TAPT SNUBS BOURNE BY NAMING BEACH.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Ap-
pointment of Robert J. Hendricks, of
Salem, as Census Supervisor of the
First Oregon District and State Sen-
ator Seneca C. Beach, as Supervisor
of the Second District, announced at
Beverly last night, is a decided victory
for Representatives Hawley and Ellis,
who respectively recommended the
appointments.
Senator Bourne undertook to pre-
vail upon the president to take this
patronage from the congressmen and
give it to him, and, failing in that,
objected as strongly as he could to
the appointment of Mr. Beach, who,
he said, was obnoxious to him. He
did not favor Mr. Hendricks, either,
as Mr. Hendricks in his paper has
printed editorials critical to the new
order of things in Oregon politics
and at this Mr. Bourne took offense.
It is understood that Mr. Hen-
dricks and Mr. Beach were appointed
because the indorsements filed by
Messrs. Hawley and Ellis showed
them competent men and further-
more, because the Director of the
Census and Secretary of Commerce
and Labor are opposed to allowing
senators to control these appoint-
ments.

Messrs. Hendricks and Beach are
now given recess appointments, and
take office immediately and their
nominations will be sent to the sen-
ate in December. Mr. Bourne may
then undertake to prevent confirma-
tion, particularly to Mr. Beach. But
unless he can secure actual rejection
of the nomination, he cannot keep
Mr. Beach out of office. His present
recess appointment in the event he
falls of confirmation through non-
action of the senate, will carry him
through to the close of the next ses-
sion of Congress, when he can be re-
appointed. The same is true of Mr.
Hendricks.

ROBIN'S CATCH PAYS FIFTY-DOLLAR FINE.

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 15.—Joshua
Ballard was yesterday fined \$50 for
costs by Justice of the Peace Porter,
after a trial lasting all day Friday,
and which resulted in the jury bring-
ing in a verdict of guilty. Fred
Robbin, a detective of the Oregon
Anti-Saloon League, swore he bought
a pint of whiskey from Ballard on
the street; G. E. Kellogg, of the Ore-
gon Free Press, of Salem, testified
that he witnessed the sale.
Claude Miller was yesterday fined
\$50 and costs. The court imposed a
lenient fine after Miller had entered
a plea of guilty and promised to stop
selling liquor in this city in the fu-
ture.

BUILT S. P. R. R. BRIDGES FROM ROSEBURG SOUTH

ALBANY, Or., Aug. 15.—Albert S.
Miller, father of Henry R. Miller,
United States Consul General at
Yokohama, Japan, and of Frank J.
Miller, State Senator from Linn and
Lane counties, died yesterday in Al-
bany, after a long illness. He was
born in Massachusetts 88 years ago,
and came to Oregon in 1873. As a
railroad contractor he built all the
bridges on the Southern Pacific be-
tween Roseburg and Rogue River,
when the line was first built, then
had charge of construction of bridge-
work for the O. R. & N. east of Portland
and later was in mercantile business
in Portland. He was a Mason of
high rank.
