After about three weeks of minor difficulties, crippling the light and power service from time to time, a bad break occurred at Kendall Bros. light and power station at Winchester last night. A heavy clutch pulley on the main dynamo drive shaft went to pieces and the shaft was also damaged. By binding up the break with heavy chains they were able to keep going most of the night. A new piece of shafting and a heavy clutch were ordered by telephone from Portland this morning. It is expected that these will be shipped from there by express on the late train tonight, these parts weighing about 1600 pounds. They are expected at Winchester Friday forenoon, accompanied by an expert machinist to assist in putting them in place. Regular service will be resumed in a day or two. Meanwhile a dynamo was being moved today, preparatory for operation tonight, if possible, by a smaller engine, thus furnishing the city with some light until the big break can be repaired. The pumping plant is not interfered with and the water supply will be kept up as usual.

WOULD GO BACK TO OLD BOARD REGIME.

Bill Introduced in House to Change the Management of the Oregon Soldiers' Home.

SALEM, Or., Jan. 20.—A bill has been introduced in the House to change the management of the Oregon Soldiers' Home, at Roseburg, from the sole control of the governor to a board of control composed of three members. Campbell of Clackamas, has fathered the bill, which provides that the legislature shall elect B. F. Pike, C. A. Williams and F. E. Hills as the three members of this board of control. Pike is to hold office until the first Monday in March, 1911, Williams until the first Monday in March, 1913, and Hills until the first Monday in March, 1915.

It is further provided that the legislature shall on the fourth Monday in January of each session meet in joint assembly and elect one member of this board of control, who shall hold office for six years.

At present the commandant of the soldiers' home is appointed by the governor and this officer is in charge of the management of the home.

It is said that a number of old soldiers are back of the bill introduced yesterday and will work for its passage.

The soldiers' home was created by the legislature of 1893 and under the first law the institution was in the hands of a board of trustees, appointed by the governor. This law was amended in 1895 and again in 1901 it was further amended in that the board was abolished and the governor empowered to appoint one man, the commandant, to assume charge of the affairs of the institution.

The change was made because of continual strife among the members of the board, who disagreed over the appointment of the commandant and other officers and were in continual turmoil. It was thought by the legislature of 1901 that it would be better to centralize the authority and make the governor responsible for the conduct of the place.

W. W. Elder, the present commandant, is a democrat, and it is thought politics enters largely into the proposed change, especially since B. F. Pike, a former member of the legislature, and one of the promoters of the measure, is a bitter partisan.
