OREGON ADVERTISING RAPIDLY EXPANDING

Six tons of advertising matter, and the highest possible grade of advertising matter at that, was forwarded to the East by the Portland Commercial Club last week. This remarkable addition to the enormous advertising Oregon is already receiving, tells of all the resources of the state in picture and text, and comprises 6,040,000 full newspaper columns, certainly a great accomplishment, and one which five years ago would have been considered impossible.

Rev. J. Whitcomb Brougher, pastor of the "White Temple" at Portland, is absent on an extended eastern trip including Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Cleveland, Chicago and other cities, in behalf of the Northern Baptist convention, which is to convene in Portland on June 25th and will bring from 2000 to 3000 prominent Baptist laymen and preachers. Dr. Brougher includes a description of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest in all his addresses.

The Peck-Judah Company, one of the foremost tourist bureaus in the United States, with the Pacific Northwest as their exclusive field, have opened headquarters in Portland. This company handles many millions of pieces of advertising matter during the year, and they have in charge competent people thoroughly familiar with the attractions and resources of Oregon.

EUGENE HANDS A LEMON TO COTTAGE GROVE.

New County Proposition Is Turned Down by Commercial Club—Normal School Is Latest.

EUGENE, Or., Jan. 12.—Representatives from the Cottage Grove Commercial Club met with the local club last night to discuss the question of the formation of a new county. Their principal argument was that it would be easier and more economical to administer the affairs of the proposed county from Cottage Grove than it is now from either Eugene or Roseburg. In this connection they say that in the last election it cost Douglas \$18 per vote in the Bohemia district.

The area of the proposed county is estimated at 1950 square miles, and contains a population 8000, 6500 being in Lane and 1500 in Douglas. The Cottage Grove delegation asked to have the Lane county legislators instructed to sanction the formation of the new county; but the Eugene club went on record as opposed to the division.

Cottage Grove Undaunted. Commenting on the action of the Eugene Commercial Club, the Cottage Grove Leader says:

It is evident to every citizen of south Lane where Eugene now stands on this question and it is up to us to not only organize, plan and work diligently for carrying out county division, despite their opposition, but also in the meantime, see to it that all party lines are obliterated locally and that we work in one common cause—a full share of representation in the county government and a just and liberal share of county funds for public improvements. Other new counties have won out over the opposition of the old county seat rivals. We can do likewise.

A Mistaken Idea. The Cottage Grove Western Oregon says: The emphatic turn down which was handed to us is a thing to marvel at. However, with the new proposition of Drain jumping into the race, lining off a county of their own taking a large slice from Douglas county, and lines to the city of Cottage Grove, is not being healthy. It is being healthy by Douglas people, who rather than see their county sawed up the way Drain proposes, will work tooth and nail for the new Nesmith county. It is another case of the ill wind blowing some good.

Wants Normal School, Too. Along with its move for a new county, Cottage Grove is ambitious to secure a state normal school, regarding which the Western Oregon has this to say:

Cottage Grove will raise money for the purchase of suitable grounds and for the erection of buildings for the State Normal School, we have been informed. Located as they are at present, at Drain, Oregon, they are in a measure, out of the way, and our natural municipal advantages and location will make it a big object for the institution to come here. Divided into districts for these places of learning, a more desirable place for this state institution could not be found than here. The advantages of a county seat, making this place the principal city between Eugene and Roseburg, are readily seen. We are told that Drain has a population of about 500, while the population of this city will run close to 3000. A bill will be drafted suitable to present.

SUING FOR A RAILROAD.

Coos Bay & Eastern Is Again in the Court—Other Matters.

Marshfield Times: The ownership of the Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern railway and its extensive holdings in Coos county is attacked in a suit which was recently filed in the United States court by R. A. Graham, the builder of the road, against John D. Spreckels and Brothers Company and the Southern Pacific company. Mr. Graham alleges that in 1906, the Spreckels wrongfully converted the stock and bonds of the company to their own use and disposed of the property to the Southern Pacific.

The case will come up for hearing soon, it is expected. John S. Coke left for Portland today to participate in the suit. It is expected that the entire history of the road and some of the financial maneuvering in its construction will be rehearsed in detail when the case comes to trial.

Graham says that he was the sole owner of the \$600,000 stock of the company and its \$620,000 bonds. These were placed with the Spreckels as security for money loaned by them for the construction of the line.

Tom Sheridan, of Roseburg, who was interested with Graham in the construction of the line, has also begun suit against the Spreckels and the Southern Pacific for damages on the same grounds. His case has not been set for trial yet.

Casting Stairs at Kidder.

Mr. Kidder, of Roseburg, the man who some months ago fled on the property on Isthmus Inlet, across from the C. A. Smith mill, as a home-stead, has arrived on Coos Bay and has erected a small house on the land and declares that he is determined to retain the property. It will be remembered that the property was understood by everyone around here to belong to Henry Sengstacken. Kidder, claimed that it had never been entered on, was still a government holding and could be secured by his as a homestead. Mr. Sengstacken declared that Kidder's claim was without foundation.

"I am sorry that Kidder didn't erect a better house on the land," said Mr. Sengstacken today. "I noticed the other day that he was building on my property and I told him so, but he appears to be trying to run his bluff as far as he can. He will receive notice from the United States Land department shortly that he has absolutely no claim to it. I thought to oust him for trespassing but as long as he isn't doing any harm I decided not to."

Storm Puts Wires Down.

Coos Bay is still isolated from the remainder of the country, at least so far as telegraphic or telephone communication is concerned. The Western Union wires have been down for three days and the long distance phone line between Myrtle Point and

Roseburg has been down for about the same length of time. The phone has been repaired and service resumed for a few minutes and then the line would go down again. This afternoon it was thought that service might be restored again.

About 4 o'clock, telephone communication to Roseburg was restored and through the courtesy of the Roseburg Review, The Times is enabled to present the first telegraph news of the outside world that it has been able to obtain in three days.

OUTPUT OF COPPER AND PLACER GOLD.

Statistical data for the placer mines are as yet incomplete, but it is certain that there were not so many in operation as in 1907, and it appears probable that the output has a total value of somewhat over \$15,000,000, as compared with \$16,491,000 in 1907. This decrease is chargeable to the adverse conditions of mining because of the scant water supply in the Yukon and Seward Peninsula districts. Had there not been this shortage of water the placer-gold output would have far exceeded that of 1907.

The production of copper in 1908 will be greater by about 50,000,000 pounds, or between 5 and 6 per cent than that of 1907, which was \$88,896,491 pounds.

Elector R. R. Butler, of Gilliam county, was chosen to carry the vote. His mileage will amount to nearly \$900. If he shall be economical there will be residue for him, over expenses, of \$500 or \$600. This sum Mr. Lee wanted divided between the four electors, share and share alike. He was supported by Elector A. C. Marsters, of Douglas, but Elector F. J. Miller, of Linn, and Butler opposed, and finally Lee's plan was abandoned.

When the electors met it was the opinion of Marsters that the session should be private. The reason for secrecy was a mystery to the newspaper men, but they marched in and Marsters neglected to insist that they be ejected. The subject then broached by Lee showed the reason for the desire of "executive session."

Lee and Butler were candidates for messenger. Lee stated that it had been customary for the four electors to share the perquisites with each other, and if he were the messenger he would gladly continue the custom. Miller stood against the scheme, however, and it fell through. For many ballots the vote for Lee and Butler was a tie, and finally Marsters went over to Butler, and perquisites became a closed incident.
