FLOCK TO CAPITAL

Lumbermen Protest Against Removal of Tariff

FEAR CANADIAN DEALERS

Hepburn Law Grilled—Knox' Salary to be Lowered—Railroad Case Has Critical Day

Special to the Evening Review.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—Announcement that the House committee on ways and means had determined to recommend the abolition of the tariff on all grades of lumber is bringing to Washington lumbermen from all parts of the country to lobby against the adoption of the report. The lumber interests will use the argument that if congress abolishes the tariff the lumber industry of the country will be dealt a blow from which it will never recover. The lobbyists are particularly anxious to have the duty on the low grades preserved, saying if this is not done the country will be flooded with lumber from Canada.

The decision of the committee is based on the view that the lumber industry of the country is controlled by a trust and is therefore not entitled to further protection.

Qualifying Knox.
Action to remove the obstacle to the qualification of Senator P. C. Knox as secretary of state was taken by the house committee on elections, which today recommended that the act increasing the salary of that office from \$8000 to \$12,000 per year be repealed.

Hepburn Law Grilled.
In the house today Representative

Madden, of Illinois, declared the Hepburn railroad rate law to be "makeshift legislation," that it was "a forest of legislative exotics and a tangled wilderness of words." He said further that "every provision of the law is full of enjoyment for the railroad monopolist."

Prepares for Cabinet.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 13.—Richard A. Ballinger today formally resigned as vice president and trustee of the Seattle exposition and withdrew from a law firm preparatory to assuming his duties as secretary of the interior under Wm. H. Taft.

Harriman on Grill.

CLEVELAND, O., Feb. 13.—Efforts of the federal government to dissolve the alleged merger of the two big Harriman railway systems, the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific, reached a crisis at the beginning of the hearing in this city today. Subpoenas have been served on traffic managers and other representatives of Cleveland shippers to the number of fifty.

It is stated that with these witnesses the government will attempt to show that there is no competition in rates or methods of handling traffic over the two big Harriman roads.

It is alleged in the government's bill of complaint that prior to 1904, the date of the resignation of Paul Morton as an official of the Santa Fe, Harriman, H. C. Frick, H. H. Rogers, James Stillman and others bought up \$20,000,000 of stock in the Santa Fe for the purpose of heading off competition from that source.

WORKS OVER TIME

Senate Kills Bill to Protect Laborers in Risks

ANOTHER VETO OVERRIDEN

Johnson Road Bill Passed—Friday an Eventful Day With Douglas County Solons

SALEM, Or., Feb. 13.—Both houses broke the record by working Friday night until midnight. Today most of the legislators attended Admission Day exercises at the state university at Eugene, commemorating the 50th anniversary of Oregon's statehood.

In the senate last night the last of the labor bills, one by Slinnot to protect persons engaged in dangerous occupations, was killed. The Johnson road bill went through with little opposition and is now up to the House. A number of local and salary bills were passed, one going over the governor's veto. Both houses will resume work next Monday for the last week of the session.

Doings at Olympia.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 13.—Today's situation in the senate seems to be 22 to 20 against the McMeisters' local option bill. Opponents of the measure contend they have strength enough to prevent the passage of the bill unless it exempts incorporated towns from the county unit, permitting such towns to decide the liquor traffic question for themselves.

Acting Governor Hay said today that he was receiving complaints from the big taxpayers throughout the state concerning alleged extravagance for educational institutions. Information supplied by tax commissioners is to the effect that more than 48 per cent of all direct taxes collected from the state taxpayers goes to the state university, the state agricultural college and three normal schools, all of which institutions are asking for more money this year.

Geo. Jones Reads Poem that Brings Fourth Catastrophe.

SALEM, Or., Feb. 12.—With only nine votes against it, the coyote scalp bounty bill introduced by the eastern Oregon delegation and carrying an appropriation of \$40,000, passed the house today.

It provides for the following bounties, same to be paid equally by the state and county in which the animals are killed: Gray wolf, gray wolf pup, or black wolf, \$5; coyote, \$1.50; black wolf pup, timber wolf or timber wolf pup, \$2.50; bob cat, wild cat or lynx, \$2; mountain lion, panther or cougar, \$10.

A ludicrous incident marked the debate. Jones of Douglas, speaking in favor of the bill, read a poem prepared by one of his constituents. Before he had finished reading Dimick's chair fell in pieces with a crash, laying him on his back on the floor. "That poem did it," exclaimed Dimick, after the guffaws had subsided.

Buchanan Disclaims Responsibility for George Jones.

Complying with instructions of the house, the ways and means committee today reported and the house passed a separate appropriation bill providing an appropriation of \$100,000 for each of the three normal schools located at Monmouth, Ashland and Weston.

A determined fight against the Ashland school bill brought Buchanan to its defense. Buchanan had just declared that the people of his section of the state only asked fair play when Orton inquired:

"Is it not a fact that your colleague, Mr. Jones, has voted against both the Monmouth and the Weston school appropriations?"

"I am not responsible for what Mr. Jones does," retorted Buchanan. "I am not claiming any responsibility for him."

The normal appropriations will be the center of a big fight next week. Foes of the normal school graft will endeavor to cut off all the normals except that at Ashland, or abolish them and establish a new institution at Portland.

Abraham Recalls Vetted Salary Bill and Senate Passes It.

Senator Abraham, with a twinge of compassion for a defeated salary bill, yesterday moved reconsideration of one of Senator Scholfield's bills, relating to the assessor's office in Clatsop county. The governor's veto was sustained earlier in the day, but Abraham's motion carried and the bill went through over the veto, 21 to 8.

Umpqua River Bill.

Representative Brady's Umpqua River bill has not yet been reported. It provides that "any person, com-

pany or corporation operating any placer mines or claim in the County of Douglas, state of Oregon, who shall dump or discharge any debris, gravel, earth or sludges into the waters of the Umpqua or Cow Creek, in the said county of Douglas, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be subjected to a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$1000.

The bill was introduced by Brady Feb. 5, read the second time Feb. 8, and referred to the committee on health and public morals, which has yet made no report. Rumors that there was something irregular about this bill and that it was in the nature of a hold-up of mining interests in Douglas county had been in circulation for several days.

New Judgeship Bill.

Another new judgeship bill frisked into the senate yesterday. It was introduced by Chase of Coos and Curry counties and provides a third judge for the second district, where Judges Hamilton and Harris now preside. It provides for election of an additional judge in 1910 and requires that one judge shall come from the territory south of the Umpqua river and west of the Coast range, and the other two to be chosen from the remaining territory.

\$100,000 for Crater Lake Road.

Representative Purdin's bill appropriating \$100,000 towards the construction of a wagon road from Medford, via Crater Lake, to Klamath Falls, passed the house this afternoon, with 14 negative votes.

The appropriation by the state is conditional on substantial support by Jackson and Klamath counties and from the general government. It is estimated that the proposed road will cost about \$400,000.

\$300,000 to Buy Locks.

For the purchase of the Oregon City locks by the state and the national government, the senate tonight passed the substitute bill introduced by the ways and means committee at request of Representative Jones of Polk, providing for raising \$100,000 in each of three years so soon as congress shall appropriate \$300,000 for the joint fund. The \$100,000 raised under the old law will be raised under the general fund; likewise the \$100,000 that will be raised this year.

"Hoosier" Memorial Adopted.
Senate Joint memorial, by Miller of Linn, urging legislation by congress that will prohibit shipping liquors into dry territory, was adopted by the house today. There were 19 negative votes.

SNOW AT CONDON.

For the purpose of ascertaining the true status of the sentiment in Roseburg in regard to street paving, Attorney Louis Barzee, today began a private and informal canvass among voters about town. Up till noon he had interviewed about 50 people on the subject, and of these only four were found against the proposition. Taking this report as a reliable criterion, it is easy to see that the bonding issue will carry next Saturday by as great a majority, if not greater, than it did a year ago.

There is slight excuse for any farmer keeping several free star boarders in his dairy herd when a Babcock testing outfit, with full directions, can be had for two or three dollars.

The past fall has been a standoff from the viewpoint of mortality as between the deer hunters in the northern woods and the rabbit hunters in the prairie states. Not in a dozen years have so many boys and men been maimed, disfigured or killed through careless gun accidents while hunting cottontails as has been the case this season.

A large measure of interest is being felt by horsemen over the country in the experiments which are being conducted by the government horse breeding station at Weybridge, Vt., where a well defined and practical effort is being made to propagate the breed of almost extinct Morgan horses. Here are assembled the finest and purest types of the breed which the government agents could find and purchase. While the work laid out is but in its beginnings, the results are bound to be of great value to the horse breeding interests of the country.

Both stock raiser and grain grower should always work on the principle that the finest blooded sires and dams and the very best of the seed corn and grain are none too good for their own use. Occasionally one is tempted through the offer of a fancy price to sell the best. But this is a mistake. It always being the case that if this or that animal is worth a fancy price to some one else it is even more valuable to the one who raised it and understands better than any one else the traits of its ancestors and the conditions under which its good qualities were developed.

Failure on the part of the boy in his teens to attend school and make the most of the educational advantages which may be within his reach is quite on a par with neglect on the part of the farmer to properly prepare the soil and sow the seed so that it will germinate and grow. He may wake up when seedtime is over to the necessity of taking action and making good the loss resulting from the delay, but in the great majority of cases it is too late to repair the damage. Rank weeds, other distractions and a shortened growing season make the best effort and accomplishment unavailing. School years are the seedtime of life and should be made the most of.

POSSE PURSUES IN AUTO

Washougal Bank Withstands Dynamite—Six Firemen Perish in Blaze That Costs \$175,000

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 13.—Two masked bandits held up the Denver & Rio Grande Express near Military Junction early this morning and stole thousands of dollars worth of registered mail. While one robber rifled the mail car, his partner cowed the passengers by bombarding the coaches with bullets. A posse, in a large automobile, is pursuing the robbers, who are endeavoring to escape on horseback.

Safe Withstood Dynamite.

WASHOUGAL, Wash., Feb. 13.—Early this morning, robbers entered the Washougal Bank and attempted to blow open the safe. Two charges of dynamite were exploded without effect. An approaching bakery wagon then scared the robbers away.

Love-Crazed Murderer.

MILLSVILLE, N. J., Feb. 13.—Joseph Homerfield was shot dead and Mrs. Margaret Kinkle and her 15-year-old son were seriously wounded today by Richard Dunning, who was infatuated with the woman. Dunning is in jail.

Steamer Sinks; 9 Drown.

BREST, France, Feb. 13.—The British steamer Forest Castle foundered off the harbor today. Nine of her crew were drowned.

Gorki Due for Siberia.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 13.—A warrant was issued today for the arrest of Maxim Gorki, the celebrated writer and leader in the revolutionary movement in Russia. The issuance of the warrant is laid to political agitation.

Funds for Labor Leaders.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 13.—At a meeting of organized labor in this city last night, \$1000 was subscribed toward the defense of Gompers, Mitchell and Morrison, who have appealed to the supreme court from a decision of Justice Wright, of the District of Columbia, sentencing them to jail for contempt of court in having violated an injunction issued upon petition of the Buck Stove & Range Co. The decision of Justice Wright was condemned at the meeting.

Six Firemen Killed.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Feb. 13.—Six firemen were killed and ten others injured in a fire which destroyed the building occupied by the Johns-Manville Co., entailing a loss of \$175,000.
