AGAINST COUNTY DIVISION.

People Not willing to Give up Northern Portion of Douglas County.

Roseburg, Or., Dec. 29.—The portion of Douglas county which would become a part of a new county division in case the Cottage Grove agitators should be successful, will not be given up by the interests which center about Roseburg without a fight. Nevertheless some residents of this city feel that some sort of a division is inevitable at a future time, and that in case the Cottage Grove people should carry the movement to the people that they will be successful.

In the past Douglas county has always fought hard to keep every acre of land possible within her boundaries. When Lane county influences have sought to place all of the Bohemia mining district inside of that county, Douglas county legislators have fought the movement with all their might. And their strength has usually proven sufficient.

Some of the people here reason that there is little or no sense in any re-division at the present time. They think that the movement is headed by Cottage Grove men, who want to aggrandize their city at the expense of other portions of the section.

One man said: "They merely want the salaries and the new court house. They don't care anything about the welfare of the new county. It simply adds to the expense—two officers where there was one."

Douglas county will probably be out of debt in less than a year. Under the regime of County Judge Wencott the \$80,000 of the Douglas county debt has dwindled to approximately \$25,000. Therefore, the conclusion is drawn that with the next tax levy little of that sum will remain unpaid.

Lane county is also understood to be debt free, and with both the present counties without any great burdens, the difficulties of an equitable apportionment will not exist in case of a division.

CHINA TAKES PART IN CRUSADE AGAINST OPIUM.

Drug Outdone in Evil Effects Only by So-Called Remedies—Cure Alleged to Exist.

SHANGHAI, Dec. 31.—Distinguished delegates from many nations are here today to take part in the international conference at which the powers are to fix upon the details for the cessation of the cultivation of opium within their territories in order to assist China in the suppression of the use of opium among the Chinese people.

Missionary doctors continue to report a large increase in the sale of anti-opium remedies, which, containing morphia, produce results worse than opium smoking. It is evidently desirable that effective measures should be taken by the Chinese government to prevent the illicit importation and sale of morphia, and especially it is desirable that Japan, following the example of other nations, should prohibit the export of morphia to China.

Prohibition drives man and woman to the use of cocaine, morphia, opium and other drugs, according to Dr. Hamilton E. Wright, one of the three United States commissioners to the International Opium Congress.

Dr. Wright declares he has found the drug habit to be advanced further in those states having strict anti-liquor laws, while in the "wet" states the reverse is the case.

Dr. Wright said that, contrary to the general belief, the Chinese users of the drug and the opium-eaters both are anxious to see the law enforced as to its sale, while the Chinese "pipers" are strong advocates of total abstinence from the drug for the rising generation. His information as to the white users of opium is not as definite on account of the greater difficulty in locating them.

Dr. Wright declares there has been a steady increase in importation of opium into the United States since 1873, though there was a larger Chinese population then than now and the laws against its importation were not so severe.

The importation of the crude product in the past five years has increased 1,000,000 pounds, he says.

The Chinese physicians, he declares, are leaders in the effort to find a cure for the opium habit. They are now using a cure discovered not long ago in Shanghai, and they claim for it success. The new cure is being tested officially in New York.

Dr. Wright's studies have developed that fifty per cent of the Chinese in the United States habitually use the drug, 30 per cent occasionally, nearly 20 per cent on rare occasions and a few refrain from its use. Seventy-five per cent of the opium brought into the United States is made into morphia and 90 per cent of that drug is sold illicitly, according to Dr. Wright.

BREEDING GOOD HORSES.

The first page of the current issue of the Portland Rural Spirit, headed here this morning, is occupied by a picture of F. E. Alley's blooded trotter, Diawood, 2:11. On page 10 of the same paper is a three-column article by Mr. Alley on "The American Driving Horse." Finch fought desperately with himself for self control and strained to affect an air of bravado and unconcern as he was led down to the death cell late yesterday afternoon with the jury's verdict of guilty still ringing in his ears; a verdict that meant he must die at the end of a hangman's rope for the devilish murder of Ralph B. Pfeiler, late prosecutor of the Multnomah Bar Association.
