The gentle showers proclaim that Oregon is herself again.

Residents of Olalla and Ten Mile report that the Haines surveyors are establishing an excellent grade for the Roseburg-Cooles Bay railroad, over the Canas Mountain district. Careful, permanent work is being done and construction work is expected to follow within a few months.

With \$120,000 for good roads and \$120,000 for street paving during 1910, this city and county will invest a round quarter of a million dollars in high class thoroughfares. Will it pay? Decidedly, yes, for during the year this investment will attract twice that amount of outside capital, and property values will be increased ten times the amount of this outlay.

If you were investing a large sum of money in any enterprise you would expect to employ the most competent manager obtainable to see that it was so applied as to bring the best results. Douglas county is investing about \$120,000 in good roads this year and it would doubtless be a wise policy to employ a thoroughly competent and experienced man as county road overseer to direct the expenditure of this money so as to get the best results. Good road building has now become the fixed policy of our people and a systematic plan should be adopted throughout the county for building roads, with a general superintendent to direct the district supervisors how to carry on their work to the best advantage and assist them in so doing.

FRUIT PRICES IN BOSTON.

Earl Strong Writes of the Present Market Conditions There.

BOSTON, Mass., Jan. 1.—Prunes, the plain dried kind, sell in Boston at 15 cents and 25 cents a pound retail. Most of the boxes bear Santa Clara, California, labels, but their taste and look just like those treated in Southern Oregon driers.

Oregon and Washington apples sell for \$1 a dozen and upwards. The better class of New England apples bring on the fruit stands 5 cents each, but can be purchased for 44, 43 and 46 a barrel. To an Oregon palate they lack the mellowness and juiciness of the Oregon fruit, seeming in many cases more solid and acid. Oranges retail here at 25 cents a dozen, and bananas at 25 cents, and sometimes less.

HIG SALE OF TIMBER IN UMPIQUA FOREST RESERVE.

Cottage Grove Buyers Will Construct Sawmill and Mile of Railroad to Carry Out Venture.

COTTAGE GROVE, Or., Jan. 6.—Negotiations which have been pending six months between the Government and Cottage Grove investors for 175,000,000 feet of standing timber in the Umpqua National Forest Reserve will be completed within a few days. The Government has accepted the bid of A. B. Wood and P. L. Chambers, of this city, of \$2 a thousand stumpage, and has informed them that a contract has been forwarded from Washington for execution.

In view of this the Cottage Grove men have organized a company to carry on operations in the reserve. The construction of a mile of railroad to connect with the Oregon & Southeastern at Diston was begun today, and a sawmill with a daily capacity of 100,000 feet will be equipped inside the forest reserve.

By the terms of the contract the operating company will have five years in which to remove the timber, and to do this a sawmill of 100,000 daily capacity will have to run double shifts. If this is found not practicable a second mill will be built.

Increased drunkenness is marking the prohibition regime in Roseburg, according to a statistical report prepared by City Recorder Orin. For submission to the council next Monday night. The report shows that during the year 1909 there were 81 cases of drunkenness before the recorder, as against 46 cases in 1908. In all there were 94 cases of various kinds in the police court last year, and 4402 in fines were collected. This would indicate less vigilance on the part of the officers, or they have been making more arrests of late, where formerly bootlegs were passed by.

OREGON NEWS.

Colonel L. K. Page, a prominent capitalist and Civil War veteran, died in Salem Thursday of pneumonia poisoning.

Rogue River Valley Yellow Newton Pippins were on Thursday awarded first prize over 21 competitors at the National Apple Show held in Denver. The same apples previously won second place among 42 competitors at Spokane.

Not believing in prohibition, which he says, demoralizes, and seldom prohibits, and also maintaining that the city would be morally and financially worse off under a closed, than under a well-regulated and supervised license law, Dr. W. E. Carl, mayor of Oregon City, has recommended to the council that in the future no license be granted to non-residents or to outside wholesale liquor dealers or brewers. That license shall expire when the same shall cease to do business in the name of the person receiving such license, and when any saloon shall, by reason of removal or failure, cease to do business in any given locality, then a new license shall be refused to any applicant at that place. The revenue to the city can remain the same by assessing the remaining saloons a pro rata amount necessary to make up the amount previously paid by the ones going out of business, and if these measures are carried out, the number of saloons would soon be decreased materially, and the revenues to the city remain the same."
