SINCERE EFFORT TO KEEP PROMISE—TAFT.

Says Tariff Bill Not Perfect, but Justifies Claim That Revision Has Been Downward.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—President Taft tonight gave out a statement embodying his view of the new tariff act. The statement follows:

"I have signed the Payne tariff bill because I believe it to be the result of sincere effort on the part of the republican party to make a downward revision and to comply with the promises of the platform as they have been generally understood and as I interpreted them in the campaign."

"This is not a perfect tariff bill or a complete compliance with the promises made, strictly interpreted, but a fulfillment free from criticism in respect to a subject matter involving many schedules and thousands of articles could not be expected. It suffices to say that except with regard to whisky, liquors and wines, and in regard to silks and to some high classes of cottons, all of which may be treated as luxuries and proper subjects of a revenue tariff, there have been very few increases in the rates."

"There have been a great number of real decreases in rates and they constitute a sufficient amount to justify the statement that this bill is a substantial downward revision and a reduction of excessive rates."

"This is not a free trade bill. It was not intended to be. The republican party did not promise to make a free trade bill. It promised to make the rates protective, but to reduce them when they exceeded the difference between the cost of production abroad and here, making allowances for the greater normal profit on active investments here. I believe that, while the excess has not been reduced in a number of cases, in a great majority the rates are such as are necessary to protect American industries, but are low enough, in case of abnormal increase of demand and raising of prices, to permit the possibility of importing the foreign article and thus to prevent excessive prices."

"The corporate tax is a just and equitable excise measure, which it is hoped will produce a sufficient amount to prevent a deficit and which incidentally will secure valuable statistics and information concerning the many corporations of the country, and will constitute an important step toward that degree of publicity and regulation which the tendency in corporate enterprises in the last 20 years has shown to be necessary."

BOURNE AND ELLIS IN DEADLOCK OVER BEACH

Congressman Names Multnomah Senator for Census Supervisor, But Bourne Opposes.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—Senator Bourne today announced his opposition to the appointment of Seneca C. Beach, of Portland, as Census Supervisor for the Second Congressional District. Representative Ellis has formally recommended the appointment of Beach, and will not withdraw it. The fight probably will be carried to the White House. Bourne does not indicate a preference for any particular person.

In other states Senators are taking no part in the selection of Census Supervisors. It being conceded these appointments belong to Congressmen. Bourne, however, says Beach is obnoxious to him, and insists that under the old delegation agreement Ellis is under the obligation to name a man not objectionable to any other member of the delegation. In view of the fact that Bourne is the only member of the delegation who so far has gone back on that agreement, Ellis insists that he will not withdraw his recommendation of Beach unless the President declines to appoint him.

It is known that census officials would willingly appoint Beach if Bourne would step aside. Ellis has hopes that the dispute will be settled before he leaves next Monday.

PIONEER OF '49 WRITES POETRY AT AGE OF 95.

O. W. Akers Celebrates Birthday by Intellectual Feat—Nerve so Steady he Can Shave.

O. W. Akers, probably the oldest resident of Douglas County, celebrated his 95th birthday in Roseburg last Sunday, August 1, by writing a few stanzas of poetry, quite an intellectual feat for a man who has almost reached the century mark of life. That he also possesses a remarkably steady nerve for one so old is attested by the fact that Mr. Akers still shaves himself without any trouble. He walks about town almost daily, giving personal attention to his affairs, and reads the newspapers regularly, using his eyeglasses only for fine print.

Mr. Akers is a native of Kentucky, a state that is noted for the hardihood and longevity of its sons and daughters. He was a steamboat pilot on the Mississippi river during antebellum days, and in 1849 crossed the plains with an ox-team, settling in this state. The poetry which Mr. Akers composed follows:

I am near across the stormy sea
Of life,
I'll soon leave time and go where
There's no strife;
Landing safe, I hope, upon another
Land,
Free, at last, from storms on every
Hand.

I've been at pleasant dinners—
Happy times—
But things have changed in this
Cold clime;
Many of my friends have gone
Before,
And landed safe upon a brighter
Shore.

My life's voyage has not been in
Vain;
I've been kind, and aided others
To gain,
But when I was in need there was
Not a hand
Extended to meet my humble de-
mand.

In youth one's years are slow,
In age, how fast they go!
In youth one's time we waste,
In age we try to rectify mistakes;
In youth we think of worldly
Pleasure,
In age we may repent at leisure;
In youth we'd like in this wicked
World to stay,
In age we have pains and sorrows,
So we want to get away.

OREGON REPUBLICAN ASSEMBLY THIS FALL.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 5.—Members of the Republican state central committee are to meet in Portland early this fall for the purpose of considering plans for holding a state assembly next summer. W. M. Calk, chairman of the committee, will issue a call for this preliminary conference, which will probably be held in October. Sentiment among Republicans throughout the state favors the assembly plan for the double reason that it serves to bring out as candidates men best qualified for the office and at the same time makes for party organization and responsibility.

While the details of selecting delegates has not been worked out, it is promised that the assembly will consist of between 1200 and 1500 delegates. The proposed plan contemplates that there shall be one delegate from every precinct in the state. There being approximately 1000 precincts, this would give the assembly a membership of 1000 with which to start. The more thickly populated districts will probably be given additional representation, apportioned on the basis of population or registration of voters.

Republicans favoring the assembly predict that they do not expect anything but opposition from Senator Bourne and his followers. A report has gained circulation that C. W. Fulton, ex-United States Senator, may be nominated for governor by the assembly. There are no less than a dozen aspirants for this honor, and the rumor is that in the event the delegates should fail to agree on any one of the active candidates, then Fulton is to be suggested as a compromise.

PORTLAND, Or., Aug. 5.—Whatever may have been her condition of mind when she shot down her husband, Dr. Roy A. Miles Collins, one week ago Tuesday morning, Mrs. Collins is now both legally and medically sane and must stand trial for murder. This is the unanimous finding of the three alienists who sat as a lunacy board.

The findings of the commission that Mrs. Collins is not at present insane will probably have no effect on the stand of the defense that Mrs. Collins was insane at the time Dr. Collins was killed. The commission's

report specifically refers to her mental condition only at the present time and makes no attempt to declare her state of mind two weeks or ten days ago.
