Are you preparing to participate in the Strawberry Fair next week? That would be a good time to celebrate the beginning of Roseburg's street paving work, too.

Business is the important feature with everybody nowadays. The advance the business part of any live newspaper, and if you fail to read them you are overlooking valuable business opportunities that will often save you more than the price of a year's subscription. Read the business news as well as the other departments.

Cool Bay's railroad movement is certainly getting attention through the newspapers of the state. That region has a volume of resources great to be kept bottled up much longer. One important lesson the people of the Bay have learned, and that is that they can expect nothing from Mr. Harriman in the way of railroad communication. He may be expected to "get busy," however, as soon as they start a line of their own, as is now being agitated.

Have you any blooded livestock? If so, bring it in during the Strawberry Fair next week. There'll be lots of people here and when it comes to a display of blooded animals everybody likes to be "shown." Do you realize that a vast portion of our own people don't really know how much high class, pure blooded livestock there is in this county. If every owner will exhibit only one specimen the result will be astonishing—but each is invited to bring more.

The Eugene Commercial Club has passed a strong resolution in opposition to the proposed referendum against the Oregon Agricultural College. The club has on record an opposing said referendum, and will use all honorable means to prevent the invoking of said referendum and favors all necessary appropriation for the maintenance of said college. Continued wrangling has killed at the state normal schools, and now an unprogressive element wants to destroy the colleges. Such a spirit belongs to the dark ages—not to the twentieth century.

Since the Roseburg street paving bonds are positively to be sold and accepted before the end of this week wouldn't it be a good plan to have Manager Archibald, of the Warren Construction Co., here at that time and get the paving contract signed up at once by all parties, so the actual work on the streets, preparatory to the paving, can be commenced next week? We understand this contract has already been signed by the Warren people, who are to put in the bitulph pavement, and the curbing, and it only awaits the signatures of the city officials. Yet it would doubtless be a good plan to have the paving company's representatives present also, as it might obviate any further delays before the work is commenced. A big rock crusher should be put in place next week and set to work grinding out material while the subgrades are being built and the curbing put in place. This curbing must be built considerably in advance of the paving, so as to be thorough hardened before the material of which the paving is constructed is rolled firmly into place by a heavy steam roller. It has been about a year and a half since this street paving movement was started—now let's have no further delays, but get the work under way and have a mile or two of fine, modern streets built before the end of the present year.

PAYS TO ADVERTISE TIMES

Discussing the organized publicity work of Spokane and the value of free advertising given by the newspapers there, the Traverse City, Mich., Evening Record says: "Carping and criticizing are sometimes much easier than praising and commending. Hence the newspapers that radiate cheerfulness and hope and trust and faith in the city and its welfare and continually bring forth its good points—must be published in a city where such things are worth while."

The same paper declares that municipal advertising brings results, "and these results would become apparent were the local papers to take to hammering the city."

And the Spokane-Review says: "Of course it pays. No one ever goes into a city or growing town who has not previously heard of it. Publicity in some form or other is as necessary to the settling up of new lands and the building up of young towns and cities as the planting of seed is necessary to the harvesting of crops. People who think that publicity work is not needed for the fuller development of a new country cannot have given the subject consideration. Advertising has built every city in this broad western country."

The Eugene Guard agrees with these editorial opinions, but inclines to the belief that Oregon is becoming very thoroughly advertised and people are coming here by the thousand from the east. What we need to do now is to turn our attention specifically to the development of the country in order to take care of these homeseekers, providing homes and employment for them. To do this it

will be necessary to cut up the large ranches into small places, devoted to fruit-growing and intensified farming. And this can only be done by the building of electric railways which will place the markets at the very doors of the farmer. Small farming will not pay when carried on at a considerable distance from the railroad town which is relied upon for a market.

The country systematically developed along the lines suggested will bring factories with their attendant payrolls by creating a demand for the products they turn out. Dense population, engaged in prosperous pursuits, will in turn make large cities where there will be plenty of employment for workmen.

Western Oregon has reached a stage where railroad development seems an absolute necessity, and to that end it seems to us the greatest energies of our boosting organizations should be directed.

This is the way the Albany Democrat discusses boosting and boosters: "A big crowd of boosters are at Eugene today talking over the best boosting methods, with a view of a general promotion for the entire state regardless of locality, a forward movement all along the line, under modern methods. Perhaps nowhere in the world are better professional boosters than in Oregon. Tom Richardson ranks at the head, and there are others. Hartog, of Eugene, is a regular publicity fiend, a man who does things with a brass band on every corner and everybody shouting, from the youngest kid to the oldest maid in town for the place he is paid to boost. It is an era of advertising, and publicity is the watchword. Albany will continue to be in the swim."

SQUANDERED STATES' MONEY ON AFFINITY.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 5.—On fictitious and forged vouchers, which he induced Governor Mead and State Auditor C. W. Clausen to approve, Orvis Hamilton, formerly of Colfax and Spokane, secured while adjutant general and spent personally between \$20,000 and \$50,000 of state military funds, according to a partial confession made to Governor Hay and Attorney General Bell here this afternoon. Hamilton is now in custody of the sheriff here in default of \$10,000 bonds, having been arrested on complaint of the attorney general's office on the charge of larceny of state moneys.

The state expects to make good \$20,000 of his shortage from the National Surety Company of New York, by which Hamilton was bonded to that amount.

Having absolute confidence in Hamilton's honesty, Mead and Clausen audited Hamilton's vouchers in a perfunctory manner, so when the adjutant general sought a means of securing funds to spend upon his affinity, it was easily discovered.

BRUSH FIRE DESTROYS SAWMILLS AND RANCHES

KAMLOOPS, B. C., May 5.—Hundreds of thousands of dollars in property was destroyed and scores of ranchers forced to flee for their lives as the result of a disastrous brush fire that swept the country from North Hill as far west as Three Valley, and south from Skamoose as far as Vernon.

Among the losses are two large sawmills, both of which were totally consumed in the wall of flame that swept over the land. The big Carlin mill, located between Tappan Sliding and North Hill, was wiped out with a loss of \$75,000, as was also the Carrigan mill on Salmon River, valued at \$35,000.

Barns and houses fell a prey to the fire and many head of cattle were lost, while many settlers had to leave everything and hasten to save their lives.

While it is impossible to estimate the total losses, it is known they will reach nearly half a million dollars in the vicinity of Salmon Arm.

GIRL SWALLOWS POISON BECAUSE KEPT AT HOME.

PORTLAND, Or., May 5.—Ida Hansen, a pretty girl of 15 years, when refused permission to join a party of young friends who had arranged an outing for last night and had invited Miss Hansen to attend, swallowed carbolic acid and died almost before a doctor could be called to the home. The act was committed with a haste and impetuosity which was startling and so shocked the dead girl's mother, who was virtually a witness, that she is seriously ill.

Considering her daughter unusually headstrong but not to the degree that she would resort to such an extremity when not given her way, Mrs. Hansen determined yesterday to put a stop to her associating with a number of young people of whose demeanor she did not approve. After the midday meal the young girl asked her mother if she might go out last night. Mrs. Hansen talked kindly to her and gave her some good advice, ending by telling her that she would not allow her to go. Without saying a word, the girl walked into the bathroom, closed the door, took the bottle of acid and swallowed the contents.

WORK TO BE RUSHED ON FAIR BUILDINGS.

Eugene Guard: The county and district fair committees are very active just now and will continue to be so until the fair comes off next September. This morning the building committee rode out to the grounds in Cal Young's Rambler auto and decided upon the exact location of the grand stand, and work on the structure will be commenced at once. It will be located on the south side of the track, a couple of hundred feet west of the east end. It will be built square with the track, so as to give everybody in the stand an equal view to see the horses at the start and also at the finish. Some of the committee argued that it should be located in such a manner that at the finish all could see the horses without getting up out of their seats, but this arrangement would preclude a good view of the start.

The grand stand will be 144 feet long by 46 feet wide, and will seat over 1000 persons. It can be enlarged if found too small.

The stone for the pavilion, which will be a commodious affair, has all been delivered and work on the structure will be commenced at once. The track is in good condition, but rain or a good sprinkling is needed, as the ground is cracking. It was agreed this morning that a sprinkler should be hired for a few days to wet the track down and place it in good condition.

The fair association will at once place on the market a number of lots in the Fair Grounds addition which have not been offered for sale before. This is for the purpose of raising more funds for the fair.

CATHOLIC AGREEMENT NOT ENFORCED BY LAW.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 5.—Stipulations made before marriage by which one of the other party agrees to permit the education and religious training of any offspring that may be born after marriage in a given religious faith, cannot be enforced by law. Judge Matthew G. Reynolds yesterday

handed down a decision to this effect. This decision, said by attorneys to be the first of its kind, holds to be of no effect in law one of the cardinal principles of the Catholic church which requires non-Catholics who marry Catholics to sign an ante-nuptial contract giving control of the religious education of any children born of the marriage to the Catholic parent to the union.

PITTSBURG GRAFTERS RECEIVE SENTENCES.

PITTSBURG, Pa., May 5.—Sentences were imposed today on several persons convicted within the last few weeks in the municipal graft cases, as follows:

W. W. Ramsey, former National Bank president, convicted of bribery, one year and six months' imprisonment and a fine of \$100.

Captain John F. Klein, councilman, two years and a fine of \$1000 on bribery conviction and one year and six months on the conspiracy conviction. Joseph C. Wason and William Brand, former councilmen, each one year and six months and a fine of \$500, for conspiracy.

H. M. Bolger, hotelkeeper, two years and a fine of \$500 for bribery. Charles Colbert and John Colbert, convicted of attempting to bribe a jury in the Ramsey case, two years and a fine of \$500 each.

YOUNGSTOWN, O., May 5.—The American Steel and Wire company announced today that it will cut wire nails and \$4 to \$6 on various grades of wire. With the gradual reduction of \$7 to \$9 in these products, the large independent concerns will follow suit.

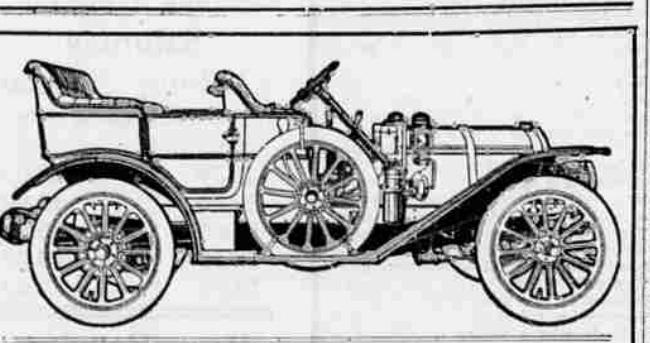
