CELEBRATION AT DRAIN.

National Anniversary Exercises Bring Out a Large Attendance.

DRAIN, Or., July 5.—Puffing 2000 is the estimate placed on the number of people that attended the national day celebration held here Saturday, and the most successful event of its kind ever "puffed off" in this city. Not an accident of any kind happened to mar the joyousness of the occasion and all went home well satisfied with the pleasures of the day. The weather was ideal and from the very break of day people began to roll in to town from all directions, and it soon became difficult to elbow one's way along the sidewalks.

At ten o'clock the procession formed at the Odd Fellows' Hall for the parade. A considerable number of floats appeared and, taken altogether, it created not a little surprise to those taking part in its makeup. The procession was headed by the Elton Band, of 12 pieces, and followed by a buggy conveying Hon. C. L. Parker, our local newspaper man, as president of the day, and Rev. A. F. Lacy, of Lebanon, orator of the day. Then followed, each in a separate vehicle, characters representing "Uncle Sam," "George and Martha Washington," "Gods of Liberty," "Queen of Electricity," the "Rebels," "Justice" and "Oregon," and "Drain," the Gateway to the Coast," the latter gotten up by the local Oregon Western Railway boys.

Besides the three wagons necessary to carry the 48 little girls representing the state, the float "Everybody Works But Father" and several plucky characters were in evidence. The parade disbanded at the livery stable corner and everybody moved to the beautifully decorated grove, near the Methodist Church, to witness the program. Just here we wish to say that much credit is due Mrs. E. R. Applegate, who was chairman of the decorating committee, for the splendid appearance of things around the grounds.

Mr. Parker presided in an able manner, introducing each number with some pleasing remarks. Rev. Roy L. Dunn pronounced the invocation. Miss Edna Patchen read the Declaration of Independence, the Misses Julia Kirkland and Dolly Collwell each gave recitations, and the oration, pronounced by many to be the best they had ever heard on a similar occasion, by Rev. Lacy. These were interspersed with the national airs by a chorus choir and several pieces by the band. John Wagoner was marshal of the day.

In the afternoon the Loran and Drain baseball teams crossed bats in the South Drain field, the former winning the game and the prize.

Harry Moon won the 100 yards foot race and Fred Miller the bicycle race. The lunch and refreshment stands and the merry-go-round on the grounds did a thriving business and a grand ball in the evening at the opera house for those who desired to "trip the light fantastic" completed the day of pleasure.

Accident Near Yoncalla.

An accident, the results of which might have been much more serious, happened Monday morning about nine o'clock, as Mrs. C. D. Drain and Mrs. N. D. Cool, of this city, were on their way to a celebration at Scotts Valley. When within about a half mile of the celebration grounds in their single buggy, a wagon containing an organ with a white covering, came suddenly into the highway, from a side road, and frightened their horse. He dashed out of the road onto a hillside, where the buggy upset, throwing the occupants to the ground and dragged them several feet, finally tearing the front wheels of the vehicle loose with which he raced wildly down the road. A Yoncalla livery team happened along just at the time and conveyed the unfortunate ladies to Yoncalla, where Dr. Mortensen attended them. Mrs. Drain was considerably bruised and scratched about the face and head and badly shaken up, and Mrs. Cool sustained a cut on the forehead that required five stitches, and other severe bruises. Their husbands, on hearing the news, drove to Yoncalla and brought them home, arriving about one o'clock. The buggy was badly wrecked.

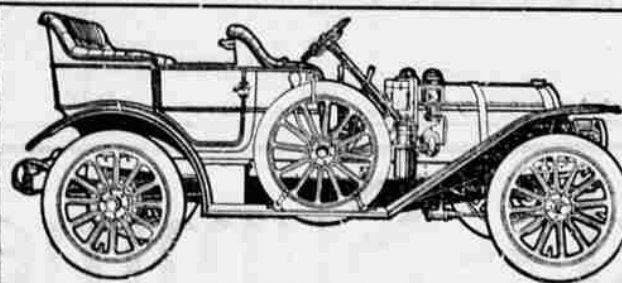

FEDERAL TIMBER IN DEMAND.

Much Bought on Stumpage Basis Near Crater Lake.

Officials of the forest service located in Portland report considerable activity in the vicinity of Crater Lake and Klamath Falls among private interests in the purchase of timber from the government on a stumpage basis. Under the direction of the forest service such timber is disposed of to private parties for from \$1.50 to \$3.00 a 1000 feet stumpage. With the exception of the locality referred to very little of the government holdings in this state is being disposed of.

This is due to two reasons. In the first place private interests very generally retain extensive holdings which will last them for years. Secondly, the reserves as a rule are not very accessible in this state owing to lack of transportation facilities. In succeeding years, the government, through its established systematic method for managing its forests, expects to do an extensive business in this direction. As private holdings are depleted, the demand for the reserve forest lands will increase and the stumpage charge that will be asked by the government will advance accordingly.

TARIFF BILL PROVISIONS.

Maximum and Minimum are Tacked Onto the Measure.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—The Senate today adopted maximum and minimum provisions of the tariff bill by a vote of 38 to 18. The measure is to go into effect March 11, 1910, and ninety days must elapse before the president's proclamation applying the maximum duty of 25 per cent ad valorem in addition to regular tariff duties will be operative. Duty on tea and coffee provided for in the amendment originally reported by the finance committee was stricken out by the committee. The senate also agreed to vote on the submission of the income tax amendment to the constitution to the several states. A vote will be taken Monday afternoon.

ASHLAND BUSINESS MEN

Examine a Copper Mine.

BALLOON EXPLODES.

REDDING, Calif., July 3.—In the presence of several thousand spectators, the dirigible balloon America suddenly exploded at a local recreation park Saturday, fatally injuring Captain James Moore, the aeronaut, and Milton Mygatt, a by-stander. Several spectators were knocked down and seriously hurt as the immense crowd made a rush to get away from the scene of the accident. Moore has a broken pelvis, a fractured right hip and right arm, and two-thirds of the surface of his body is frightfully burned. Mygatt, who is 80 years of age, was thrown to the ground with such force by the explosion that he sustained a fractured hip. Neither man is expected to live.
