ODD FELLOWS INCREASED 63,475 MEMBERS IN YEAR

Revenue For Same Period \$16,370.
 600—Grand Sire Opposes Any
 More Branches of Order.

SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 20.—The
 Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Inde-
 pendent Order of Oddfellows of the
 United States and Canada, after be-
 ing welcomed to the state and city at
 a public meeting in the Moore
 Theatre, adjourned to Oddfellows
 Temple, and began its sessions, to
 which only members having the
 Grand Lodge degree were admitted.
 The annual report of Acting Grand
 Sire W. L. Kuykendall showed the
 membership of the order throughout
 the world at the close of 1908 to
 be as follows:
 Subordinate membership, 1,452,
 475; encampment membership, 216,
 225; Rebekah lodge membership,
 603,931; Patriarchal Militant mem-
 bership, 22,135; total membership in-
 cluding subordinate lodge members
 and sisters only of Rebekah lodges,
 1,888,376.
 The total net increase for the
 year throughout the world was 93,
 475.
 The total revenue for the year was
 \$16,370.937. The expenditures for
 relief were \$5,509,545. The total in-
 vested funds of the order were \$45,
 211,855.
 The grand sire recommended the
 adoption of legislation that will pre-
 vent members from engaging in the
 creation and fostering either of any
 society which bases its membership
 wholly or mainly from any branch
 of their order. This legislation is de-
 sired to prevent formation of other
 women's organizations than the Re-
 bekahs.
 In the statistics of membership
 the quasi-independent grand lodges
 of Australia, Denmark, Germany,
 Sweden and Switzerland are in-
 cluded. They have no delegates in
 the present meeting.
 Acting Grand Sire Kuykendall
 was elected deputy grand sire at the De-
 cember Sovereign Grand Lodge last
 September, and became acting head
 of the order upon the death of Grand
 Sire John L. Nolen.

At today's session W. L. Kuyken-
 dall of Wyoming, was chosen grand
 sire, and John B. Cockrum, of In-
 dianapolis, Ind., was elected deputy
 grand sire.

BEGIN WORK ON PORT
ORFORD ROAD SEPT. 23.
 BANDON, Or., Sept. 20.—The pro-
 moters of the Bandon-Port Orford
 Railroad are getting ready for actual
 construction work, which is to begin
 September 23, the first day of the
 Bandon carnival. The sale of stock
 in the road is progressing rapidly,
 and the men having this work in
 charge say it is the easiest proposi-
 tion to sell they have ever under-
 taken. They tell purchasers there is
 enough freight being hauled out of
 the territory now by season to in-
 sure an 8 per cent dividend on the
 investment for the entire road, and
 point out that the wealth of the
 country is not even tapped yet. The
 timber along the line is said to in-
 sure success for years to come, with
 the development of the country to
 bank on beside.

WHY YOUNG MEN KEEP **OUT OF THE MINISTRY.**

Spreading Gospel on Mere Pittance
 Compares Poorly With Other
 Chances of Good Pay.

Average yearly salaries paid by
 American Protestant churches:
 Methodist About \$480
 Baptist No complete statistics
 Presbyterian About \$700
 Congregational About \$900
 Episcopal About \$600
 Writing in Munsey's Magazine for
 October, Walter Prichard Eaton de-
 clares, in the course of an article on
 "The Ministry as a Profession":
 "The Protestant churches are
 alarmed over the dwindling number
 of students in their seminaries, and
 the increased difficulty of securing
 worthy recruits for the ministry. The
 minister is not, if possible, as he
 made easier, no less for practical con-
 siderations—even if these are not al-
 ways confessed—than for ethical
 ones.
 "We pay the workman \$3 a day—
 or a little more—to build the church;
 and we pay the clergyman \$2 a day
 —or a little less—to preach in it.
 "To increase the salaries of minist-
 ers to a point where they can support
 and educate their families in decency
 and have a small margin over for the
 necessity of books and the luxury of
 a reserve, to a point where they are
 beyond the gnawing cares and nerv-
 ous drain of poverty, is a crying
 need of the Protestant churches to-
 day.
 "The demand for young, active
 ministers is at present greater than
 the supply, and a young man of marked
 ability is practically certain of a com-
 fortable living almost as soon as he
 steps out of his divinity-school. It
 is the young minister who is in de-
 mand today, especially in the large
 city churches. The ministers them-
 selves say that their 'dead line' is
 reached at the fiftieth year.
 "Present conditions have now im-
 proved more than poverty, because of
 the increased cost of living, they have
 come to impose privation, and intel-
 lectual, if not sometimes almost phys-
 ical, starvation.
 "On the other hand, to ask men to
 come into the ministry, to tempt them
 to come, because of the financial re-
 wards, is to debase Christianity and
 to insult its Founder. Fortunately,
 there seems to be no immediate dan-
 ger of this particular insult."

FAMOUS GREENBACK MINE **BONDED; 15 MEN AT WORK.**

Medford Tribune: The famous
 Greenback mine of Placer, in Jose-
 phine county, has been bonded by two
 of the former employees of the prop-
 erty—C. W. Thompson, formerly the
 general manager, and J. P. Anderson,
 the former superintendent.
 After a long period of idleness,
 these parties have succeeded in get-
 ting a working bond on the property
 and will again put it in operation. Mr.
 Anderson, who is giving his whole
 attention to the mine, now has 15
 men at work opening up the tunnels
 and getting the property in workable
 condition. They are already running
 ten of the battery of 40 stamps in
 the mill, and with very satisfactory
 results. Mr. Thompson says they are
 well pleased with the showing already
 made.
 This mine has been a great pro-
 ducer in its palmy days, at one time
 supporting a large camp and turning
 out gold at the rate of \$40,000 a
 month. Mr. Thompson states that it
 has turned out fully \$1,500,000 in
 gold.
