STAND SIX TO SIX

Jurors in Short Case, Unable to Agree, Discharged

ANOTHER TRIAL MONDAY

Wilson, Alleged Safe Blower, on Trial
—Gardner "Bootlegger" Pays Fine of \$250

After a session of nineteen hours, extending through Thursday night, the jury in the case of Stephen D. Short, of Wilbur, charged with forgery, failed to agree upon a verdict. The jury received the case at two o'clock Thursday afternoon, and upon the opening of court at 9 o'clock this morning reported to Judge Hamilton that they were hopelessly divided. They were then discharged by Judge Hamilton without comment. The case will again be placed on trial next Monday morning.

The first ballot taken by the jury upon their retirement was favorable to Short, seven voting for acquittal against five for conviction. The second ballot showed the same result, but the third saw a change, one of the jurors previously favoring acquittal switching his vote in favor of conviction. Standing thus six to six, the jury struggled along for the remainder of the afternoon and during the entire night in repeated efforts to agree, but the even division established on the third ballot was maintained until the last.

"Bootlegger" Fined \$250.
The third fine imposed at this term of court for violation of the local option law was meted out to Frank Varrellmann, Jr., of Gardiner, by Judge Hamilton this afternoon. Appearing without an attorney, Varrellmann entered a plea of guilty to the charge of selling intoxicating liquor. Judge Hamilton ordered him to pay a fine of \$250. Previously to fixing this penalty, Judge Hamilton was informed by Deputy District Attorney Hermann that Varrellmann had been "bootlegging" at Gardiner for the past six or seven months. This brought the following from the judge to the defendant:

"If you have been carrying on this business for that length of time your profits doubtless will enable you to pay a fine with ease. I advise you, however, not to repeat this offense. You are fortunate in being confronted with only one indictment, because each sale of liquor constitutes a separate violation of the law. It is surprising that you have been engaged in selling liquor for so long a time without being caught. This being your first appearance in court on a charge of this nature, I will fix the penalty at a fine of \$250."

Alleged "Yegg" on Trial.
J. R. Wilson, indicted jointly with L. L. Merrill on the charge of blowing the safe at the Roseburg Steam Laundry last February, is on trial before a jury this afternoon. His attorney is Senator Albert Abraham. District Attorney Brown wanted to try Merrill at the same time, but Merrill's attorney, J. O. Watson, objected and was sustained.

The evidence against the two men is of purely circumstantial character, but it is strong. They were seen in the vicinity of the laundry immediately after the explosion, and after their arrest money was found on Wilson corresponding exactly with the amount taken from the safe—\$2.00—and made up of the same denominations of coin. Their shoes fitted exactly into the tracks in the mud both in front of the laundry and in an alley abutting the side of the building. Merrill's tracks were un-

mistakenly identified by a crack in the sole of one of his shoes, and two days after his arrest he seized an opportunity to burn up his shoes in the lobby of the city jail. The state's case against Wilson is strengthened by the fact that he is known as a safe blower all the way from Brandon, Manitoba, to Seattle, Wash.

In his opening statement to the jury, District Attorney Brown said he intended to prove, among other things, that Wilson had practically acknowledged the crime. Attorney Abraham, in outlining the defendant's case, charged that the evidence against Wilson had been born of distorted imagination on part of the authorities, who were actuated by a desire to make a "reputation for themselves."

More Indictment.
Another indictment by the grand jury was announced today. It charges J. E. Hall and A. A. McCulloch with gambling. McCulloch has already acknowledged his guilt and will act as a witness for the state if Hall stands trial.

CATTLE BEING DRAWN

TO THE NORTHWEST.

Heavy Shipments Which are Usually Sent to Chicago Diverted by the Heavy Demand.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—Shortage of beef in the Pacific Northwest has resulted in large shipments of dressed beef and livestock from California to points in Oregon and Washington within the past 14 days. Montana and Wyoming have been unable to meet the demands of the coast states, which have been compelled to call on the dealers for shipments usually sent to Chicago.

All parts of the state have been drawn upon by the northern buyers. While the larger portion of the beef has gone out of the San Joaquin Valley, San Luis Obispo has also been making some good shipments. The Newhalls' Gradenoupe ranch in San Luis Obispo has sent 78 cars of livestock to Oregon and Washington points since last Saturday.

The Chicago market will feel the effects of the heavy northern demand. Among the shippers who have deflected their product to the north is Isaac Bird of the Bald Eagle ranch, near Atholene, who usually ships from three to five trains of livestock to Chicago. There is also a much heavier movement from Arizona to Kansas points this year than ever before.

For Right of Way For an Electric Railroad

COOS COUNTY TO ROSEBURG

Contract Awarded For Big Bridge Over South Umpqua Between Riddle and Myrtle Creek

A contract for the construction of a wagon bridge across the South Umpqua River, on the new road between Myrtle Creek and Riddle, was awarded by the County Court this afternoon to Charles G. Sheely, of Denver, Colo., for the total sum of \$3955. This bridge will be located about one mile and a half north of the town of Riddle. The main span will be of the Smith truss pattern and 180 feet in length, with a 50-foot approach on each end. This span will be supported by large concrete cylinders at each end, and the superstructure is to be fully sided up and covered with a shingle roof. The work is to be commenced right away and the bridge completed by Sept. 1, 1909. The contractor is to furnish all material and labor for the construction of this bridge. The contractor's agent, M. H. Mathison, was present and the contract was signed up immediately after the contract was awarded.

Western Bridge and Construction Co. of Sacramento, California, \$4275
E. G. Perham, of Marshfield, for labor only, \$1700

Several bids were received for doing the rock work on the Perdrie and Tiller road, and the court took up their consideration late this afternoon.

For Electric Railway.

Messrs. J. H. Somers and Jacob Haas, of Marshfield, claiming to represent Portland capitalists, appeared before the court asking a franchise for the construction of an electric railway over certain county roads in this county, as follows:

"On the road known as the Coos Bay wagon road, and leading from Coos county through Douglas county to Roseburg, through the Looking Glass valley, also beginning at the Douglas and Coos county lines on the middle fork of the Coquille river, thence following the general direction of the county roads through

Camas valley, by way of Olalla, Happy Valley, or Brockway to Dilards; thence following the said county road in a general direction to Winston and on to Roseburg; and beginning at Roseburg, and following Deer Creek to junction of Tp. 27 to the north fork of the said Deer creek, and up the said county road to the left to Oak Creek, and following the said county road in a general direction to the forks of the North Umpqua and Little rivers, at Glide; then following the said county road in a general direction along the North Umpqua river, by way of the Lone Rock ferry, crossing the said river and up the same in a general direction by way of Tioga to the said Douglas county line at Diamond lake, adjoining Klamath county."

Messrs. Somers and Haas also ask the right to erect and maintain poles and wires for electric power and telegraph and telephone lines. They further specify that:

"Said railroad shall be standard gauge and shall be equipped for transportation of passengers, freight, the U. S. mails and to carry on a general railroad business. That work shall be commenced within six months, and one-half of the line completed from Coos county to the Southern Pacific railway in the Roseburg territory, and in operation in 18 months and to be fully built and equipped to connect Coos and Douglas counties with transportation to Coos Bay within 24 months from the date hereof, and in case the road is not so built this right of way to cease and be of no effect."

The petitioners declare that they are not backed in this enterprise by the Southern Pacific company. The court has the application under consideration.

DAY OF TRAGEDIES

Mother Kills Three Children Then Takes Own Life

OREGON RANCHER SLAYS 2

Bandit Shoots Man in Seattle Saloon —Harriman Wins in Dispute 25 Years Old

MIDDLETOWN, Conn., May 21.—Heartlessly cutting the throats of her three little children, aged 10 months, 7 years and 10 years, Mrs. Lewis Carson, an attractive woman of 35 years, committed suicide in the same manner at her home in this city today. The 7-year-old child is expected to die before night. The other two children are dead. It is supposed that some act on part of one of the children enraged Mrs. Carson to a point of insanity. She used a razor in the horrible tragedy.

Eastern Oregon Tragedy.

PENDELTON, Or., May 21.—According to a report received here today, Mike Ryan shot and instantly killed William Dixon and perhaps fatally wounded a man named Shubert, near Geer Springs, fifty miles from this city, yesterday. Shubert was in Dixon's employ. He and Ryan were neighbors. Ryan forbade Shubert using a certain piece of his land for a road, threatening to kill him if he did. Returning home from Milton, Shubert and Dixon traversed the forbidden land and Ryan, meeting them, pulled out his revolver and fired. The bullet passed through the body of Dixon, who had jumped in front of Shubert to protect him, and then entered Shubert's body, making what is reported to be a mortal wound. Dixon was instantly killed. Ryan is under arrest.

Bandit Holds up Saloon.

TACOMA, Wash., May 21.—After shooting down Carl Glock, who was chatting with friends in the barroom of the Patmore Hotel and then ordering the wounded man propped up in a corner with his hands above his head, a lone bandit, his face concealed by a handkerchief, last night held seven men at bay with his revolver and robbed the cash till, getting \$7 and a gold watch. The shooting of Glock was the bandit's way of announcing his presence in the saloon.

Harriman Wins Famous Portland Gateway Case.

PORTLAND, Or., May 21.—Word was received today from Washington, D. C., that the Interstate Commerce Commission had decided the famous controversy between the Hill and Harriman lines, involving the Portland gateway case in favor of Harriman. The decision is that the Northern Pacific must join with the Union Pacific and O. R. & N. in selling by way of Portland through tickets between Puget Sound and eastern points. This dispute has existed for the past 25 years. It will now be possible to buy tickets in any eastern city to Puget Sound points and have such tickets read "via Portland." Heretofore those coming by way of Portland to Puget Sound had to buy another ticket north upon arrival in this city.

WHY PEOPLE OF NEW YORK

DON'T GO TO CHURCH.

Ray Stannard Baker, writing in the June American Magazine on "The Godlessness of New York," draws attention to the increasing lack of interest on the part of the people to church work and to religion. Mr. Baker blames the churches for this and asks the very pertinent question: "Why don't the people go to church?" His answer to this question is as follows:

"Upon the question of doing, the ministry has divided itself roughly into two great classes. One has sought to save the church by strengthening the institution as it is at present; this, indeed, was natural in the first impulse. Many church leaders have been seeking endowments, building more churches and parish houses, preaching more energetically. And like any institutional group under pressure, its position has often been one of denial and opposition. Having no power of prophecy, no triumphant message, it has scattered its energies in preaching and working against various minor evils. Thus we find the united clergy of various cities campaigning with enthusiasm against Sunday baseball, Sunday concerts, vaudeville, and moving picture performances—the amusements of the poor."

"Now, I am not entering into the question of vaudeville theatres, moving picture shows and the like (no doubt they are bad enough and need to be closely looked after) nor am I even inquiring why the expensive Sunday automobile, yachting, opera concerts, and golf of the rich are not as evil in their results as the baseball and vaudeville of the poor—I am merely illustrating this tendency to preach and organize against things, instead of preaching and organizing for things. If they could do away with Sunday vaudeville, Sunday baseball, Sunday concerts—what next? How could they supply the deficiency? The people won't come to church anyway. About the only time the workman really feels the church is when the church tries to take away some of his pleasures!"
