ESTATE. Curry County Land Holdings Divided Into 100 Shares—Nephews and Nieces Remembered. MARSHFIELD, Or., Dec. 25.—According to the statement of J. S. Cook, attorney for the administrator, there will be no contest in the settlement of the estate of the late R. D. Hume, of Curry county. The will has been admitted to probate in Curry county and its provisions have just been made public. To the widow is left outright the testator's property on Chestnut street in San Francisco, all stocks and bonds, \$20,000 in cash and some personal property. The mansion at Piedmont is owned by Mrs. Hume herself. Four or five nieces and nephews are bequeathed \$5000 each, and the remainder of the estate is divided into 100 shares, of which Mrs. Hume received 16 shares and the nieces and nephews some five and some seven shares each. This part of the estate includes the enormous land holdings and canneries in Curry county and will probably be incorporated. Mrs. Hume is sole executrix of the will and she, together with Charles H.
