SCARECROW PUTS MAN TO AWFUL FLIGHT.

NOVATO, Calif., June 20.—His head and face covered with lacerations and his body frightfully bruised, James Ross, a rancher, lies at his home recovering from injuries sustained while fleeing from a scarecrow he believed to be a highwayman.

Ross was driving to his home from Novato late yesterday. Passing a field he saw standing near a fence a shabbily dressed man who held an upraised gun.

Terrified, Ross lashed his horse to a gallop and flashed by the scarecrow at a frightful pace. He continued to beat the horse until it got beyond his control.

While crossing a bridge over an arroyo near Ross' home, the frenzied horse plunged into the rocky bed of the stream, pulling the light wagon after it.

Ross was dazed by his fall but dragged himself to the ranch house. The horse was killed instantly.
