THREE OREGON SUICIDES.

ASHLAND, Or., Dec. 28.—Giuseppe Fazio, an Italian passenger on train No. 15, enroute to Sacramento, yesterday shot himself through the head in the toilet room of the depot hotel here, after the train had left the station. He had previously been interviewed by the police who believed him insane. In his shoe and in the belt about his body were found about \$2000.

CANYON CITY, Or., Dec. 28.—R. A. Cohoe, 24 years of age, son of D. C. Cohoe, a prominent man in northern Grant county, was found on the streets of Canyon City Christmas evening in the last agonies of death, the result of a dose of strychnine taken with suicidal intent. Medical assistance was summoned, but death resulted almost immediately. Despondency and imaginary troubles prompted the act.

RICHLAND, Or., Dec. 28.—One mile above the place where Powder River empties into Snake, last week, was found the body of a man with feet and legs hanging over the edge of a high rocky cliff, perpendicular above the water's edge and the head blown to atoms by dynamite. No papers or sign of a name could be found on the body, nor could any information be obtained from the railroad men or anyone else. The man had been dead six or seven days. As his legs were over the edge of the cliff, it is inferred he attempted to blow himself into the river with dynamite.
