JUDGE COKE WAS OUT OF HIS JURISDICTION.

Supreme Court Decides Against City of Medford in Right-of-Way Fight With Hanley.

SALEM, Or., April 19.—Southern Oregon lost another case today when the Supreme Court decided the case of M. F. Hanley vs. the City of Medford, against the city and in favor of Hanley. This is the case in which Medford has been trying for over a year to secure a right of way across Hanley's land for the city's pipe line for a municipal water supply.

In June, 1909, the City of Medford began proceedings to condemn Hanley's property and secure the right of way. The county and city officials petitioned Governor Benson to designate someone to hold a special term of court, under the provisions of the law passed in 1909 which provides that there shall be an additional judge for the Second Judicial District, and that this judge shall, in addition to his regular judicial duties and labors, perform such judicial duties in districts other than his own as shall be designated by the Governor.

Governor Benson directed Judge John S. Coke, of the Second District, to go into the First District, preside over by Judge Hanna, and hold a special term of court to hear the condemnation proceedings. At this special term of court the jury rendered a verdict of \$600 damages in favor of Hanley. Hanley at once brought suit to restrain the city from entering upon his land, claiming that the proceedings were void. The injunction was granted and the city appealed. The Supreme Court holds that the powers of Circuit Judges are confined to the districts where they are elected.

PORT ORFORD GETS BANK.

Arrangements Completed That Will Result in Developments.

PORTLAND, April 20.—After visiting the East and making financial arrangements, J. G. Loucks, of Port Orford, Or., was in Portland yesterday completing his plans to open at Port Orford the first bank in Curry county on May 1. The United States National Bank of Portland and the Wells-Fargo Company, of San Francisco, will be Mr. Loucks' principal correspondents.

"I do not expect the bank to pay for some time," said Mr. Loucks. "But we are trying now to build up that country and at present there is no bank nearer than Bandon, 32 miles away."

"I believe we can have the finest fruit country in Oregon. We have a deep water wharf that will accommodate any boat running out of Portland, but at present we have not traffic enough to make it worth a steamer's while to call. This condition we soon hope to alter. At present it takes nearly three days to get to Port Orford by rail and stage. We connect by launch with Coos Bay."

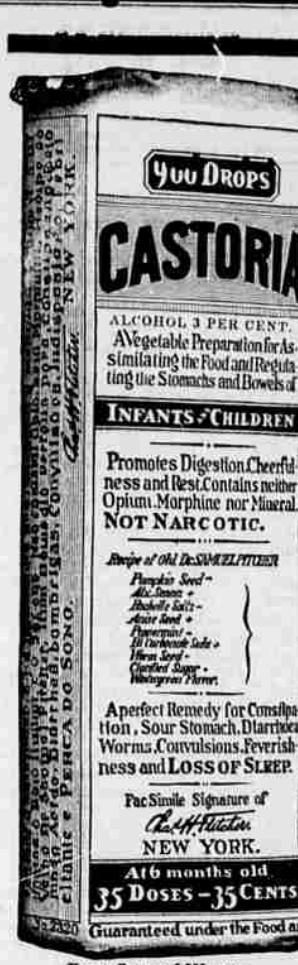
