#### ATTENTION DRAWN BY SURVEY FROM OAKLAND

G. A. Signalness Believes Terminal is Sought on East Side of Bay—Company Meets.

Marshfield Mall: G. A. Signalness, of Roseburg, B. N. Johnson, of Duluth, Minn., Senator E. J. Swedback, of Minneapolis, and O. C. Sether, of Glendale, officers of the Crawford Point Land Company and the Coos Bay Townsite Company, are in Marshfield to look after their interests and attend the development congress. Tomorrow, they will hold their annual business meetings for both companies at the secretary's residence in Coos-ton. N. F. Throne, the secretary, arrived in today from Roseburg, where he has been for several weeks. These two companies own between eight and nine hundred acres of the most favorably situated land on the east side of the bay and have sold off quite a portion of their original holdings. They have some fine water-front.

Mr. Signalness stated that he is greatly interested in the railroad survey that is being made from Oakland this way. The surveyors have worked over several routes since striking the mountains and have acquired considerable right of way in Douglas County, in the vicinity of Coles valley. Several crews have been seen on the property on the east side of Coos Bay and Mr. Signalness believes the company is looking for terminals on that side. This survey is one that is shrouded in mystery and nobody has yet got a line on the company's intentions.

OREGON BOY DEFEATS WORLD-FAMOUS SHOTS.

Captures Governor's Trophy at Camp Perry by Six Points Over Major Winder.

CAMP PERRY, O., Aug. 20.—The greatest sensation ever developed in connection with National rifle competition was created here this morning when H. O. Roesech, an Oregon young man under 21, was bulletted as winner in the Governor's match. He beat the world-famous marksmen who have been firing in international contests for years and walked away with the \$500 trophy cup offered. In addition he will receive a gold medal and \$50 in cash, as well as jumping into prominence throughout the service.

Phenomenal scores were made by the Oregon youth in the match. At 800 yards he made a perfect score, 50 out of 50. At 1000 yards he lost but one point in 50. In the skirmish run his total was 98 out of 100, and at 200 yards rapid fire he made the most unusual total of 43, firing 10 shots in 40 seconds.

Expert is Defeated. The second man in the contest, Major Winder, was beaten by half a dozen points, and Winder is one of the foremost military shots in the world, having represented the United States in all the big tournaments abroad.

Young Roesech is a new man at the game. He is at Camp Perry with the United States Naval Academy team, and his home is at Pendleton. There were 500 riflemen who entered the match.

### PHILAN SAYS DEFENSE HAS SPENT \$1,000,000.

Prosecution Has Cost Near \$200,000, and City Has no Intention of Discontinuing Work.

PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—Careful estimates, based upon a knowledge of court procedure and the work of municipal and private detectives, assert former Mayor James D. Phelan, of San Francisco, make it appear that already the cost prosecutions at the Golden Gate have cost the defense in the neighborhood of \$4,000,000.

This amount is reported to have been spent in attorneys fees, the employment of detectives and other secret agents, procuring information as to taxpayers, bribery of witnesses, including others to disappear when most wanted, buying immunity through judges and juries, and the maintenance of a costly press bureau.

The cost of the prosecution to the city and county of San Francisco according to Mr. Phelan, has been about \$170,000, while the citizens engaged in reform work, headed by Rudolph Spreckels, have expended as much more. Moreover he declared, no matter how great the drain on private citizens' coffers, they will not hesitate to furnish financial aid as long as there remains a reasonable chance of convicting those in high places guilty of rascality and corruption.

AGRICULTURAL OPPORTUNITIES.

Ten years ago a man wanted to borrow \$1500 on 100 acres of land in the Yakima valley, and couldn't get it from a loan company because the security was not considered sufficient; the careful money lenders doubted whether the land was really worth \$15 an acre. tried to borrow 10 years ago on 100 acres—fruit. He doesn't need to borrow any money now. The money lenders would be glad to lend him \$50,000 on the same land that they couldn't see \$1500 in 10 years ago.

The same thing, practically, if not in quite so great a degree in many cases, is true in numerous localities in Oregon. And it is not always fruit, either. It may be vegetables, or alfalfa or wheat. In the course of a year, The Journal, always on the watch for these accomplishments, mentions probably a hundred verifiable instances where a person has made from \$500 to \$1000 in a single year off a single acre of strawberries. An acre of cabbage, or onions, may yield from \$100 to \$300. So with other things which we city folks want and pay cheerfully whatever is asked.

There are 10,000 opportunities in a hundred localities in this splendid Pacific Northwest to do what is here indicated; to get more every year off a small piece of land than one can pay for it. And many people are finding this out.

The wonder is that enough young men stay in the towns to do the business necessary to be done, at small salaries, when the glorious country holds out such opportunities of becoming independent and fairly wealthy with a small investment and not very hard labor.
