FEDERAL BUILDING BILL.

Copy of Roseburg Measure Introduced by Senator Bourne.

Following is a copy of the bill introduced in the U. S. Senate for a Federal building in Roseburg, just received by Secretary Geo. Neuner, of the Roseburg Commercial Club.

In the Senate of the United States, December 7, 1909. Mr. Bourne introduced the following bill, which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Public Buildings and Grounds.

A Bill, To provide for the purchase of a site and for the erection of a public building thereon at Roseburg, Oregon.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to acquire, by purchase, condemnation, or otherwise, a site, and cause to be erected thereon a suitable building, including fireproof vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, and approaches, for the use and accommodation of the United States post office, the United States land office, and other federal offices, at Roseburg, in the state of Oregon, the cost of same not to exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

EX-SENATOR HARRIS DEAD.

Kansas Farmer-Legislator Taken by Heart Disease.

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—Ex-United States Senator W. A. Harris, of Kansas, died suddenly here today at the home of a relative. Heart disease was given as the cause of death.

Mr. Harris, who was senator from Kansas from 1897 to 1903, was born at Loudoun, Va., October 29, 1841, and graduated from Columbian College, Washington, D. C., in 1869. During the war he served as an ordnance officer, and in 1865 removed to Kansas and engaged in civil engineering, entering the employ of the Union Pacific railroad. Since 1876 Senator Harris has been a farmer and breeder of shorthorn cattle. He was a member of the lower house of Congress from 1893 to 1895, having been elected on the Populist ticket.

WALLA WALLA VOTES "WET."

WALLA WALLA, Dec. 20.—After a campaign notable for the intense partisanship displayed by the respective factions, Walla Walla today voted "wet" by a majority of 622. The total vote cast was 2638, which is 81 per cent of the registered vote. The "drys" are already preparing to carry the campaign into the municipal election next July and elect a "dry" council. They will attempt to regulate the liquor traffic in Walla Walla in this manner. The present administration is decidedly wet. It being said that every city employe voted wet.

While the campaign was still young the business men's committee promised to do away with 17 saloons after the election and bring the number down to 20—one saloon for each 1999 population. In order that they may have all the assistance possible, the "drys" will meet tomorrow night to form a civic league to assist the business men's committee.

## THE LIFE HISTORY OF JUDGE J. J. WALTON.

Following an announcement of the death of Judge Walton, which occurred early Monday morning, the Eugene Guard gives the following sketch of his life:

Judge Joshua J. Walton was born April 6, 1838, at Rushville, Ind. Of English ancestry, he was descended from one of three brothers who emigrated from England to America in colonial days and settled in New England. The subject of this sketch came across the plains from Iowa with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joshua J. Walton, Sr., in 1849, stopping first at Fremont, Cal., then going to Yreka, where they spent the winter. In the spring of 1852 they came to the Rogue River Valley, in Oregon, where the father took up a donation land claim on Wagner creek, where the city of Ashland now stands. Joshua, Jr., upon coming to Eugene with his parents in 1852, attended the old Columbia College, which stood on what is now known as College Hill, in the southern part of the city, and which was the first institution of higher learning in Eugene. Completing his education at Union University, he was afterwards engaged with his father in various mining enterprises in Idaho. While at home, in the intervals of mining, he read law with Riley E. Stratton, and after his admission to the bar in 1863 began the practice of his profession in Eugene, continuing it till the time of his death, being a successful attorney in every sense of the word.

In 1868 he was elected county judge and served for four years. In 1875 he was appointed to the position by Governor Grover and in 1876 was elected to the office for a term of four years. He also served as deputy district attorney for four years and was United States land commissioner for a number of years. He was at one time a member of the Oregon state legislature.

Helped Found University.

Taking a keen interest in educational matters, Judge Walton was one of the five men present in the old school house, in July, 1872, to consult in regard to plans for having a university located in Eugene, the others present being B. E. Dorris, the late John M. Thompson, the late John C. Arnold and the late S. H. Finney. The first thought of these men was to have a school of the higher grade established here, but on Mr. Thompson's proposition to try and secure the State University at this place the meeting adjourned until some future date in order that more definite action might be taken.

Subsequently the Union University Association was organized for the purpose of securing the incorporation of the University, Judge Walton being elected one of the directors and secretary of the board. Drafting a bill he presented it to the state legislature, offering the grounds and buildings worth \$50,000 if the state would locate the University at Eugene. The bill passed and the association was given until the fall of 1874 to secure a site and complete the building. The first bill provided that \$50,000 should be raised by county taxes, the citizens of Eugene to contribute the remaining \$20,000. Some of the taxpayers were dissatisfied and having threatened the enjoining of the collection of the \$50,000 the matter was presented to the county court. Fearing the tax, if raised, would involve the county in heavy debt, the order was revoked and the association raised the entire \$50,000 by subscription, and after the building (Doady Hall) was completed the deed was accepted by the state.

Married Twice.

Judge Walton was married first in Eugene to Elizabeth Gale. She died in 1873 and he was married a second time in 1876 to Miss Emma Fisher, who survives him, together with three daughters, as follows: Miss Ada Ode Walton and Miss Hattie E. Walton, both of Seattle, and Miss Pauline Walton, who is
