These constitute a splendid half dozen of the good things in store for Roseburg and vicinity this year. Boost for all of them.

Street paving and building good roads are not expenditures—money paid out for such purposes is an investment which will bring excellent returns.

Wheat at \$1.11 looks like "good money" to the growers, yet that means not more than \$20 to \$30 per acre; while Douglas county orchards are bearing crops which bring from \$100 to \$500 per acre annually. See the point?

Yes, it's next Saturday that the paving bond election will be held. Are you doing anything toward making the result in its favor 88 per cent of the total vote cast, as was the outcome last year. The town should show no falling off of interest in this matter. Let's have nine votes out of every ten in favor of the paving this time, if possible, and then let the tenth man forget to vote.

The old veterans living at the Soldiers' Home will thank the state senate for killing the bill passed by the house which would virtually have made the management of the home a political football. Even members of the legislature must learn after awhile that there are some things above politics and that public service cannot always be made subordinate to "the good of the party." The people have learned that the latter often means, in practice, "a graft for the politician."

Compens, Mitchell and other labor leaders say there are not between 2,000,000 and 5,000,000 idle men in the United States. We have no inclination to be pessimistic, yet we can't help wondering, sometimes, what a terrible howl would have gone up if this unfortunate condition had come about under a democratic administration. And yet congress gives no heed, but goes on blindly and doubles the salary of the president and other officials and is piling up a treasury deficit of \$150,000,000 this year. Our state legislature is following along the same line by almost doubling the total appropriations made by any former Oregon legislature. It is said that, "whom the Gods would destroy they first make mad." With millions of idle men in the country there seems to be a rapid approach toward "madness" in the unheard-of extravagance being shown by our state and national lawmakers.

COOS COUNTY BAR ASKS FOR ANOTHER JUDGE.

Claims Judges Hamilton and Harris Have Too Much Work and That Cases are Thus Delayed.

COQUILLE, Or., Feb. 11.—At a well attended meeting of the Coos County Bar Association here this morning, it was decided to appeal to the Oregon legislature to provide a third judge for this circuit district. At first it was proposed to ask the legislature to divide the judicial district and create a new one to be composed of Coos and Curry counties, but owing to it being so near the close of the general assembly it was decided this would be impractical.

A. S. Hammond, of Coquille; Judge C. A. Selhbrode and E. L. C. Farrin, of Marshfield, were selected as a committee to assist Secretary J. J. Stanley in taking the matter up with the Oregon legislature. Senator Chase and Representatives Reddick and Munier will be wired about the matter at once.

At present, there are only two judges, Judge Hamilton, of Roseburg, and Judge Harris, of Eugene, for this district and there is so much court work in the six counties that there is great delay in getting cases tried.

If the legislature provides for a third judge, it is proposed that he give his entire time to Coos and Curry counties, holding four terms a year in Coos county and two terms a year in Curry. Of course, if he is needed at other points in the district, and is not busy here, he could serve there also.

This morning, some wanted the Bar Association to indorse someone to be appointed by Governor Chamberlain to serve as judge until the next general election, in case the third judgeship is created. Those favored A. S. Hammond, of Coquille. However, there was much opposition, it being claimed that to indorse a candidate for judge before the legislature had acted upon the plan would be premature. They said also that many members of the association were not present, and it would

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not be right to pledge the Bar Association to any candidate without allowing the absent members a voice in the proceedings. The advisability of recommending a republican (Hammond) before Governor Chamberlain, a democrat, had signed the bill to be enacted was also questioned.
